Talent Show

Giving All We Got
September 4, 2022



Today we're learning lessons about what not to do with what God's given you. So let's start with the question literally at the heart of the matter: Are you using the talents God gave you? Tough question for a Christian. Because a 'yes' means you will put in the effort – while a 'no' means God will put you out outside His kingdom. But there's gotta be some gray area, right? Like last week when we touched on the parable of the talents, I had mixed feelings when we kinda ripped into the nervous one-talent guy who just buried his master's money for fear of doing something wrong. I mean, that seems understandable, right?

Well, we're gonna take a closer look, cuz after more digging, I don't think the guy gets a fair shake – and I want to make the case that he's not as bad as he seems in the story... he's much worse. In fact, he's a real jerk. So let's read and see what you think, Jesus said:

[The kingdom of heaven] will be like a man going on a journey, who called his servants and entrusted his property to them. To one he gave five talents of money, to another two talents, and to another one talent, each according to his ability. Then he went on his journey. The man who had received the five talents went at once and put his money to work and gained five more. So also, the one with the two talents gained two more. But the man who had received the one talent went off, dug a hole in the ground and hid his master's money. After a long time the master of those servants returned and settled accounts with them. The man who had received the five talents brought the other five. 'Master,' he said, 'you entrusted me with five talents. See, I have gained five more.' His master replied, 'Well done, good and faithful servant! You have been faithful with a few things; I will put you in charge of many things. Come and share your master's happiness!' The man with the two talents also came. 'Master,' he said, 'you entrusted me with two talents; see, I have gained two more.' His master replied, 'Well done, good and faithful servant! You have been faithful with a few things; I will put you in charge of many things. Come and share your master's happiness!' Then the man who had received the one talent came. 'Master,' he said, 'I knew that you are a hard man, harvesting where you have not sown and gathering where you have not scattered seed. So I was afraid and went out and hid your talent in the ground. See, here is what belongs to you.' His master replied, 'You wicked, lazy servant! So you knew that I harvest where I have not sown and gather where I have not scattered seed? Well then, you should have put my money on deposit with the bankers, so that when I returned I would have received it back with interest. 'Take the talent from him and give it to the one who has the ten talents. For everyone who has will be given more, and he will have an abundance. Whoever does not have, even what he has will be taken from him. And throw that worthless servant outside, into the darkness, where there will be weeping and gnashing of teeth [So... undeserved or justice served?]. - Matthew 25:14-30 NIV

Well, we've been talking about the treasures of truth in God's Word and last week we read part of this parable because it showed how treasure is *handled* in our *heavenly* home; it's *shared!*

Of course, the surprising part however, is that the sharing is mandatory! And somehow, it's perfectly fair to punish not-sharing as a serious offense. So, why exactly should we believe that Mr. One-talent deserved everything he got? Well let's dig for answers; starting with perspective.



You see, talents were *not* coins; they were the largest measure of currency in Jesus' day. And a single denarius was given for an average day's wage — but a *talent* was equal to *6000* of them. That means *one* talent was equal to about 6000 *days'* pay or almost 20 *years* of work! *One* talent is *big* money! And these servants *knew* that. And they *knew* their master. And they *knew* the *business*. This had *opportunity* written all over it! *Because*, there was no middleclass in Jesus' day and the few who had this kind of money *weren't* looking to create *competition* but continue *consolidating* wealth. *This* was a *rare* chance for the servants to *show* what they know and *prove* themselves as prospects for that *elite* class. It'd be like owning the *sole* concession stand at Lumen Field and turning it over to one of your managers for a MNF game. But when you return from vacation you find out they never even opened the doors! Ol' One-talent *knew better!* He wasn't being safe, he was being *lazy!*

And he wasn't just lazy but wicked and self-centered! Because all the money was still at risk — if anything happened to this guy, the master's money would've been lost forever. The only difference between him and the other servants was his talent had no chance for profit. Makes me think of this English guy who was out hunting for coins in 2010 when his metal detector gave a "funny signal", and after digging down a foot, unearthed this big clay jar. Well, something must've happened to whoever hid it — because it still contained over 50,000 ancient coins that were buried about 250 years after this parable! It's worth millions now, but back then, the coins were worth about four years wages for a Roman soldier. So, consider this: Ol' One-talent buried about five times that amount! I don't care what century you're in — that's gross negligence!

He not only *deliberately* wasted this golden *opportunity*, but he cares *so* little about the master who *gave* it, that he's reckless with *his* massive assets. And here's the frosting – after he gets called out for his mistake – he blames *his* behavior on the *master*!

I knew that you are a hard man [callous; harsh], harvesting where you have not sown and gathering where you have not scattered seed [dishonest; corrupt]. - Matthew 25:24 NIV

But that's not how the story goes. Look at the facts; this was a master who entrusted his fortunes to servants, praised them for their efforts, rewarded and promoted them, and then invited them to the VIP section to party with the CEO. Ol' One-talent has got it all conveniently wrong so he can justify what he did by saying, "I was afraid".

So the master exposes this excuse as a lie, by pointing out the flaw in his logic:

So you *knew* that I harvest where I have *not* sown and gather where I have *not* scattered seed? Well then, you *should have* put my money on deposit with the bankers, so that when I returned I would have received it back with interest. – Matthew 25:26-27 NIV

If this guy really buried it because he was so afraid of his 'ruthless' master – then he would've at least put it in the bank for safe keeping and a little return. But c'mon, if that's what the master wanted, he would've done that. Think man! The only reason it was ever in your hands was to give you an opportunity – and even if you really were so blinded by fear, why didn't you change your plan when you saw what your co-workers were doing?! I call shenanigans! These actions weren't a result of fear, but a lack of it! So, you tell me, did this lazy, self-centered, wicked and reckless liar deserve to get kicked out? Well I'm changing my vote to yes!

But what does that mean for *us?* What *lessons* can *we* learn from this one-talent *Goofus?* Quite a few actually, and they're real important for everyone who's *not* a fan of *weeping* or *gnashing* teeth.

First off, there's no such thing as a no-talent servant. Each servant was given something. And likewise, God's put big treasures into each of our hands. We've all been entrusted with natural abilities, unique understanding, timely situations, caring connections, profitable possessions, and rare opportunities that allow us to show the Master where our heart's at.

The real *question* is, **do you recognize the talents you've got as treasure from God that was given with the intention of investing in His heavenly kingdom?** Or are you *burying* what you've got to focus on turning a *personal* profit in *earthly* pursuits? Well, just a friendly reminder, but the **only** investments that *matter* are the ones that follow us into *eternity*. So:

Whatever you do, work at it with all your heart, as working for the Lord, not for men, since you know that you will receive an inheritance from the Lord as a reward. It is the Lord Christ you are serving. — Colossians 3:23-24 NIV



He is the Master and we are the servants. And He's given us His talents to see how we handle them. Which means keeping them above ground and in action. And that does require some risk – because it means stepping out in faith and facing the possibility of embarrassment, disappointment, or failure. But just like the two servants who didn't get chewed out, we can seize the opportunity if we keep our eyes on the prize. We should be eager to grow what we've been given when we stay excited to show the One who gave it. And pay no attention to ol' One-talent's take on the Master! Instead, trust Jesus' picture of a God who's excited to see whatever you got; because that's why He gave it!

So, at home, work, school, or right here at His Place – risk something! Because One-talent's tale also teaches: God expects a return on His investment! And on the Day of Accounting – you'll want to be ready for your audit by building the balance where God finds His bottom line. Here's a hint:

His master replied, "Well done, good and faithful servant! You have been faithful with a few things ..." – Matthew 25:21 NIV

The praise is for their *faith*, *not* their *results* because **the bottom line is found in our heart**, **not on a ledger**. That's the *real* return God wants; progress. *Any* improvement means someone seized an opportunity to grow and got *better*. And progress at *any* rate is all an eternally *patient* Master needs. That's why *both faithful* servants received the *same* reward for *different* returns:



I will put you in charge of many things. Come and share your master's happiness! – Matthew 25:23 NIV

God loves to give promotions as our ability *increases*, whatever the amount, so be ready for more *authority*, *influence*, and *responsibility*.

But realize those are just *means* to an *end* because the real *reward* is sharing in the *Master's happiness!* Because *that's* something you can't *buy, earn,* or *make* on your own. No, the *Master's* happiness is completely unique as the *pinnacle* of pleasure. **It's the true joy that comes when serving others in God's name.** And it eludes *us* as long as we chase the *lesser* joy of serving *ourselves* – which we only choose because we don't *naturally* know *His* unique joy and peace that *passes* our *human* understanding... *but we can!*

And if you're still worried about putting yourself out there, remember, in this parable Jesus *doesn't* offer an example of a servant who *uses* his talents *and loses* the master's money. Because that's *not* how it works, *remember?* It's the *faith* that pays off every time. When we risk *our* talents for *God's* kingdom, we *can't* lose! In fact, the only way we can lose, is to hide our talents or bury them in earthly pursuits.



Because, our third lesson was already we learned last week: Only the **buried talents are taken away!** Because burying never makes things better, only worse. Remember Ms. Belvedere? That's what happens to things kept down here. And the Master knows that, which is why He's giving us the opportunity to learn from Him before we learn from here.

And that's the simple secret of success for the other *two who* got it right: **Know the Master!** It's only when we *ignore* or *reject* who He really *is* that we treat His entrusted talents carelessly. And that's when we choose to learn the hard way, only gaining the rotting treasures earth has to offer. Which brings us to the last lesson from One-talent's stupid strategy: **Buried talents bring regret and anguish.** Don't forget that the parable *ends* with both encouragement *and* a warning:

Everyone who has will be given more, and he will have an abundance. Whoever does not have, even what he has will be taken from him. Throw that worthless servant outside, into the darkness, where there will be weeping and gnashing of teeth. – Matthew 25:29-30 NIV

So, good news or bad news? It's always been up to us. Sadness and *regret* is the *return* in *this* life *and* after it, for *wasting* the incredible opportunities God has given. While joy and excitement is the reward for all progress! And that big day of accounting *is* coming, where we'll show what we *did* with what we were given. So *sure* – it *can* be risky business – but if you just use your Godgiven talents to turn a *tiny* profit for the kingdom – well, well done faithful servant *it's party time!*

Father God, thank You for loving me in spite of my sin; forgive me and cleanse me by the sacrifice of Your Son, my Savior; and free me and lead me by Your Spirit and Word, as I seek to trust and follow Jesus Christ, as the Lord of my life. Amen.
