## Lame Offerings

Choosing to Give God Our Best

## Today we're talking about tithing.



So answer this question: Money is weird ... right?!




Over the years we've hired people from the congregation to do odd jobs. And *many* times they'll ask us to just put their pay on their giving record. But we can't. So we tell 'em they can certainly donate their check if they'd like. But when they *get* that *check*, they rarely give it *back*. Cuz once it's in our *hands*, it's hard to let it go. Money is weird ... *right?!* 



If you've been a believer a while, you know that when a pastor says that we're talking on *tithing*, there's a *good* chance that *either* 1) it'll be a *veiled effort* to fund a *program* or *project*, which is *not* my intention this morning; or 2) he'll *haul* out *Malachi*, chapter three, and *beat* you over the *head* with it! Which *is* my intention this morning – let's *turn* to Malachi 3:8.













Malachi is urging faith and trust in the long awaited Christ to come, cuz they're growing cynical rather than faithful; cuz Malachi's mob assumed the prophecies of a Messiah, and promises of prosperity, would've paid off by now. And they're wondering whether it's worth serving such a slow-to-act Savior. And it's showing – where it always shows first – in their giving.

'How do we rob You?' In tithes and offerings. – Malachi 3:8 NIV

That's 'how' we rob God – like how a gun is how a mugger robs a person; and how a crowbar is how a burglar robs a house. Tithes and offerings is 'how' a believer robs God – but then, 'what' is it exactly, that we rob God of? Cuz He doesn't need anything from us.

"I have no need of a *bull* from your stall or of *goats* from your pens ... If I were hungry I would not tell *you*, for the world is *Mine*, and *all* that is in it." — Psalm 50:9-12 NIV

Their giving was used in part to help the widows and orphans and the destitute. They were robbing God of giving and caring, and of one of His greatest loves, blessing those doing the giving. Therefore, when we rob God, we cheat ourselves.













But then, 'how' exactly were these cheats stealing with their tithes and offerings? Well, by giving God their very not-best.

"If I am a Father, where is the honor due Me? ... When you bring blind animals for sacrifice ... [or] crippled or diseased animals, is that not wrong? Try offering them to your governor! [Know who their governor was? Nehemiah, who wrote the OT book of Nehemiah] Would he be pleased with you? ... I am not pleased with you ... [When you] offer them as sacrifices, [having sacrificed nothing to offer 'em] should I accept them from your hands? ... Cursed is the cheat" — Malachi 1:6-14 NIV

So, whatever you do, don't give God your leftovers. Especially since He only asks for one thin slice. Because, as you already believe, He deserves our deepest love and highest loyalty. And you know we're not buying His favor, right? We're offering a token of trust and love in His honor. Because our giving is loosening the grip of greed, and growing our generosity, and giving us ownership in His kingdom. Faithful followers have always offered their first fruits rather than their last leftovers. "Would [ol' Governor Nehemiah] be pleased with you?" Nope! Know why He's brought into it? Cuz he wrote the book on firstfruits!

We *obligate* ourselves to bring the *firstfruits* of our *ground* and the *firstfruits* of *all fruit* of *every* tree, year by year, to the house of the Lord; also ... the *firstborn* of our *herds* and of our *flocks* ... the *first* of our *dough*, and our *contributions*, – Nehemiah 10:35-37 ESV

I've practiced this since my Lutheran Sunday school, where we had little colored envelopes to collect our money during the week. And when I was older, I would deposit my paycheck (remember paychecks?) and immediately write a tithe check, and tuck it in my wallet. Cuz I knew if I gave from what was left over, it'd be pretty lame. I now use automatic withdrawal. And I love it. Cuz it's great for offering stability. Get it? It expedites the process and secures my consistency, which fortifies my faithfulness — especially when I'm tempted to give something lame. And now you kids with your phones can just scan the QR Code on a giving poster, or in the transcript!

So, just *curious*, do *you* give *more* to the *Governor*? Malachi's *mob* showed *more* respect for God's mid-level *manager* and minor *prophet*, Nehemiah, than the *Messiah* Nehemiah was *prophesying*. They *blocked* God's *blessings* and then blamed *Him* for their *troubles*, in *spite* of His *warnings*.

Do not bring anything with a defect, because it will *not* be *accepted* ... Do not offer to the Lord the *blind*, the *injured* or the *maimed*, or anything with *warts* or *festering* or *running sores*. [Is it me, or is it embarrassing that this *had* to be a *law?*] Do *not* place *any* of these on the altar as an *offering* – Leviticus 22:20-22 NIV

If we consistently offer God our leftover time and money and energy, rather than investing ourselves wisely in His kingdom, we show ourselves to be withholders rather than shareholders. So we gotta grow in our giving as we grow in our getting. Cuz we're called to show ever-greater care and concern. Cuz our Father can't bless His complacent kids. Cuz it'd be unwise and unloving.

"If you do not <u>set your heart to honor My name</u>," says the Lord Almighty, "I will send a curse upon you, [mostly just the consequences He's built in, to drive us back toward our eternal best] and I will curse [what'd otherwise be] your blessings. Yes, I have already cursed them, because you have not <u>set your heart to honor Me</u>." — Malachi 2:2 NIV

Have you? Set your heart? To honor Him? By setting aside a small slice in His name? And "only" keeping 90% of everything else for yourself? He practically pleads with us to test Him.

"Bring the whole tithe [one-tenth] into the storehouse ... [and] <u>Test Me in this</u>," says the Lord Almighty, "and see if I will not throw open the <u>floodgates</u> of <u>heaven</u> and pour out so much blessing that you will not have room enough for it." – Malachi 3:10 NIV

On the way home from church this dad was griping about the sermon, the mom was grumbling about the people, and the daughter was grousing about the music. And the young son suddenly piped up and said, "Yea, but ya gotta admit, it's not a bad show for a buck!" And you get what you pay for; cuz we're blessed to the degree we're invested. Notice that it doesn't say He'll "pour out so much blessing" on you; but that "you will not have room enough for it." Cuz where your treasure is, there's your heart. (Mt 6:21) Cuz the kingdom of heaven is within. (Lk 17:21) And Jesus is just dying to throw open those floodgates and pour out so much blessing!

"Whoever *believes* in Me ... *streams* of *living* water will flow from *within* him." By this He meant the *Spirit*, [and *obviously*, the *work* of the *Spirit*] – John 7:38-39 NIV



[Yes] "Out of his *heart* will flow *rivers* of living *water.*" – John 7:38 NKJ



Now listen, you *rich* people, *weep* and *wail* because ... Your *wealth* has *rotted*, and *moths* have *eaten* your *clothes*. Your *gold* and *silver* are *corroded*. Their corrosion will *testify* against you ... [cuz] You have *hoarded wealth* in the last days. Look! The wages you *failed* to *pay* the *workmen* ... are crying out against you. ... You have lived on earth in luxury and self-indulgence. You have fattened yourselves in the day of slaughter. – James 5:1-5 NIV

Well that's encouraging. Here's how The Message paraphrases that ending.

You've *looted* the earth and *lived* it *up*. But all you'll have to *show* for it is a *fatter* than usual *corpse*. – James 5:5 TMNT



Don't sugar coat it, James. Does that sound inspiring or condemning? Be honest ... with yourself. James is speaking for the exploited poor who were much abused. He's like a speaker at a MADD rally, crying out: "You drunk drivers will pay! And your victims will be vindicated!" It's inspiring stuff ... unless you're the drunk, or the hoarder. So how'd you hear it: as inspiring or condemning? As Americans, we likely all heard it the same way.



They had three ways to hoard wealth: grain, garments, and gold. James nails all three: "Your wealth has rotted," "moths have eaten your clothes," and "Your gold and silver are corroded". But, he then adds: "Their corrosion will testify against you". How? Why? Well, where does our food go rotten?

In the *back* of the *fridge*. When do *moths* eat our *clothes?* When we *store* 'em, cuz we don't *wear* 'em. These are *signs* of stuff being *stored* rather than *used* for the *Lord*. But:

The *generous* soul will be made [*truly*] rich, and he who *waters* will also *be* watered ... [and] the righteous will *flourish* like *foliage*. [Cuz they're *watered*] – Proverbs 11:25, 28 NKJ

The Lord spoke to Job out of the whirlwind, and said:

"Who has given to Me that I should repay him?" – Job 41:11 NAS

What's the answer? And don't say, "nobody". Job was also a bit befuddled. But Solomon knew.

Whoever is generous to the poor lends to the Lord, and He will repay – Proverbs 19:17 ESV

Well, OK. So the next time you're reading Romans, and you hear the Apostle Paul say:

Oh, the depth of the *riches* of the wisdom and knowledge of God! ... Who has ever given to God, that God should repay him? – Romans 11:33-35 NIV

Raise your hand and say, "Oh! I know! I know! The heart that's 'generous to the poor'!" Cuz you know these are riddles we're expected to answer, just as Job was. In fact, Elihu asked Job:

"If you are righteous, what do you give [God]? Or what does He receive from your hand? [Here's a hint] ... Your righteousness [affects] a Son of Man." – Job 35:7-8 NKJ

This is how the warning of ol' one-talent actually ends. After the master comes home and says:





"'Throw that worthless servant outside, into the darkness' ... [Jesus says] When the Son of Man comes ... He will separate the people [into shareholders and withholders] ... [and He'II] say to those on His right, 'Come, you who are blessed by My Father ... For I was hungry and you gave Me something to eat, I was thirsty and you gave Me something to drink, [watered Me] ... you invited Me in ... you clothed Me ... you looked after Me ... and you came to visit Me. ... [Cuz, speaking of one talent] whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers of Mine, you did for Me." – Matthew 25:30-40 NIV

So, "what does [the Lord] receive from your hand?" *Food, shelter, clothing,* and *care.* Unless He doesn't. But then, that's on *you*. Not *Him.* So, start *storing* your *stuff* in *heaven*. Not sure *how*?

"Give to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven." – Luke 18:22 NIV

Let's not give God *lame* offerings; let's *set* our *hearts* to *honor* Him; and **let's** *set aside* a *set amount* (whatever it is), and *practice* being *consistent*. Amid all the *hypocrisy* of Malachi's *mob*, there were a *faithful few* who *set* their *hearts* to *honor* our Father, and *trust* our coming Savior.

And I think we should do as that faithful few. Don't you?

Father God, thank You for loving me in spite of my sin; forgive me and cleanse me by the sacrifice of Your Son, my Savior; and free me and lead me by Your Spirit and Word, as I seek to trust and follow Jesus Christ, as the Lord of my life. Amen.
