Sinking In

Following When It's Frightening August 27, 2023

Today we're learning how to follow when we'd much rather run the other away!

Last Sunday we saw how *true serving* is about *saving*; which is brought about by sincere *caring* and *concern* and *compassion*; which may require *confrontation*, *confession*, *apologies*, *forgiveness*, and *restoration*. Sooo ... Where *won't* you *follow* Jesus? Let me *answer* that *for* you – for *all* of us, actually. Where we *don't* want to *go*; to *face* what we *don't* want to *face*; to *do* what we *don't* want to *do!* And it's far more about *situations* and *circumstances* than *physical places*.



Remember when *Peter* put his *foot down* and, not only *refused* to *follow* Jesus, but *tried* to *convince* Him that He had the *destination* all *wrong?*



Jesus began to *show* to His disciples [in *Scripture*] that He must *go* to *Jerusalem*, and *suffer* ... and be *killed*, and be *raised* the *third day*. Then *Peter* took Him aside and began to *rebuke* Him, saying, "Far be it from You, Lord; this shall *not happen* to You!" ["You won't need to be raised, if You don't go to Jerusalem to suffer and die."] But He turned and said to *Peter*, "Get behind Me, *Satan!* You are an offense to Me, for you are not mindful of the things of God," – Matthew 16:21-23 NKJ



"How dare you say I shall not suffer!" From Peter's perspective, Jesus was going the wrong way — cuz Peter wasn't paying attention to the Scriptures Jesus showed 'em. And, how can we follow the Lord if we won't even listen to Him? But, at the Last Supper, Peter kind of came to his senses, and:

Peter asked Him, "Lord, where *are* You going?" Jesus replied, "Where I am going, *you cannot* follow *now*, [your *faith* isn't *strong* in *Scripture*] *but* you *will* follow *later*." Peter asked, "Lord, *why* can't I follow You *now*? I will lay down *my* life for *You*." Then Jesus answered, "Will you *really* lay down *your* life for *Me*? I tell you the *truth*, before the rooster crows, *you* will *disown* Me three times! – John 13:36-38 NIV

Which He sadly, exactly, regretfully, did. Because he didn't commit this truth to his heart.

Peter was sitting out in the courtyard, and a *servant girl* came to him. "You also were with Jesus of Galilee," she said. But he *denied* it before them *all*. "I don't know what you're talking about," he said. Then he went out to the gateway, where *another girl* saw him and said to the people *there*, "This fellow was with Jesus of Nazareth." He *denied* it *again*, *with* an *oath*: "I don't *know* the man!" After a little while, those standing there went up to Peter and said, "Surely you *are one* of them, for your *accent* gives you away." *Then* he began to call down *curses* on himself and he *swore* to them, "I don't *know* the man!" *Immediately* a rooster crowed. *Then* Peter remembered the word Jesus had spoken ... and he went outside and *wept bitterly*. – Matthew 26:69-75 NIV

Because Jesus was *right*. Bitter weeping is the kind of crying when you hate yourself rather than feel sorry for yourself. So we must treasure up God's Word in our heart, to prepare our faith for the battle, whenever, and however it comes. Sooo, where are you not prepared to follow Jesus? When does submission seem too risky – or even unreasonable – from your perspective?



I've warned you that sin will always take you further than you want to go, and keep you longer than you want to stay, and cost you more than you want to pay. But, I should probably also warn you that ... the same goes for Jesus! He'll also take you further than you want to go, and keep you longer than you want to stay, and charge you more than you want to pay. Which is why we're warned to count the cost to follow the One who paid the price! Cuz His love is too fierce, and His plan too immense. So pick your poison – or make it your medicine. And prepare your heart with His Word. And take heart! Unlike sin, the places He's planning to take you will satisfy, gratify, purify, and beautify you far more than our small, self-centered perspectives can imagine ... or desire. Cuz He has to crucify us in the process. Oh, did I leave that part out of the passage?

He turned and said to Peter, "Get behind Me, Satan! You are an *offense* to Me, for you are not *mindful* of the things of *God*, but the things of *men*." *Then* Jesus *said* to His disciples, "If *anyone* desires to come after Me, <u>let him deny himself</u>, and take up his cross, and follow Me. — Matthew 16:23-24 NKJ

What do you think that they thought He was thinking? Because, at that point, they don't know about the cross like we do. So they gotta be thinking, "He can't mean a cross-cross." Cuz we try to convince ourselves that He can't mean whatever scary thing that deep down we think He means, whenever the path that leads us to life, passes through suffering and death ... by crucifixion no less! Keep in mind, however, that He died for our sin; whereas we must die to our sin. So our cross is very different from His cross. But it's still a cross to bear, because we must die to self. So, is that what you signed up for? "No; I just want to go to heaven." Well, as Jesus said: He's the Door! The only way, and truth, and life; and no one comes to our Father any other way. (1 Jn 14:6)

"My sheep listen to My voice; [in My Word] ... and they follow Me." – John 10:27 NIV

And it's not like His sheep have a choice in the matter. Cuz He also said:

"Whoever serves Me must follow Me" – John 12:26 NIV

"But whoever loses his life for Me and for the Gospel will save it. – Mark 8:35-36 NIV

"And anyone who does *not* take his *cross* and *follow* Me is not *worthy* of Me." – Matthew 10:38 NIV

So, how much are you willing to risk for Jesus? Will you follow when He takes you further than you want to go? And remain when He keeps you longer than you want to stay? And give when He asks for more than you want to surrender? We prefer to play it safe with our faith. But, Jesus hates that. And He won't allow it. Because it prevents us from building trust. So, how often do your fears overpower your obedience? If you're anything like the rest of us: too often.

But don't worry; Jesus has a way of scaring us straight. We'd likely be shocked to see how many of the scariest moments in our lives thus far were allowed, if not arranged, for the eternal best of all involved. Remember when Jesus commanded the boys to cross the lake, to face a terrifying storm, only to then be terrified by Jesus' power and authority?

[Jesus] gave *orders* to *cross* to the other side of the *lake*. ... Then *He* got into the *boat* and <u>His disciples *followed* Him</u>. Without *warning*, a *furious storm* came up on the lake, so that the waves swept *over* the boat. But Jesus was *sleeping*. The disciples [*finally*] went and woke Him, saying, "Lord, *save* us! We're going to *drown!*" – Matthew 8:18, 23-25 NIV

He got up, rebuked the wind and said to the waves, "Quiet! Be still!" Then the wind died down and [the waves collapsed flat, and] it was completely calm. He said to His disciples, "Why are you so afraid? Do you still have no faith?" They were [still] terrified and asked each other, "Who is this? Even the wind and the waves obey Him!" – Mark 4:39-41 NIV



It's only us free-willers who don't. Which is why **He** purposely places us in the path of storms. He's teaching us. He's training us. He's strengthening us. He's developing us. And that requires the storms of life. And so, **He** justifies, **He** sanctifies, and **He** terrifies. Remember when Jonah went the opposite direction, when the Lord sent him to go and try to save his enemies? So:



The Lord sent a great wind on the sea, and such a violent storm arose that the ship threatened to break up. – Jonah 1:4 NIV

Because that's what it often takes to get our full attention. And our attention pleases Him. And:

The Lord does whatever *pleases* Him ... on the seas and in their depths. ... He sends the lightning with the rain and releases the wind from His storehouses. – Psalm 135:6-7 NLT

Remember the 2nd time He sent the boys out on the same lake to face a similar storm all alone?

Jesus made the disciples get into the boat and go on ahead of Him to the other side ... [and] went up on a mountainside by himself to pray. When evening came ... the boat was already a considerable distance from land, buffeted by the waves because the wind was against it. [So He waited and] During the fourth watch of the night [3:00-6:00 am] Jesus went out to them, walking on the lake. When the disciples saw Him ... they were terrified. "It's a ghost," they said, and cried out [likely to the Lord] in fear. But Jesus immediately said to them: "Take courage! It is I. Don't be afraid." [This is all Me] "Lord, if [i.e. since] it's You," Peter replied, "tell me to come to You on the water." [Cuz if Jesus commands it, it's doable!] "Come," He said. Then Peter got down out of the boat, walked on the water and came toward Jesus. But [Jesus cranked things up; and] when he saw the wind, [lit. the wind's might] he [took his eyes off the Lord, and] was afraid and, beginning to sink, cried out, "Lord, save me!" Immediately Jesus reached out His hand and caught him. "You of little faith," He said, [ask yourself] "why did you doubt?" [How much wind is too much wind?] — Matthew 14:22-31 NIV

Jesus has *gotta* be *proud* of Peter. In the *first* storm, He called them of "<u>no faith</u>", but <u>now</u> Peter's of "<u>little faith</u>". Like a <u>dad</u> calling his son: <u>little man</u>. Go <u>Peter!</u> Whether He's <u>sending</u> 'em into a storm, amping up the wind, or appearing as a ghost, He's <u>purposely doing</u> what a <u>loving Savior does</u> with little <u>free-willers</u> who <u>tend</u> to <u>forget</u> to <u>cry out</u> to our <u>Father</u>: <u>giving</u> 'em a <u>reason!</u>



Don't write off the ghost-thing to superstition. The first terrifying storm ended on a hillside shore where a terrifying legion of screamin' demons possessed a heard of suicidal swine. If this sea ghost is Legion, it'd be just another journey with Jesus! So give His boys a break. They don't know what to expect! Except that He'll do all He can to help us to find the end of ourselves.

Cuz we almost always need a little nudge ... or a big nudge. Cuz we tie His hands till we surrender to His will and cry out for help. And it's not enough to just cry out to Jesus in the "no faith" boat; that's a good start. But eventually you gotta take courage and ask Him to lead you to leave the boat to come to Him on the water. Imagine Peter taking that first crazy, heart-stopping step! After that, it's an ongoing matter of keeping your eyes on Him and crying out to Him the moment they drift from Him. Ever walk confidently on water ... when it's ice ... till you hear it crack?



Even if you *know* it's plenty *thick* to support your *weight*, there's just a *natural reflexive terror* that *courses* through the *veins!* That happened to me many times on the *slough*. Including *once* when I *fell through*. This is what it's *like* to be *led* by the Lord to all the *confrontation*, and *confession*, and *apologies*, and *forgiveness*, and *restoration* He *expects* – *demands* – from His *followers*.

Faith is all about taking that first step, building confidence, and keeping your eyes on Jesus and crying out when you hear the ice crack. All He needs are little mustard seeds of faith. Because, the critical factor in faith isn't its size, but its object. Focus on Jesus and you'll remain faithful. Let your eyes wander and you're sunk. Peter's only problem was that he let the wind distract him from the One who made the wind. I don't blame him. I've stepped out in faith, many times, and heard the ice crack, and had that sinking feeling, and took my eyes off Jesus. But then, that's all part of the master plan. Matthew, who never got out of the boat, also wrote:

And when they climbed into the boat, the wind died down. - Matthew 14:32 NIV

Jesus could've calmed the water before Peter walked on it. But, where's the fun in that? Or the triumph? Or the growth or gain or glory? He wants to walk us through the storms. Because, with Jesus, it's all about the adventure of training and stretching and testing. I wonder if Peter looked at the others and said, "I'm of little faith!" Face it: you can't play it safe and follow Jesus. He won't allow it. You'll never build trust or develop your faith.

So, where won't you follow Jesus? How much are you willing to risk? Peter would call it "leaving the boat". Jesus calls it, just another day on the job. So don't let fear overpower your obedience.

Get out of the boat. Take a walk on the water. And have a little faith.

Father God, thank You for loving me in spite of my sin; forgive me and cleanse me by the sacrifice of Your Son, my Savior; and free me and lead me by Your Spirit and Word, as I seek to trust and follow Jesus Christ, as the Lord of my life. Amen.
