Demonstrative Faith

Beyond the Belief of Demons
September 10, 2023

Today we're learning what great faith actually looks like!













But first: Why isn't righteousness more appealing? Two weeks back, we looked at Simon-Peter's rising and sinking faith; highlighted when he boldly walks on water, but freezes up midway to Jesus, and goes under. And everyone can relate who's ever walked on frozen water and heard a loud crack. And we related that to the starts and stops of growth in righteousness. Stepping out. Fearing. Failing. Reaching out. Confessing. Growing. And then stepping out again. And I said I once fell through the ice into the slough. I was about 12, by myself, and treading on thin ice. Thankfully I was close to shore, and I only suffered embarrassment and a shocking plunge into ice water on a freezing cold day. Trudging home in wet, cold, heavy, clothes was brutal. And once home, it was even worse warming up. Peeling off clingy, mucky, clothing with frozen fingers; and then putting my hands under warm water.

Ever submerge near-frozen fingers in warm water? Stings. Like needles. Like putting our pride and sin under our Father's authority. And that's why righteousness isn't appealing ... at first. We gotta warm up to righteousness. Cuz at first, you just want to put your hands back in the cold to numb the pain of coming to life — even though you know it'll kill 'em. Scripture compares a drop in faith to frigidness, saying:

The love of many [believers] will grow cold. – Matthew 24:12 NKJ

Because sin freezes our receptors to the warmth of righteousness, as it tempts us into stone cold indulgences of instant gratification. But we know better than to let our *fingers* freeze – so what do we do when we don't want to do what we know we need to do? We push through!

My son-in-law unexpectedly walked through my garage as I was battling an overwhelming project. And I yelled out, "I hate this! I don't know what to do." But he was in a hurry; so, without slowing down, he yells back, "Push through!" And I did. And I won. And I now give the same advice to those facing a seemingly overwhelming challenge of faith. Push through the painful process of restoring life. Cuz we know when we do, it'll begin to feel good. And then really good. And then lukewarm ain't gonna cut it. We need to bring the heat! Cuz the same heat that brings the pain, brings pleasure! Along with the satisfied joy that comes with overcoming.



And that's when returning to the cold loses all its appeal. Because it now feels great! Same goes for faith. So, what does great faith look like? Well, it's gotta go beyond lukewarm belief, and do the deeds of fired-up faith. Jesus' brother James writes:



You [who believe in Christ] believe that there is one God. Good! [That's a great place to start; but let's face it] Even the demons believe that—and shudder.—James 2:19 NIV



They've got the *shivers!* But *how* does James *know* that? Well, just after his *friends* and *neighbors* try to throw brother Jesus off a nearby cliff, Jesus *moves* His *home office* and *headquarters* to Capernaum, where:



All those who had any that were sick with various diseases brought them to Him; and He laid His hands on every one of them and healed them. And demons also came out of many, crying out and saying, "You are the Christ, [i.e. Messiah] the Son of God!" – Luke 4:40-41 NKJ



You know the one good thing about demons? Their theology! So, how does your belief go beyond the demons? Well, they may believe that the Father, Son, and Spirit are One, but that's just book smarts. Demons don't submit to God's authority. And that's the difference – if you do. They will confess, but they won't concede. And as Scripture makes clear, they'll beg even as they refuse to bow in submission. Remember that ol' Legion of demons?



The demons begged Jesus, "Send us among the pigs" - Mark 5:12 NIV

The demons not only *confess* Christ, they got a *huge* prayer group *goin'* here, beseeching Jesus! So, what makes *your declaration* of faith any *different* from the *demons'*? There are *only two* possible answers: 1) *You act on your beliefs* with *God-honoring deeds*; or 2) *Nothing*. James writes:

What *good* is it, my brothers, if a man claims to have *faith* but has no *deeds*? ... faith by *itself*, if it is not accompanied by *action*, is *dead*. ... *Show* me your faith *without* deeds, and I will show *you* my faith by *what* I *do*. You *believe* ... Even the *demons* believe ... do you want *evidence* that *faith* without *deeds* is *useless*? ... As the *body* without the *spirit* is *dead*, so *faith* without *deeds* is *dead*. – James 2:14-26 NIV



You see, **belief must go beyond right-thinking to right-doing.** Which means working at getting our beliefs beyond our head and heating up our heart. Because, **beliefs that hide in your head are dead.**



Just before Jesus moved to Capernaum, He returned to His old neighborhood to give 'em the *truth:* that He's about to *usher in* God's *Kingdom.* And that's when they *usher Him* to the *cliffs* to give *Him* the ol' *heave-ho!* But, just before *that*, He returns to the *Galilean Jews* in *Cana* ...

... where He had turned the water into wine. And there was a certain *royal official* [from *Capernaum*] whose son lay *sick* at *Capernaum*. [And] When this man heard that Jesus had arrived in *Galilee* from Judea, he went to Him and <u>begged</u> Him to <u>come</u> and <u>heal</u> his <u>son</u>, who was close to death. "Unless <u>you</u> people [the <u>Jews</u>] see miraculous <u>signs</u> and <u>wonders</u>," Jesus told <u>him</u>, "you will never <u>believe</u>." – John 4:46-48 NIV

Believe what? Because the begging official obviously believes He can heal his son. So, what is it they refuse to believe, that shouldn't require signs and wonders? His identity. His authority. And His mission. Know why they don't? They don't know His Word. Know why they don't? They refuse to hear it, learn it, and believe it. And you can't believe what you don't know. He later says:

"I have [prophetic] testimony [in Scripture] weightier than that of John [the Baptist]. For the very work that the Father has given Me to finish, [He didn't come to abolish the prophets, but to fulfill them (Mat 5:17)] and which I am doing, testifies that the Father has sent Me. And the Father who sent Me has himself testified concerning Me. [But] You have never heard His voice nor seen His form, [in His Word] nor does His Word dwell in you, for you do not believe [the prophetic testimony of] the One He sent. You diligently study the Scriptures because you think that by [having] them [in your head] you possess eternal life. [But] These are the Scriptures that testify about Me, [and you gotta have Me in your heart!] yet you refuse to come [to submit] to Me to have life." — John 5:36-40 NIV

They didn't need the miracles cuz they had the prophets. But we can't believe what we don't know.

He said to [the two on the road to Emmaus], "How foolish you are, and how <u>slow of heart to believe</u> all that the [OT] prophets have spoken!" – Luke 24:25 NIV

For the testimony of Jesus is the Spirit of prophecy. – Revelation 19:10 NIV

[Because] The Spirit of Christ [himself] who was in [the prophets] ... testified beforehand the sufferings of Christ and the glories that would follow. – 1 Peter 1:10-11 NKJ

Know who wasn't slow of heart? The despised, half-Jewish Samaritans. Just before returning to the Galilean Jews in Cana, He encountered the Woman at the well, and:



Many of the Samaritans from that town *believed in Him* because of the *woman's testimony* ... And [then] because of *His words* many more *became believers*. [And] They said to the woman, "We no longer believe *just because* of what *you* said; now we have *heard* [His *Word*] for *ourselves*, and [so] we *know* that this man *really is* the *Savior* of the *world*." – John 4:39-42 NIV

Those despised, half-Jewish Samaritans heard God's voice, saw His form, and embraced His Son; because *belief* is a *verb*, because *faith* is an *action*. It's not enough to just *know* the *truth*. *Even* the demons *know* the *truth*. We must *put* our *pride* and *sin under* its *authority*. You see:

The *Galileans* welcomed Him. [because] They had *seen* all [the *miraculous sings* and wonders] that He had done in Jerusalem at the Passover Feast. – John 4:45 NIV

And so, the *Galileans' belief* was *based* on His *blessings*, whereas the *Samaritans' faith* was *grounded* in His *Word*. So which is more *true* for *you*? "Sometimes I don't *care* about *His plan*; I just want Him to do *my will*. Save my *child*. Save my *marriage*. Save my *job*. How could He say *no* to *any* of *those*?" I don't *know*. But He *sometimes does*. Ever *beg*? I have. Ever *bargain*? I have.

Ever threaten? You have? That's terrible! I'd never ... well ... okay, I have.

The royal [Capernaum] official [at Cana] said, "Sir, come down before my child dies." Jesus replied, "You may go. Your son will live." [And] The man took Jesus at His word and [took action and] departed. [Even though Jesus didn't come, as he'd asked; but] While he was still on the way, his servants met him with the news that his boy was living. ... Then the father realized that this was the exact time at which Jesus had said to him, "Your son will live." So he and all his household [finally, actually] believed. – John 4:49-54 NIV

In what? **His identity, His authority, and His mission.** Go to any craft or country store and you'll see *signs* that say: Believe. "Good!" As James would say. But *in what*? Well:

To all who *received* Him, to those who <u>believed</u> in His name, He gave the *right* to become children of God – John 1:12 NIV

But, what's it mean to "believe in His name"? Because, as Jesus famously said:

"I will do whatever you ask in My name, so that the Son may bring glory to the Father. You may ask Me for anything in My name, and I will do it." – John 14:13-14 NIV









"Well that's not true. I've tacked His name onto many prayers that didn't take." Notice the condition: "so that the Son may bring glory to the Father". He's not saying He'll bring God glory by granting our wishes; but that whatever we ask so that He may bring glory to our Father, He'll absolutely do when it absolutely will. Asking "in His name" is like saying, "Stop in the name of the law." A good cop wouldn't ask for something selfish and dishonoring like, "Give me your money ... in the name of the law." That's an abuse of their granted authority. Likewise, to believe in Jesus' name is to bow to His identity, authority, and mission; which takes our belief beyond the demons ... and the craft stores. Those Samaritans embraced it. Then the Galileans questioned it. And then His old neighbors rejected it. And then He moved to Capernaum and met another official: a Roman Centurion, whose faith is praised when he asks Jesus to come and heal. Virtually identical requests. Vastly different responses. Why? Well, because when ...

[The Elders of the Jews] *begged* [Jesus] earnestly, saying that the one for whom He should do this was *deserving* – Luke 7:3-4 NKJ

The centurion [knowing Jesus' identity] replied, "Lord, I do not deserve to have you come under my roof. But [knowing Jesus' authority] just say the word, and my servant will be healed. For [knowing Jesus' mission in submission to the Father] I myself am a man under authority, with soldiers under me. ... [And] When Jesus heard this, [public declaration of His identity, authority, and mission] He was astonished and said to those [Jewish elders] following Him, [who'd "begged Him earnestly" saying the man deserved it] "I tell you the truth, I have not found anyone in Israel with such great faith." ... Then Jesus said to the centurion, "Go! It will be done just as you believed it would." — Matthew 8:5-13 NIV

So, what does great faith look like? That guy ... in a bathtub.

Father God, thank You for loving me in spite of my sin; forgive me and cleanse me by the sacrifice of Your Son, my Savior; and free me and lead me by Your Spirit and Word, as I seek to trust and follow Jesus Christ, as the Lord of my life. Amen.
