Heads Bowed

Correctly Confronting Invasive Chaos February 18, 2024

Today we're learning what it means to bow our heads to righteously confront this world's chaos!











I have a two-part question: Should believers vote for Trump? And: Should Michelle Obama replace Biden? What would Jesus do? Discuss. No! Don't discuss! Cuz that'd be disgusting. Because, as pretty much everyone can agree, the whole state of politics in our nation is pretty much in a state of chaos. But then, this broken oi' world's pretty much always been a hectic, chaotic mix of the good, the bad, and the ugly – in politics, religion, business, media, and pretty much everything. So what are we to do? Battle it out? Bow out? Bury our heads? What would Jesus do? May I suggest a combination of all three, and bow our heads to do battle like Jesus! He directly addresses this ongoing, frustrating tangle of good and evil, in a parable about wheat and weeds.

Every gardener and farmer feels the frustration of weeds. You spray 'em, pull 'em, and curse 'em, but they come right back! So, Jesus tells us not to be surprised when evil does the same; and there's not much we can do about it down here. He told this from a boat, to a massive crowd on the shore of His headquarters in Capernaum. Because, His followers fully incorrectly expected Him to: accomplish a political victory; and establish a physical kingdom; and abolish their mortal enemies. And because of this deeply engrained belief, this allegory of good and bad gains, and God's seeming reluctance to rid the world of evil – was greatly perplexing; especially to His young apprentices, who kept asking about it after His resurrection! (Acts 1:6) But Jesus had said:

"The kingdom of heaven is like a man who sowed good seed in his field. But while everyone was sleeping, his enemy came and sowed weeds among the wheat, and went away. When the wheat sprouted and formed heads, then the weeds also appeared. The owner's servants came to him and said, 'Sir, didn't you sow good seed in your field? Where then did the weeds come from?' 'An enemy did this,' he replied. The servants asked him, 'Do you want us to go and pull them up?' 'No,' he answered, 'because while you are pulling the weeds, you may root up the wheat with them. [Because at first they can look so alike; so] Let both grow together until the harvest. At that time I will tell the harvesters: first collect the weeds and tie them in bundles to be burned; then gather the wheat and bring it into my barn.'" ... Then [after telling two more parables] He left the crowd and went into the house. [But] His disciples came to Him and said, "Explain to us the parable of the weeds in the field." He answered, "The one who sowed the good seed is the Son of Man. The field is the world, and the good seed stands for the sons of the kingdom. The weeds are the sons of the evil one, and the enemy who sows them is the devil. The harvest is the end of the age, and the harvesters are angels." — Matthew 13:24-39 NIV



Jesus' crowd was well aware of the weed He's referring to. It's called darnel, or false wheat, or perverted wheat. It's just like wheat 'cept it'll kill ya! And in Jesus' day, it was sown in warfare, and for revenge. In fact, it was forbidden under Roman law, to "sow tares or wild oats". We think He's referring to darnel, because He says: "When the wheat sprouted and formed heads, then the weeds also appeared". Because both heads appear alike till they mature, then the difference is clear. Just as:

Sin, when it is full-grown, brings forth death. - James 1:15 NKJ

But, know how the heads differ at the harvest? Wheat Heads bow, while darnel weed-heads remain stiff necked and rigid. Which we're told is a trait of those rebellious to righteousness.

They did not *listen* or *incline* [lit. *bow*] their *ear*, but *stiffened* their *neck*, that they might *not* hear and receive *instruction* – Jeremiah 17:23 ESV



As righteous Stephen said, just before he was stoned by religious weeds:



"You stiff-necked people, uncircumcised in heart and ears, you always resist the Holy Spirit." ... But they cried out ... stopped their ears ... and stoned him. And the witnesses laid down their garments at the feet of a young man named Saul. — Acts 7:51-58 ESV



A.k.a. the Apostle Paul. You know, the guy who headed up the hunting down and murdering of believers, before receiving Christ and composing two thirds of the New Testament! But, back in his "B.C. days" you would've said, "There's no way that guy's not a weed!" Because we live in a soiled tangle of true-believers, non-believers, not-yet-believers, and make-believers. And Jesus' servants are too heavy-handed and self-serving to even begin to figure out how to sift 'em out. Remember, Jesus put up with a Judas! And we don't have to wonder "What would Jesus do?" Cuz we know exactly what He did. He loved on him, prayed for him, even washed his feet, till he weeded himself out.



Cuz eventually, we'll either bow down or bow out. It's not that we're not to confront wickedness; but, we're to confront it with love, without condemnation, with heads bowed to Christ's authority. Know what Jesus and I have in common? We both hate weeding! He hates it because He's loving and just and desires that no one should perish — whereas I'm just lazy. But other than motive, we're so alike! I mean, when weeding is inevitable, we both send out our angels to do it! It's interesting that the last thing recorded that Jesus says (in Revelation), is a reminder to:

"Let the evildoer still do evil, and the filthy still be filthy, and the righteous still do right, and the holy still be holy. See, I am coming soon; My reward is with Me, to repay according to everyone's work." ["That's My job, not yours."] – Revelation 22:11-12 NRS

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¹ The Corpus <u>luris Civilis</u> (533^{AD}) codifies the Lex <u>Aquilia</u> (3rd century BC) which states: "If you sow tares or wild oats in another man's crops and spoil them, not only can the owner bring the interdict against damage caused secretly or by force, but he can also proceed in factum under the Lex;"





And Simon-Peter, who's famous for impatience, eager ear-lopping, and, in a very weedy moment, denying Christ, reminds us that:

The Lord is not *slow* about His *promise*, as *some* think of *slowness*, [just as He's not "coming soon" as *some* think of *soon'ness*] but is *patient* with *you*, not wanting *any* to *perish*, but *all* to come to *repentance*. – 2 Peter 3:9 NRS

And let's face it, we've all got a few weeds in our own field! So let's make an effort to stop condemning the weeds of others; and let's work on getting a grip on rounding up our own!

In *light* of some of the *untamed areas* of my *own field* – that I wish *only* grew the *fruit* of God's *Spirit* – all I can do is *praise* Him, and *thank* Him, for His *patience* with *me!* How about *you?* **Shouldn't we** *offer* **that same** *courtesy* **of** *compassion* **to** *others?* Since we *can't know*, and often don't even *ponder*, all the *ways* His *Spirit* might be *currently*, *patiently working* in their *hearts* and *minds*. So what do you say? Let's just *pray* to stay *out* of His *way*, and *put down* the *spray!*

Cuz this side of Heaven, wheat and weeds can look a lot alike. And we're dealing with an enemy who makes bad look good, and wrong feel right, and poison appear appealing, and the harmful healthy. And he's out to rob us by tempting us to remain unbowed in some way. So how do I know if I'm a wheat or a weed? Simple. When my way conflicts with Thy way, I bow in submission to His way. And if and when I fail, I bow in regret and repentance. Either way, the bowing is always the internally obvious difference between a true-believer and a make-believer.

And keep in mind, we're bowing to the Master Servant who bowed to death on our behalf!



"I say to you, unless <u>a grain of wheat</u> falls into the ground and dies, it remains alone; but if it *dies*, it produces *much grain*." – John 12:24 NKJ



So when Jesus had received the sour wine, He said, "It is *finished!*" And *bowing His head*, He *gave up* His *Spirit*. – John 19:30 NKJ



Taking the form of a servant ... He humbled himself by becoming obedient to the point of death. Therefore God has highly exalted Him ... so that at the name of Jesus every knee should bow – Philippians 2:7-10 ESV

But, remember this weirdness just the night before, when:

The Lord said, "Simon, Simon! Indeed, <u>Satan has asked</u> for you, that he may <u>sift</u> you as <u>wheat</u>. But I have <u>prayed</u> for you" – Luke 22:31-32 NKJ

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"So You're gonna *let* him?!" Yes. But, know *why* the devil has to *ask* for *permission?* Because **he** has *no* authority to act on his own. And know why he's given permission? Not to get too deep in the weeds on this, but he's only ever allowed in the field, to make possible God's greatest gift: free will. Which, by definition, requires that seeds of discontentment be sown.

But, it seems the *devil's just* as *confused* by the *infinite brilliance* of God's *ways* as *we* so often *are*, and as the *disciples* so often *were*. Because in *this* instance, **like** *always*, **he's** *playing* into the *previously commanded hand* of God. Jesus *didn't* say he *only* asked to *sift Simon-Peter*.

"For surely I will command, and will <u>sift the</u> [entire] house of Israel among all nations, <u>as grain is sifted</u> in a sieve; yet not <u>the smallest grain</u> [lit. <u>rock</u> (ESV, NAS), which in <u>Greek can be Petra</u> which <u>we pronounce Peter</u>] shall fall to the ground." – Amos 9:9 NKJ

Which is what the Rock of Salvation had nicknamed Simon! Remember when ...

[Simon] said, "You are the *Christ*, the *Son* of the *living God*." Jesus [said], "Blessed are you, *Simon Bar-Jonah*, for *flesh* and *blood* has not revealed this to you, but *My Father* who is in *heaven*. And *I also* say to *you* that *you* are *Peter*, and on this *Rock* I will build *My church*, and the *gates* of *Hades* shall *not* prevail against it." – Matthew 16:16-18 NKJ

For the one who *sows* to his *own flesh* will from the flesh *reap corruption,* but the one who *sows* to the *Spirit* will from the Spirit *reap* eternal *life.* – Galatians 6:8 ESV

[For] There is a way that seems right to a man, but its end is the way of death. ... [Because] An ungodly man digs up evil, and ... a perverse man sows strife – Proverbs 16:25-28 NKJ



[And] Whoever sows injustice will reap calamity – Proverbs 22:8 ESV



Jesus is the Master at creating profound com'parables. I'm not talking about parables, but creation. As He created our world, He designed into it what He knew He'd need to communicate with us. I mean, c'mon! Identical plants, one poisonous, one nutritious, one bows its head! In the beginning, even as He was creating, He knew He was coming to speak to you! And what's really cool about His wheat and weeds parable, is that Jesus provides a decoder, regarding who's what, and what's who. So, let's read the same story, as translated by the Author.

The Lord scattered His kids in the world. But while the world slept, the devil scattered evil kids among the kids of the kingdom. And as the good ones grew and their heads matured, the bad ones were obvious. So the Lord's servants came and said, 'Lord, didn't You sow good kids in Your world? Where did the evil kids come from?' 'The devil,' He replied. 'Do you want us to go and weed the evil ones out of Your world?' 'No, because while removing the bad kids, you'll pull up some of the good kids. We must let both grow together until the end of the age. Then I'll tell the angels to bind the evil for destruction; and to gather the good and bring 'em home.' ... And then the righteous will shine like the sun in the kingdom of their Father. – Matthew 13:24-30, 43 NIV

[Because] Those who sow righteousness get a true reward. – Proverbs 11:18 NRS

Light is *sown* for the *righteous*, and *joy* – Psalm 97:11 ESV

That's one more big difference between wheat and darnel, that's easily discerned at harvest time: when wheat dies it brightens and turns golden, whereas darnel darkens and turns black. So:

Sow for yourselves righteousness, [and] reap the fruit of unfailing love – Hosea 10:12 NIV

[And remember] The fruit of righteousness is sown in peace – James 3:18 NKJ

Cuz in the end, making it to the White House pales compared to making it to the Light House!

Father God, thank You for loving me in spite of my sin; forgive me and cleanse me by the sacrifice of Your Son, my Savior; and free me and lead me by Your Spirit and Word, as I seek to trust and follow Jesus Christ, as the Lord of my life. Amen.
