## Death Match

Living With an Eye on Dying

## Today we're facing what it means to live in the light of the darkness of death!

So here's the *question:* Are you *living* or *dying?* And here's the *answer:* Yes! Like it or *not, life* is a *death march.* And every *day* about 167,000 *life-lights die out.* And we *need* to face *death* – in fact, stare death in the face – or we can't be freed from the fear by the *One* with power *over death.* 



















Years ago, Shar and I saw Jerry Seinfeld when he was retiring his classic bits. And one of his best is about a study "that said, public speaking is the average person's number one fear. Number two is death! Which means, to the average person, if you have to be at a funeral, you'd rather be in the casket than doing the eulogy." It's funny cuz it's absurd ... and believable ... because the reason death isn't the number one fear is because we work so hard to keep from really considering it. Because, death is by far the harshest reality of life. I mean, it's only a matter of when. And then, the only reason it comes as a shock, is that we spend so much mental effort avoiding pondering the inevitable. But that's where DeathClock.com comes in! Answer a few questions, choose between normal, pessimistic, sadistic, and optimistic, and it'll estimate your death-day and start counting down the seconds! Mine's optimistically March 16, 2047. So, when do you think you're gonna die? "That's morbid." You sure?

The days of our lives are seventy years; and if by reason of strength they are eighty years, yet their boast is only labor and sorrow; for it is soon cut off, and we fly away. ... So <u>teach</u> us to <u>number</u> our days, that we may gain a heart of wisdom. – Psalm 90:10-13 NKJ

For to me, to live is Christ and to die is gain. – Philippians 1:21 NIV

Right? I was recently at the bedside of a precious friend and longtime His Placer the day before she died. And we talked about the moment when Jesus will appear to each of us and care for us, and comfort us, the moment before we realize that our body fell off ... like toenail clippings. And, like toenail clippings, we won't want it back, because ... gross. Death is something we really need to prepare for. But it's something we don't want to. Which is why we find ourselves placed in a world where turmoil forces us to face what we need to prepare for. Which means we've gotta learn to trust Jesus in the midst of the turmoil on our trip to the grave! Aaron spoke on one of my favorite stories last Sunday, when Jesus calms the storm. But that's not why it's one of my favorites — it's because of the question underneath it all: Why was Jesus sleeping while the storm was raging? And to answer that, we need to ask who's in charge of the storms.



For [the *Lord*] commands and *raises* the *stormy wind*, which lifts up the *waves* of the *sea*. ... *Then* they [finally] *cry out* to the Lord in their *trouble*, and <u>He brings them out</u> of their distresses ... <u>He guides them</u> to their desired haven. ... Whoever is *wise* will *observe* these things, and they will *understand* the [purposeful, painful] lovingkindness of the Lord. – Psalm 107:25-43 NKJ

The thing we don't like about Jesus, or at least don't like to think about Jesus, is how He'll lead us into a storm, if it's for our eternal best ... especially if it's the only way to get our full and faithful attention. Because, meaningful change comes mostly through crisis; because that's when the opportunity and the motivation most forcefully and effectively present themselves.

Without that storm the boys couldn't've comprehended the depth of His power and authority. And so, Jesus makes some waves in order to ultimately calm our fears. Which is why His love sometimes feels like the opposite of love. But behind the temporary turmoil, is a far greater eternal purpose. Because we're not here to avoid pain or fear or suffering or death, but to face them with faith in Him. Which is why He did what He did, the way He did, when He went to sleep during that storm. And it's one of my favorite Gospel stories to weave!

As they sailed, He fell asleep. Without warning, a furious storm came up on the lake, so that the waves swept over the boat so that it was nearly *swamped* and they were in great danger. But Jesus was in the stern, *sleeping* on a *cushion*. The disciples went and woke Him, saying, "Lord, *save us!*" "Master, Master, we're *going* to *drown!*" [But, rather than *bail* 'em *out*, He chose *this* as a *teaching* moment, and] He replied, "You of little *faith*, [In *what?* His *power* and *authority*] *why* are you so *afraid?*" [Of *what? Drowning!* Dying! Because we *fear death* to the *degree* that we *lack faith* in the *One* with the *power* over *death*. And their *fear* has *overwhelmed* their *faith*. So] [They] said to Him, "Teacher, don't you care if we *drown*?" [Cuz it *appears* You *don't*. But, of *course*, He *did*. So] *Then* [after rebuking them] He *got up* [from His *cushion*] and *rebuked* the *winds* and the *waves*, "Quiet! Be still!" Then the *wind died* down and it was completely [dead] *calm*. [Then] He [again] said to His [suddenly terrified] disciples, [Now] "Why are you so afraid? [Of *what? Him!*] Do you *still* have no *faith*?" [In *What?* His *love!* but] They were terrified and asked each other, "Who *is* this?" – Mt 8:23-26; Mk 4:37-41; Lk 8:22-24 NIV



That's the question, isn't it! Because, as Aaron pointed out, it's one thing to see Him as Teacher; and it's another to see Him as Savior; but ultimately we need to see Him and receive Him as God the Creator! Otherwise, we'll limit Him by our limited understanding of Him. Because:

Faith comes from <u>hearing the message</u>, [of the <u>power</u> and <u>authority</u> and <u>love</u> of <u>Christour Creator</u>] and the <u>message</u> is <u>heard through the Word of Christ</u>. – Romans 10:17 NIV

So He sends us (of little faith) out to sea to face our fears, to drive us into His Word, so we'll wake up and see His power and authority and love. Sometimes, on Sundays, on my way to church, I see older folks out running — as though trying to outrun death without running to the One who gives life. So, does a sleeping Jesus in the midst of our struggles, indicate a lack of concern? Quite the opposite! It reveals His desire to guide and strengthen our faith so it can outpace our fears.

For this is God, our God forever and ever; [and in the storm, "He guides them to their desired haven." So, like it or not] He will be our Guide even to death. — Psalm 48:14 NKJ

[For] His eyes see, [and yet] His eyelids test, the children of man. – Psalm 11:4 ESV





"I don't want Him to test and I don't wanna think about death." Nobody does. But we must. It's inevitable. And we're all in this boat together. And He's only able to remove our fears and to comfort us to the degree that we're willing to strengthen our faith in His Word. Only then can we show Him that we know Him. Cuz the true test of faith is our trust; and the true test of trust is our calm. The night before His own turmoil and death on the cross, He warns His disciples, "in this world you will have trouble." (In 16:33) Why? Cuz this isn't home; it's a home away from home where faith is grown in children created in the image of our Father-of-lights, as James (1:17) puts it.

Even though Jesus was the Son of God, [and mainly because He was the Son of God] He learned obedience [down here] by what He suffered. – Hebrews 5:8 NCV

Because *growth* and *strength* and *wisdom* come through *hardship*. It's a simple *fact* of *life* that *high winds* cause *deep roots*. *True* in the *storm*. *True* in our *lives*. Which is why:

In this world you will have trouble. But [as Jesus goes on to say] take heart! [Now, which word should we emphasize?] I have overcome the world. – John 16:33 NIV

If we stress "overcome", it's as if He's saying, "I've overcome the world, so you won't have that much trouble." But if we heed His warning, we'll stress "I", as in, "I've overcome, so you can too."









A world without turmoil is like a health club without weights, or a bootcamp without an obstacle course. And that's my kind of health club and boot-camp! And that's the problem! And so, the weight of the world basically trains us by forcing us to face the harsh reality of mortality. And the reason we so despise anything that reminds us of our day of death, or the inevitability of losing those we love, is because we hate facing the fear of losing the unwinnable battle we're fighting. But face it we must, for:

No one has power over the spirit to retain the spirit, [when it's time to go, it goes!] and no one has power in the day of death. [When we're done, we're done!] There is no release from that war — Ecclesiastes 8:8 NKJ

Until, that is, Jesus came, and became like us, to fight for us, to win the unwinnable battle on our behalf! And in the process, He paid the price and paved the way for our safe passage. And, as believers, we need to learn to rest in that. I'm a good dad, in that it goes against my will to see my kids suffer pain. And yet, I paid a dentist to drill their teeth. Cuz, if we don't allow such lesser afflictions, they'll suffer much greater afflictions. Which is why, we lovingly schedule short-term pain in light of long-term wellbeing.



I'm still scarred from the turmoil of my son, at two, being taken to surgery, looking to me, scared to death, screaming, "Help me, daddy!" I was crushed by having to restrain an intense instinct to shield him, due to a higher desire to save him from a far worse affliction. And saving-love must outweigh shielding-love or it isn't true love. And God is love! And He sees death very differently than we. Cuz to Him, roughly 166,859 every day, 6,952 every hour, 116 every minute, aren't exits! Those kids are coming, not going.

[Which is why the Psalmist writes] Precious in the sight of the Lord is the death of His godly ones. – Psalm 116:15 NAS

"You're home! Good job! Enter into My joy!" (Mt 25:21) And so, as Aaron touched on last Sunday, He'll do whatever it takes to bring home the most. Wouldn't you? The stories of Scripture make it more than clear that chaos is never evidence of God's absence. It's just the race we're called to run, as we fight the good fight. (2 Tim 4:7) Because, as Paul tells us, His power is perfected in the midst of our weakest moments when we're forced to face our limitations and mortality.

[In fact] During the days of Jesus' life on earth, [just like us] He offered up prayers and petitions with loud cries and tears to the One who could save Him from death, and He was heard because of His reverent submission. [To God's will] — Hebrews 5:7 NIV

But it didn't stop the cross! Why? Because our eternal best outweighed His temporary torturous tumult. And because of His obedience, He knew He was heard; and that's all He needed to be reassured, cuz He absolutely trusted in the Father's love. So God's plan up there, coupled with Jesus' obedience down here, turned the worst tragedy into the greatest triumph, and the ultimate expression of God's love and power! But who could've seen that coming?

What man can *live* and not see *death*? [I know this one! The Son of Man!] Can he deliver his life from the power of the grave? [Yes!] – Psalm 89:48 NKJ

[Because, He said] "I will ransom them from the power of the grave; I will redeem them from death. ... O Grave, I will be your destruction!" – Hosea 13:14 NKJ

But *nobody* saw it *coming*, because it was an *inside job!* And:

He shall redeem you from death, and in war from the power of the sword. – Job 5:20 NKJ

Since the children have flesh and blood, He too shared in their humanity so that by His death He might destroy [the devil] who holds the power of death – Hebrews 2:14 NIV

Because, in our unwinnable death match with death, death is no match for Life! Just as a tomb full of darkness is no match for ... even a match. And the One rightly called the Light of Life, said:

I give them eternal life, and they shall never perish; no one can snatch them out of My hand. [Cuz] My Father, who has given them to Me, is greater than all – John 10:28-29 NIV

So whatever you do, don't leave Him sleepin' while you go on tryin' to bail yourself out!

Father God, thank You for loving me in spite of my sin; forgive me and cleanse me by the sacrifice of Your Son, my Savior; and free me and lead me by Your Spirit and Word, as I seek to trust and follow Jesus Christ, as the Lord of my life. Amen.
