## Indecent Exposure

Bringing Sin to the Surface

Today we're using the *trouble* in our *lives* to seek and destroy the *sin* in our *hearts*. Cuz, with God, even *adversity* works out to our *advantage!* Cuz God *is good* – and that's *how* 

We know that all things work together for good to those who love God – Romans 8:28 NKJ

So, the big question is, if everything good hinges on our love of God: How do you know if you're full of it? Cuz you're full of something! Everyone has to live for something – cuz something has to give our lives a purpose – cuz we won't do anything without a good reason!



So, we all search for the most reasonable reason to live life, and whatever we choose becomes the desire of our heart. And as each life is lived in pursuit of its desire, each reason reveals its quality by what it produces.



And this idea was echoed by award-winning, best-selling novelist David Foster Wallace, who *lost* his life-long struggle to *find* that reason in 2008 when he committed suicide. And although he came *close* to making Jesus his reason *twice*, he *couldn't* bring himself to *commit*, and before his death, he hinted at his struggle in a now-famous *commencement speech*:



"There is actually no such thing as atheism ... Everybody worships. The only choice we get is what to worship. And ... pretty much anything you worship will eat you alive. If you worship money and things ... then you will never have enough ... Worship your own body ... and you will always feel ugly ... Worship power [and] you will feel weak and afraid ... Worship your intellect, ... [and] you will end up feeling stupid, a fraud, always on the verge of being found out."

Doesn't it break your heart to see someone so close! Because he's right – down here, no earthly purpose has ever proven to produce the one thing we all really want out of life; more life! But that's why God's Word steps in to spell things out and remind us how things work in this world:

Whoever <u>sows to please their flesh</u>, from the flesh <u>will reap destruction</u>; whoever <u>sows to please the Spirit</u>, from the Spirit <u>will reap eternal life</u>. Let us not become weary in doing good, for at the proper time we will reap a harvest if we do not give up. – Galatians 6:8 NIV

Y'see, where David Foster Wallace *grew weary* and *gave* up, **Christian life continues by making the Spirit's desire our reason to live.** And that means it's **critical** to confirm that we're filling our hearts with what the **Spirit** wants! Just listen how **important** Scripture says it is:

Above all else, guard your heart, for everything you do flows from it. – Proverbs 4:23 NIV

So, since it's absolutely *imperative*, how do we positively *know* we got the *right* stuff in our heart? Well, Scripture *just* told us! Cuz if *everything we do* – *flows from our heart*, we can look at our *lives* to discover what's filling our *heart*. To follow Scripture's analogy, **what we plant in our heart** is what we grow in our lives! And if we want to be sure *our* true desires are in fact, *Spiritual* seeds, all we have to *do* is **check the produce!** Cuz *your* life is producing *something* but –



The fruit of the *Spirit* is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, self-control; [because it's a very basic principle:] – Galatians 5:22-23 ESV

No good tree bears bad fruit, nor does a bad tree bear good fruit. [Therefore,] Each tree is *recognized* by its own fruit. ... [And *likewise*,] A good man brings good things out of the good stored up *in his heart*, and an evil man brings evil things out of the evil stored up in *his* heart. For the mouth speaks what the heart is *full* of. – Luke 6:43-45 NIV

[So,] Be very careful, then, how you live – not as unwise but as wise [aka]... be filled with the Spirit, [cuz one leads to the other!]- Ephesians 5:15, 18 NIV









Get it? Wise living and Spirit filling are two sides of the same coin! Which means it all comes down to quality control in the produce department! But – if we need to have the right heart to see eternal life; and to see the right heart, we need to have the right fruit; that begs the question, what's the best way to see our fruit? Cuz love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control aren't always visible. That is, they're hard to see while watching Netflix or pumping gas.

Well, that brings us to what Aaron and Bruce have been talking about the last couple weeks: Facing our fears and testing our mettle. *To explain*, imagine I've got a glass of water and I shake it. What *happens?* It spills. Why? Well, our *instinctive* answer is, "Water spilled because you shook it." But what if I had a glass full of milk? Would water spill out? No! Because shaking doesn't spill water, it spills contents. So, the more correct answer is, "Water spilled from the glass cuz water filled up the glass." It's just simple logic: You can only spill what you fill. And when stuff gets shaken, whatever spills out reveals what filled it up. Well, same goes for us!

Whatever fills us, spills from us when life gets shaken up. So, if you're concerned with the contents of your container, that's great news cuz it's a golden opportunity to see what you're full of!

And in the same way – to return to the *Bible's* analogy – if we want to check our *produce*, a little adversity shakes the fruit loose from our tree.

So, are you thanking the Lord for giving you the opportunity to check your heart through all the turmoil in your uncomfortable, unstable life? Probably not. But that's normal, cuz Christian curiosity makes it easy to forget, life isn't about questioning God, it's about God questioning us.

And though it's *common*, that's a *huge* mistake! Because *our* hearts need to be *constantly* questioned to *root out* all the bad *seeds* we're growing into bad *trees*; *until* we get it *right!* 



It's a lot like the story of the *bird* and the *lumberjack*. Y'see, this *logger* goes to mark all the trees to be *cut down* the next day and comes across this little mama bird *trying* to build a *nest* in one of the trees he's marking. And knowing that she's *unaware* of her mistake, his *compassion* kicks in, he spins his axe around, and *thumps* the tree until everything falls out and she flies away. But seeing that she started *again* in another *marked* tree, the lumberjack *follows* and knocks things down *again*. And after chasing her through a *dozen* different trees, the *bird* – who's *gotta* be thinking, "Why does this *lumberjerk* love *torturing* innocent *birds?!*" – finally flies up to a *rock* ledge where, *at last*, she could *nest in peace!* And the *moral* of the story *is*, we're *all* up a tree until we build on the Rock! Cuz the *fact* of the matter *is*, every tree in this world is coming down and the *effect* of that fact *is*, everything built on them will be lost.

And if we can't see *ourselves* making *that* mistake, it's actually incredibly *kind* to shake our *trees* until we change our *ways*. Cuz with *each* adversity, we're *prompted* to ponder, "Where am I going wrong?" And that's *the* key question that every fruit inspector needs to *obsess* over because:

There is a way that appears to be right, but in the end it leads to death. – Proverbs 14:12 NIV

It's hard to spot rotten fruit right away. Sometimes we mistakenly identify anger as goodness or idolatry as love; cuz us Christians can be a little too eager to confirm our eternal life. But it's vital that we actually get it right – not just believe that we got it right. Cuz as Paul points out,

My conscience is clear, but that does not make me innocent. – 1 Corinthians 4:4 NIV

All your *fruit* can *be good* and you can still be a *bad farmer*. Cuz a crop of perfect *potatoes* doesn't make you a good *apple* farmer. *Apples* make you a good apple farmer! And in the same way, all the *patience* in the world doesn't mean you're *peaceful*. *Bad* fruit *isn't* the *only* sign of sin; *missing* fruit *also* means we're missing the mark. Because the Spirit *doesn't* want *any* good seed to go *unsown!* So, *thankfully*, God's committed to *constantly* shaking things up, to *keep* us questioning our ways, even when we think our fruit is fine. Just ask the epitome of adversity, Job. Cuz

[Job] was blameless and upright; he feared God and shunned evil. – Job 1:1 NIV

And yet, God agrees to let him *lose* all his *kids*, *wealth*, *health*, *comfort*, and *control* without warning. And in *response* to the tragedies, the good seeds in his heart are easily seen in his *speech*:


[Job said:] The LORD gave and the LORD has taken away; [but,] may the name of the LORD be praised." In all this, Job did not sin by charging God with wrongdoing. — Job 1:21-22 NIV

[But, as the suffering went on, everyone started to ask why, and Job got testy:] Oh, that I had someone to hear me! I sign now my defense, let the Almighty answer me – Job 31:35 NIV

Right there, Ol' Flawless Fruit himself, shows what he's missing by making a big mistake; he bases his case on all the fruit he can see – without considering the possibility of a deficiency he can't see. So, in the middle of his misery, God flips the script to kindly remind him how His plan works:

Then the LORD spoke to Job *out of the storm* ... "Brace yourself like a man; <u>I will question</u> you, and you shall answer Me." – Job 38:1-3 NIV







Then *Job* answered the LORD: "*I* am unworthy—how can *I* reply to *You?* I put my hand over my mouth. [Which was righteous!] – Job 40:3-4 NIV



Cuz in that moment, Job learned it's not about what we know but Who we know. Cuz only the Creator can fully understand His creation. So, have you put your hand over your mouth? Until we stop subconsciously believing we can do life right, we're challenging God's authority. And it can be seen spilling out in every secretly selfish statement we make and subtly judgmental action we take. But like Job, we have to empty ourselves of every desire other than God because the closest we can come to knowing perfect is knowing Who is perfect! And because that relationship is the Spirit's #1 desire, Jesus came and gave us all the opportunity for the same one-on-one Job had with God.

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Cuz y'see, Job lost all his kids, wealth, health, comfort, and control, but make sure you hear this: So will you! That's part of every single person's story down here! It's just a matter of time, but everything you've ever worked for will be lost, everyone you've ever loved will die, and you won't get to decide when or where. The only choice we have in suffering is how to respond. Because that's its purpose! It's our big God-given opportunity to see if we're growing the love of God that leads to life before we come face-to-face with death! So, I'll ask again, if everything good hinges on our love of God: How do you know if you're full of it? Well, that's actually the easy part:

Anyone who loves God must also love their brother and sister. – 1 John 4:21 NIV

Cuz if the love of the Lord is in your heart, it grows in your life as the love of others. And your life will get shaken time and time again so you can check what you produce for any flawed or missing fruit! Maybe you'll lose your dream job to see if your joy was real; maybe you'll lose an argument so you can check the quality of your gentleness; or maybe you'll lose your control to see the state of your faithfulness. But regardless of what happens, if your life isn't producing a sacrificial, selfless, and sincere love for others – you need a new tree!

And that only happens when you put your hand over your mouth, let God question you by your fruit, and then love Him enough to trust that every time your life gets shaken – He's just leading you back into His presence as the only Rock where you can nest in peace!

Father God, thank You for loving me in spite of my sin; forgive me and cleanse me by the sacrifice of Your Son, my Savior; and free me and lead me by Your Spirit and Word, as I seek to trust and follow Jesus Christ, as the Lord of my life. Amen.
