## Dad Company

The Fellowship of Fatherhood

**Today we're finding the formula for fellowship in fatherhood.** Cuz we were *all* born to be *friends* and *family* – but the whole reason *behind* that *design* was to make things on *earth* the way they are in *heaven!* And up *there*, everything is peaches and cream cuz everybody is *friends* and *family* with the *Father!* So, if we want to prepare for *our place* in *His heavenly home* before we arrive, the big question *is:* What does fellowship with the *Father* look like?











So, let's start with some clarification on the *definitions* of *relationship* and *fellowship*: in the broad sense, *relationship* is what we *are to* one another while fellowship is what we *share with* one another; relationship is the *nature* of our connection while fellowship is the *expression* of our connection. So, for example, a *married relationship* is what *makes* us *husbands* and *wives* – but *married fellowship* is what makes us go on dinner *dates*, do our *taxes*, and *agree to this* photo.

And as *self-aware individuals*, we can't help but connect to everyone in creation by relation. We label everyone from *bosses*, *buddies*, *enemies*, and *frenemies* to *coaches*, *caretakers*, *BFFs*, and *CEOs*. And yet, in *every connection*, it's up to *us* what we *share* and *how* the relationship gets *expressed*. Cuz we may be *compelled* to *connect* but we're *not obligated* to *engage*. It's where our free will kicks in; relationships are mandatory but fellowship is optional.

But – there's one weird exception to the rule: PARENTING. Because the bottom line in every parent-kid relationship is **if parents** don't engage, kids don't live. For mothers and fathers, not sharing is not an option. Which means parenting is the one relationship with forced fellowship! Why? Well, I can't say for certain, but here's what we do know: 1) God created it that way and 2) He calls Himself our Father. And based on that information, it seems safe to assume there's something He wants us to know about the fellowship of fatherhood that defines Him.

And since it is our earthly dad's big day, we're gonna explore the fundamentals of fellowship to see what makes their relationship so special – and then listen for what God might be trying to tell us by expressing Himself as our heavenly Father. Cuz, as our Father, He tells us that listening to fathers is a matter of life and death (Dad's already like where this is going):

Listen, my sons [and daughters], to a father's instruction; pay attention and gain understanding. I give you sound learning, so do not forsake my teaching. For I too was a son to my father, ... and he said to me, "Take hold of my words with all your heart; keep my commands, and you will live. — Proverbs 4:1-4, 7 NIV

So let's keep that command and try to understand what fellowship is, and why God's is so Fatherly.

## 7 Fellowship Fundamentals Found In Fatherhood:



1. Fellowship is activating. Because Fellowship motivates our movement. Remember, *fellowship* puts our *relationships* into action. Cuz as the *expression* of a relationship, it's what a relationship *does*. It's how the *people* around you *poke*, *prod*, and *provoke* you to *get up* and *live* your life in one way or another.

And I call it the Bobby Rockanello principle. Cuz in my teen years, the father of a good friend used to always tell epic tales of his legendary mischief, exciting escapes, and near-death experiences — and curiously, every story involved his best friend, Bobby Rockanello! Because it was always Bobby's big idea that got things going; "I heard about this racetrack in Tijuana where we can make bets without an ID..." And everyone has — or is — the Bobby Rockanello that puts action in our lives.

But this *fundamental* of fellowship takes a *different* form in *fatherhood*. As much as *dads* want to *poke*, *prod*, and *provoke* their *kids* to share in an adventure, **dads focus on the** *outcome* **of their activities.** Dads know they're responsible for the *product* of the fellowship, so they aim it at *good*.

[And unsurprisingly, we see that lesson when we listen to God's instruction:] Let us consider how we may spur one another on toward love and good deeds, — Hebrews 10:24 NIV

Every *good* father, including *God*, wants *their fellowship* to activate something *amazing* in their kids because *they* can see the profound *potential* kids can't. Which is why:



2. Fellowship is illuminating. Because Fellowship increases our awareness. You ever notice it's hard to see the back of your own head while it's easy for others. That's because a shared perspective is a superior perspective. Seeing with one eye keeps our perception shallow because it takes at least two to see something's depth.

Back when I was 11, I got this sweet haircut over the summer cuz I thought girls would see me as a smooth operator... I was wrong. And although I wish they were little more gentle, it was the fellowship of my friends that made me see things more clearly. Because the truth is, we need the input of others to see all dimensions of our world and ourselves.

And increasing our *awareness* is a huge part of fellowship with a *father* cuz sharing *guidance*, *wisdom*, and *insight* is what dad's are all about. From the moment we were born, dad *had* to teach us how to stay alive; the only problem is, **we don't like hearing hard truths about being wrong**.

[So no wonder we weren't real excited for God's illuminating input that came with Jesus:] The true light that gives light to everyone was coming into the world. ... but His own did not receive Him. ... [Cuz they didn't want to hear it from Dad anymore!] Yet to all who did receive Him, ... He gave the right to become children of God – John 1:9, 12 NIV

We generally prefer others' input to be *complementary*, but a father's fellowship includes what we *need* to hear not just what we *want* to hear. And *that* goes for God, too; cuz even if it *stings*:



3. Fellowship is validating. Because Fellowship affirms our identity. Through the *illuminating* accounts of *others*, we start to see the true *substance* in *ourselves* and our *experiences*. And when we hear how others express *their* experiences, *fellowship shows us who we are by teaching us where we belong*.

And as true as that is in *all* our various *social* settings, nothing validates us like family! Relating to *relatives* makes *us* make *sense*. And in every *father*, **seeing the source of our substance gives us a sense of acceptance**. I was at *my* dad's the other day and happened to notice we buy the same *hot sauces* – *and you know what* – it just made me feel like I was doing something *right!* 

[And since God sent Jesus to show us our heavenly Father's substance,] Accept one another, then, just as Christ accepted you, in order to bring praise to God. – Romans 15:7 NIV

When we accept others as family, we show we share our Father's substance because we're acting like His kids. And as that grows our confidence in our character, it also gives us guardrails and thus:



4. Fellowship is regulating. Because Fellowship keeps us accountable. Once we find where we belong, it's important to stay there. And it takes ongoing input to maintain an ongoing identity. And fellowship provides a system of feedback where we can keep tabs on our progress toward the person we want to be. But that can be a bit rough:

As iron sharpens iron, so one person sharpens another. – Proverbs 27:17 NIV

And you don't sharpen one *knife* with *another* – you use something a little *different* to create *friction!* Cuz as *nice* as it is to *feel* the fellowship of those with a *shared* substance, **nothing focuses** us on who we *are* like seeing who we *aren't!* And even though we share our core substance with our *fathers*, it's the *friction* from those *differences* that remind us we're *kids* not *clones!* And good fathers *expect* a little friction cuz they want to love their kids as *individuals apart* from themselves. And it's the *same* for our heavenly Father; the *difficulties* of our *differences* are worth it because:



5. Fellowship is integrating. Because Fellowship builds a bigger body. And nothing gets bigger without a few growing pains! Fellowship doesn't just connect us, it changes us. As we express our relationships by sharing our experiences, our identity grows beyond the individual and we develop dimensions only seen in our community.

The way it takes ol' Bobby Rockanello to *bring out* certain *pieces* of a person, **fellowship doesn't just strengthen the community, it grows each member.** Whether you *nerd out* with your *physics friends, talk smack* with your *fantasy football league*, or *do devotionals* with your *prayer group* – **the more you find ways to fit in community, the more you become you.** *Uniquely.* And when it comes to *fathers*, a big part of fellowship is *pushing* kids to do things like *go play*, *find a job*, or *get married* because they know we *belong* in something *bigger*; and *that's* 100 percent *heavenly* Father

For just as each of us has one body with many members, and these members do not all have the same function, so in Christ *we*, though many, form one body [And when we form a new *body*, we also live a new *life*, because:] – Romans 12:4-5 NIV



6. Fellowship is generating. Because Fellowship creates new character. After we *integrate* and *grow* ourselves as part of a community, it actually makes a new version of you. When we do things like *start careers*, get *married*, and *have kids* – *we* bring a brand new *boss*, *husband*, or *father* into the world! And we get to live *that* new life.

Because of the fellowship *I've* chosen, *I've* gotten to live *many* glamorous lives, such as Noah the *tortured musician*, Noah the *urine specimen collector*, and Noah *the guy in a van in Malibu*. And yet, even though they *all* had *value*, no *new* Noah can compare to the *first* one; *Noah the son*. It's the *foundation* of all *other* Noah's cuz **kids can't exist without a father's fellowship.** And only God can offer *that* foundational fellowship a *second* time, remember the verse we already read:

Yet to all who *did receive* Him, [AKA join in *His* expression of *our* relationship] ... He gave the right to become children of God – John 1:9, 12 NIV

So, of course He calls Himself our Father – cuz only God's fellowship can create something so new, it's like we've been born again; to live a new life as God's kid. And it's the ultimate example of how:



7. Fellowship is liberating. Because Fellowship frees us from our flesh. As we grow and *change* according to how we *choose* to *share* ourselves with others, we're not *just* changed into something *new* – we're separated from everything old. And it's a *relief* to realize that choosing our *fellowship* means choosing *whatever life* we want to lead!

Since relationships are *mandatory* but fellowship *is optional* – *we* are in charge of which people get to *know* and *grow* us. I am *free* to leave this church and hang out exclusively with *jugglers*, *acrobats*, and *daredevils* if I think the *circus* life suits me best – **because to find who we are, we have to leave who we were.** And both *good dads* and *our heavenly Father* encourage kids to freely *explore* their options for fellowship cuz they know the fundamentals of *other* relationships *may* stay the *same* – but there's something *special* about what *they* shared. So what is it? Well, what did we *learn*?

What does fellowship with the Father look like? It looks a lot like our earthly dads when they're at their best. Like all fellowship, it's activating, illuminating, validating, regulating, integrating, generating, and liberating — the only difference is, something forces dads to do it in a specific way. Something compels them to have to express every dimension of their relationship. Any guesses? Love! Love is what forces every good dad to do the relationship right! It's the substance we share with our heavenly Father that reveals — deep down at our core — we all want what's best for others!

Even if the ways of this world distracted and disabled some dads, the truth is, every person on this planet has the instinct to love one another. And although that selfless fellowship can feel inconvenient on earth, it's so critical to understanding who we are, that God gave us our own kids to force us to confront the feeling. Because He wants us to know, we have a Dad who doesn't just have to share His love, but wants to! He wants us to know a loving dad means all of the stress, friction, confusion, pains, and change in His fellowship is always aimed at our best. And He wants us to know when we accept that truth, the real you just chose to be born into His real fellowship!

[Cuz that's when] You will know the truth, and the truth will set you free." – John 8:32 NIV
