## Get Real

## Activating Our Potential August 04, 2024

Today we're investigating our *identity* to make sure we're living the *right* life! Cuz trying to be anybody *other* than the *true* you is a recipe for a life of unfulfilled *frustration!* So, to *avoid* living out that *terrible* tragedy, it's essential to *wrestle* with *this* question: are you the real you?













I remember when I started worrying about this terrifying question cuz I was 11 years old, watching a PBS pledge-drive marathon of one of my favorite shows, a British sci-fi comedy, called Red Dwarf. And in it, a small motley spaceship crew constantly dodges crazy close calls — until the last episode of season 5 starts and shockingly, the whole crew is killed in a crash! And as I sat there in disbelief, the scene faded out as the words "Game Over" faded in. And then, the characters all slowly wake up to learn — for the last four years, they've just been playing a virtual reality game called Red Dwarf. And as they each struggle to accept reality, the most compelling revelation is had by the character Rimmer: because throughout the whole show, he's played a lowly, bumbling coward — but as the guy working the game explains, he was supposed to be the hero:

"[Your character] Rimmer was a hand-picked special agent for the Space Corps. He had his memory erased and was programmed to behave like a complete twonk so no one would suspect he was on a mission to destroy Red Dwarf to guide [the character] Lister to his destiny as the creator of the second universe! ... Hang on a minute! Are you seriously telling me you were playing the [idiot] version of Rimmer for all that time? For four years?! Wow, that's a classic that is!"

And at 11-years-old, a brand-new fear was born, "What if I'm playing the complete twonk Noah — when I'm supposed to be the hero?!" And over the last two Sundays, that same haunting question resurfaced; cuz as Bruce reminded us, the role we play is up to us! We're free to choose anyone — from lowly deckhand to courageous captain — even though the Author specifically wrote the most powerful parts to be played by us! And it doesn't matter what you think of yourself, our job is to just trust God is a good enough writer and director to empower our performance:

[Like Paul says:] I pray that the eyes of your heart may be *enlightened* in order that <u>you may know the *hope* to which He has called *you*, the *riches* of His glorious inheritance in His holy people, and <u>His</u> incomparably great power for <u>us</u> who believe. – Ephesians 1:18-19 NIV</u>

In other words, Paul's praying for believers to see their potential! So he reminds us that our abilities don't depend on effort, they depend on obedience. Cuz when God gets complete control to direct our actions, no role is out of our reach; even the ones that seem intimidating or impossible. The only problem is, something has to teach us that truth or we'll stay settling for less.













And that's what life is about! Life is just a series of actual events that point to true potential. Like we've discussed over the last few weeks; sometimes a moment of crisis reveals our capacity for courage and other times, just a piece of moving music exposes our empathy. But here's what I want you to hear today, it doesn't stop there; every experience is an opportunity to uncover the true potential of our character.

And *that* makes every inch of life more *engaging* and *exciting* because there's no such thing as simply getting *groceries*, shopping for *shoes*, or calling tech *support*; **there's only a set of showtimes where we get to practice playing our character** until we fit *perfectly* in *God's* production. And that makes *His* input of the *utmost* importance, because:

As many as *received* Him [and His direction through His Word], to *them* He gave the right to become *children* of God – John 1:12-13 NKJ

Cuz **He wrote our role as supernatural royalty!** So that's the version of you that He'll direct you to. Which also means, if you try to live without His help, you risk playing the twonk. Cuz accepting His casting is the first step to playing our part; but following His direction is what fleshes it out.

Dear friends, <u>now</u> we <u>are</u> children of God, and <u>what we will be</u> has not <u>yet been made known</u>. But we know that when Christ appears, we shall be like Him, for we shall see Him as He is. - 1 John 3:2 NIV

Once we accept God's *authority* over our *identity*, **our present position is made plain, but our full potential remains foggy**. We may be His kids, but the whole role is only revealed when *we* fully *see* Christ. And there's *three* big ways for Christ to appear: **down here**, **up there**, and **in us**.

So, until we get the face to face down here or up there, our best character reference for our performance comes from what we can learn from observing Christ in us. Because,

No one has ever seen God; but <u>if we love one another, God lives in us</u> and His love is made complete in us ... so we know and rely on the love God has for us <u>[as Christ in us]</u>. <u>[Cuz Christ is the image of God 2 cor 4:4 and]</u> <u>God is love</u>. <u>[In other words]</u> Whoever lives in love lives in God, and God in them... <u>[So when we love]</u> In this world we are like Jesus. – 1 John 4:12, 16-17 NIV

For where two or three gather in My name, there am I with them. – Matthew 18:20 NIV

We are therefore *Christ's* ambassadors, [making Him appear through *love*] as though *God* were making *His appeal* through *us.*– 2 Corinthians 5:20 NIV

**Every act of love reveals another aspect of Christ's character that directs us toward our Christ-like potential.** And everyday we wake up to another opportunity to play our part so we can follow God's direction and discover our identity. Cuz our potential may be a mystery, but love leads us to learn. Love the only prompt we need to refine our role cuz that's all we need to improvise and analyze. So, you're getting groceries, shopping for shoes, or calling tech support – just try to let love lead all your actions, note what you learned about your character, and adjust a bit before your next show.










It's like becoming a parent. We're cast in the role the second someone's born, but it takes a lifetime of improvising and analyzing to really hone in on the character. Cuz as all parents know, you don't know what you're made of until you start playing the part. Personally, I was a little worried I didn't have that selfless love you hear good fathers are supposed to have. But one day, our second-born was riding his trike down a trail and our dog pulled him head-long into a big ditch full of thorns and thistles — and without thinking, I jumped in and pulled him out like a hero! And I was like, "Okay, maybe I am a good dad!"

But as proud as I was of reaching that potential, just a short while later I learned how little I knew about my true potential. Cuz we went camping. And I hate bees; like really hate bees. So when our 5-year-old first-born walked to the bushes to go to the bathroom and started screaming, I was horrified to find him with pants around the ankles and legs covered in bees. Apparently, he had stepped on a nest. And although every earthly instinct told me to freeze, something else in me pushed me to pick him up and start swatting bees away! And afterward, all I could think was, "Who am I?! Maybe I'm the best dad!"

Cuz I firmly believed even my highest potential would stop short of bees! But as C. S. Lewis said, "You never know what you can do until you try, and very few try unless they have to." Every one of us in this room has potential power beyond our wildest dreams – but we only get to taste it when we test it. So, like we said before, do hard things and don't you dare sell yourself short! Because C.S. Lewis also pointed out, "There are no ordinary people. You have never talked to a mere mortal. ... But it is immortals whom we joke with, work with, marry, snub and exploit ... [but] This does not mean that we are to be perpetually solemn. We must play."











[So, like Solomon advises:] Whatever your hand finds to do, do it with all your might, – Ecclesiastes 9:10 NIV

Cuz the more you play, the more you learn about yourself. You ever do a murder mystery dinner? It's like that; everybody just gets essential information about their character and starts off as a potential suspect — but as the conversations continue, it becomes clear who's who; because our stories reveal our true identities. That's why we see it in so many movies; some experience usually leads somebody to discover some hidden potential. It takes the immersive adventure of the NeverEnding Story to convince Bastian of his impossibly important role. And Aragorn spends years in the shadows before his epic quest proves his destiny to be king in The Lord of the Rings. And even Po learned to let go of all his pre-conceived notions as his journey revealed that a clumsy panda had the potential to be the Dragon Warrior in Kung Fu Panda. And the reason such stories have all had success is because they all resonate with our reality; cuz we're all living a story written to reveal our potential.

For we *are* God's handiwork, created in Christ Jesus to do good works, <u>which God prepared</u> in *advance* for *us* to *do*. – Ephesians 2:10 NIV

Cuz only *one* story can lead *our* character to discover *our* identity, so God wrote *it* to guide *us* there:

Humans plan their course, but the LORD establishes their steps. – Proverbs 16:9 NIV

So it's necessary to let Him direct all our actions if we want our revelation from His story because:

He guides the *humble* in what is right and teaches *them* His way. – Psalms 25:9 NIV

And when *our* character is played *His* way, we start to see the power of *Jesus* in *our identity*. Cuz when *our* influence is at its *lowest*, our potential is at its *highest* because *that's* when *God* has total control and *we're* no longer *limiting* our *potential* with *our* ignorant *perspective*.

[So,] to Him who is able to do immeasurably more than all we ask or imagine, according to His power that is at work within us, to Him be the glory. – Ephesians 3:20-21 NIV









Because the real you is only known by your real Creator. And since nobody here is *self*-made, nobody here should *tell* you who you are. So *contrary* to what our self-centered *society* says, *self-discovery* doesn't come from *self-indulgence*; following the feelings of our *flesh* and relying on its *partial* perspective can only limit our potential. Rather, *self-discovery* comes from obedience to our Author. Cuz only *He* sees the potential that *we* think is *impossible* – so only He can direct us to live the lives of our character us to the fullest. We just have to seek it out!

Remember what happened when Jesus proved our hidden potential by walking on water to disciples stuck in a stormy sea? What did Peter say?

Lord, if it is You, <u>command me</u> to come to You on the water. [Way to go Peter, you're getting there!] – Matthew 14:28 NKJ

The truth is, from our perspective, we need the boat to live, but from God's perspective, we need to leave the boat to live. Because that's the sign that we're letting go of who we thought we were and grabbing hold of who God says we are. That's playing our part as the Author intended.

I mean, who do you think knew Harry Potter's potential better, *Harry*, or *J.K. Rowling?* Well, if it's *ridiculous* to think of *Harry* as more aware, **why trust anything** *in creation* **more than** *its Creator?* Listen, *this world* wants *you* to believe you're *weak*, cuz your *true* strength *overcomes* the world. Every day we hear more *promises* from *earthly* authorities pledging to make life *easier* – but all that does is subvert and suppress the adventure that is meant to reveal the *extraordinary* potential of *your* seemingly *ordinary* character! Just remember, **you're stronger than you can possibly imagine**, so you *need* direction from someone who can see *beyond* your imagination. And *God proved* what *He* could see by giving us *Jesus* as an example of who we are when He commands our character. We don't just *defy* physics by walking on *water*, we defy *death* by becoming *immortal*. Because,

You, dear children, are from God and ... the One who is in you is greater than the one who is in the world. [Cuz get real; only a twonk would settle for this world!] – 1 John 4:4 NIV

Father God, thank You for loving me in spite of my sin; forgive me and cleanse me by the sacrifice of Your Son, my Savior; and free me and lead me by Your Spirit and Word, as I seek to trust and follow Jesus Christ, as the Lord of my life. Amen.
