
## Missing Persons

Lusting for What We're Lacking

Today we're learning to *look past* the things we *don't have* to *appreciate* the things we *don't see!* Cuz the truth is, we're all wealthy but there's nothing more distracting than what we're lacking! And because what we want blinds us to what we have, our vision test comes down to one question: do you suffer from FOMO? AKA the Fear Of Missing Out; does that fear distract you?







But as we saw a few weeks ago, all these natural needs are part of our created purpose cuz they keep us hungry and human hunger is a spiritual test to teach us to trust God alone gives everything we need.



So do not worry, saying, 'What shall we eat?' or 'What shall we drink?' or 'What shall we wear?' ... your heavenly Father knows that you need them. But seek first *His* kingdom and *His* righteousness, and all these things will be given to you as well. – Matthew 6:31-33 NIV



But as great as that is, it comes with an unwelcome implication: if God doesn't offer it, we don't need it. Uh-oh... sometimes missing out means saving lives! Or at least saving eyes! Which is what we learn from the parable of Ralphie in the holiday classic, A Christmas Story. Cuz in it, we witness Ralphie's obsessive hunger for a Red Ryder BB gun distract him from the entire Christmas season even though everyone around him repeatedly warns, "You'll shoot your eye out!" But still, the whole movie centers around his blind determination to get what he wants in spite of the warning, even if it takes constant justification and manipulation in all of his interactions. And when he finally gets his way on Christmas day, what happens? He nearly shoots his eye out! Cuz we all know, what's best for kids is rarely what kids want.



And because only our Heavenly Father knows what is best for His kids, we're repeatedly reminded that He should call the shots so we don't lose an eye! And we need those Scriptural reminders cuz when hunger hits, we quickly forget and go "full Ralphie" as we justify, manipulate, and twist the truth to get what we want. And that's deadly dangerous when dealing with God's input — which is why we're warned about keeping God's Word real. In fact, the Bible opens and closes with the same warning; cuz back in Deuteronomy, right before Moses laid down the law he said:

<u>Do not add to what I command you</u> and <u>do not subtract from it</u>, but keep the commands of the LORD your God that I give you. [as spoken!] – Deuteronomy 4:2 NIV

[And just *two* verses before the *end* of *Revelation*, we're told:] I warn everyone who hears the words of the prophecy of this scroll: If anyone *adds* anything to them, God will *add* to *that* person the *plagues* described in this scroll. And if anyone takes words *away* from this scroll of prophecy, God will *take away* from *that* person any share in the *tree of life* and in the Holy City, which are described in this scroll. – Revelation 22:18-19 NIV

You got it?! Any twisting of truth is a straight-up *lie*. Cuz *truth* is only *truth* when it's the *whole* truth and nothing *but* the truth; and *anything* short of *that* increases the probability of *perversion*. So, the *rule* is, No twisting *His* truth or no tree for *you!* Cuz *your* whole life is *still* just a *part* of the *same* story that got going in the Garden and we're *all* still a *part* of learning the *same lesson*.



[So let's recap *our* backstory:] The LORD God made all kinds of trees grow out of the ground—trees that were pleasing to the eye *and* good for *food*. In the *middle* of the garden were the tree of *life* and the tree of the knowledge of good and evil. [And then] — Genesis 2:9 NIV



The LORD God took the man [humanity] and put him in the Garden of Eden to work it and take care of it. And the LORD God commanded the man, "You are free to eat from any tree in the garden; but you must not eat from the tree of the knowledge of good and evil, for when you eat from it you will certainly die." — Genesis 2:15-17 NIV



Absolute abundance! Sure, we still had a hunger for something to eat but we also had all the trees to satisfy those needs! Including the tree of life! In other words, life was good and the good lasted forever just cuz we had confidence in our King. Which is the same picture of paradise that Jesus promised by saying, "seek first His kingdom and His righteousness, and all these things will be given to you as well." Cuz that's still the deal: Give God control and He'll give everything you need!



But, we only get our *best* Christmas *ever* after we *accept* that the BB gun might *not* be a good idea and *trust God* when He says "Let it go."

**So why is it so hard?!** Well, a big reason is Psychological Reactance. Cuz that's what we call **our emotional** *response* **when we sense** a *threat* **to our** *freedom*. It's the idea that we *defy* rules, restrictions, and prohibitions just to *prove we're in control;* regardless of what we *believe.* "I have to wear a seatbelt? No one tells me what to do! I'll show them even if it kills me!" So it takes *deliberate discipline* to *unlearn* the idea that *letting go* means *losing out*. And until then, even the slightest *nudge* can convince us to see *reasonable rules* as *fightin' words!* And our *enemy* knows it:

[Cuz] The serpent was more *crafty* than any of the wild animals the LORD God had made. He said to the woman, [to *encourage* twisting] "Did God *really* say, 'You must not eat from any tree in the garden'?" The woman said to the serpent, "We may eat fruit from the trees in the garden, but God did say, 'You must not eat fruit from the tree that is in the middle of the garden, and you must not touch it, or you will die." "You will *not certainly* die," the serpent said to the woman. "For God knows that when you eat from it your eyes will be opened, and you will be like God, knowing good and evil." — Genesis 3:1-5 NIV

And in an instant, our *flesh's* FOMO was weaponized for *spiritual* warfare; by turning *hunger* to *lust*.

Craftiest of the creatures, indeed! Our healthy hunger becomes life-threatening lust when the feelings of our flesh encourage us to twist the Word of God. And all it takes is a tiny reminder of what God holds back to distract us from what God gives freely.

For everything in the world—the lust of the flesh, the lust of the eyes, and the pride of life—comes not from the Father but from the world. – 1 John 2:16 NIV

So here's the bottom line: We can measure our lives by what we're denied or supplied; but a life measured by what it's missing is hollow while a life measured by what it's filled with is rich. And our perspective is determined by our focus; if we're at the center, our pride points to what we're denied. If God's at the center, our gratitude points us to everything He supplies. And whoever we make our main focus also determines whether we hunger or lust; cuz hunger comes from God and leads us to trust God while lust comes from pride and leads us to challenge God. Which is exactly what happened when we first let the serpent shift our focus.

Now, remember we're sternly warned not to add to God's Word so follow along to keep it clear where my words begin and end; and remember they're food for thought – not food from God:









When the woman saw that the fruit of the tree was good for *food* and pleasing to the eye, and also desirable for gaining wisdom, she [started fixating on it, as the serpent's words began to sink in. "Maybe he had a point; maybe God didn't mean we'd "die" die – maybe He meant our innocence and ignorance would die; cuz we would gain wisdom..." And she took her first step toward the tree. "Maybe He doesn't think we're ready, but wouldn't I know that better?" she pondered as she continued walking, slowly pushing past branches full of perfect peaches and whole trees of ripe avocados. "I mean, He made us hungry, and gave us our taste..." she thought as she bobbed her head to see through the thick clusters of cherries and walnuts. "Maybe He's threatened by the idea...?" she said as she approached the middle of the grove and stood in front of the breathtaking tree of life. "Well, there's only one way to find out if we are missing out." She said as she walked all the way around it to come face to face with the forbidden fruit. And in her last moment of innocence, she thought, "I wonder what knowing evil will taste like?" So she reached out, took some and ate it. She also gave some to her husband, who was with her, and he ate it. Then the eyes of both of them were opened, and they realized they were naked; so they sewed fig leaves together and made coverings for themselves. – Genesis 3:6-7 NIV

Now I don't know exactly how things went down, but I do know being human; and when we're told we can't have that BB gun we want, it's all too easy to let lust rob us of our riches by stealing our attention. Because we can't see what God gives when focused on what we lack. Every other tree God offers just becomes a barrier when we let lust lead us with an ungodly appetite.

And, as George Macdonald reminds us, "There is no heaven with a little hell in it - no plan to retain this or that of the devil in our hearts or our pockets. Out Satan must go, every hair and feather!" So we're all left with the same decision, either we let go of *lust* or God lets go of *us!* 

Like C.S. Lewis says in The Great Divorce "There are only two kinds of people in the end: those who say to God, 'Thy will be done' and those to whom God says, in the end, 'Thy will be done' Because that's our free will; we choose who to follow for our best; ourselves or our Creator. And back in the Garden, we went with our own eyes – even though it risked shooting one out.









And the LORD God said, "The man has now become like one of Us, knowing good and *evil*. He must not be allowed to reach out his hand and take also from the tree of life and eat, and live forever." So the LORD God banished him from the Garden of Eden to work the ground from which he had been taken. After He drove the man out, He placed on the east side of the Garden of Eden cherubim and a flaming sword flashing back and forth to guard the way to the tree of life. — Genesis 3:22-24 NIV

Cuz believe it or not, that was God's only option for an act of love. If we stayed and were allowed to live forever, our perfect paradise would be eternally contaminated with our imperfection, so He had to kick us out until we learned to let go of our self-serving lust and give Him our life-saving trust. And that means pounding one point into our hard heads: Missing out does not mean having less. So, no wonder this lesson is all over life when you start looking! You ever had a desire that you're glad went unfulfilled? Sure you have! We just try to forget them cuz they remind us how dumb we can be. Maybe you wanted to invest in Enron, or get a Def Leppard tattoo, or buy a Blockbuster franchise – it's all like losing your ticket to the Titanic – missing can be a blessing!

Personally, just a few years back, my wife and I worked feverishly to try and sell our house cuz we saw a cheap fixer-upper with *possible* potential to be our dream house. And we thought if we *stretched* finances to the *limit*, committed to *years* of *elbow grease*, and made the *kids wear potato sacks* through high school, we *might* just be able to make it happen. So, it started eating up all our time as we worked to *justify* and *manipulate* the situation, until we finally *admitted* it was *too much*. And we were pretty *deflated*. *Until it sold*. Cuz we heard there ended up being *arsenic* in the *well*, *structural problems*, and *tens* of thousands *more* in *repairs* that were needed just to get it *to code!* So you better *believe* we high-fived and *thanked God* for keeping what we wanted away from us! Cuz we got to experience the antidote to FOMO – GOMO; the Gratitude Of Missing Out!

And GOMO makes life so much more *satisfying* cuz it makes FOMO so much less *threatening!* All it takes is asking in all things: Whose will am I truly pursuing, God's or mine?

[Cuz when it's God's, like Paul, we can say:] I know what it is to be in need, and I know what it is to have plenty. I have learned the secret of being content in any and every situation, whether well fed or hungry, whether living in plenty or in want. [And it all boils down to this:] I can do all this through Him who gives me strength. — Philippians 4:12-13 NIV

Cuz when we have total confidence in our King, we can trust what we're missing is still His blessing. And when our appetite centers on what He offers, our trust overpowers our lust and we're able to see all the fruit in front of our eyes; trees full of love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, self-control. And of course, the one tree that offers the sweet taste of LIFE!

Father God, thank You for loving me in spite of my sin; forgive me and cleanse me by the sacrifice of Your Son, my Savior; and free me and lead me by Your Spirit and Word, as I seek to trust and follow Jesus Christ, as the Lord of my life. Amen.
