So Far, So Good

Regulating Righteousness September 15, 2024

Today we're pursuing the *practices* **that regulate our** *righteousness!* Cuz as Johnny Cash will tell you, it's hard to walk the line – and to set ourselves up for *success*, our *best bet* is daily discipline. Cuz whether it's a *reminder*, a *reward*, or a *reprimand*, *something* has to *motivate* our *heart* to *regulate* our *actions!* So the question is: what's keeping you in line?











Well, whether you're *Christian* or *secular*, it really comes down to *two* forces: love and fear. Cuz we're motivated to both *pursue* what we *love* and *avoid* what we *fear*. And we commonly call these forces the carrot and the *stick*. And *every* day, we *choose* the *actions* that we believe will best help us *reach* a *reward* or *outrun* a *threat*. Which is why *humans* have such a *hard time* handling our relationship with *God*; cuz He can feel like a reward *and* a *threat*. After all, we're *told*:

He wounds, but He also binds up; <u>He injures</u>, but <u>His hands also heal</u>. [And apparently love and fear can go hand in hand:] – Job 5:18 NIV

[Cuz here's how David sees things:] Let those who fear the LORD say: "His love endures forever." – Psalms 118:4 NIV

Well, okay – but usually it's harder to trust the love of someone you fear... kinda seems like it compromises our assessment. Right John?

[Well,] There is no fear in love. But perfect love drives out fear, because fear has to do with punishment. The one who fears is not made perfect in love. -1 John 4:18 NIV

Yeah! That's what I'm saying – real love means total trust! We wouldn't fear someone when we're in love; we'd feel stronger and safer when they're around! Cuz loved ones don't hurt us they help us. Right John?

[Sure!] For God did not send His Son into the world to <u>condemn</u> the world, but to <u>save the</u> world through Him. – John 3:17 NIV

Right! And He saved us cuz He loves us – so what's with all the stuff about love and fear?! Well,

Through <u>love</u> and faithfulness <u>sin is atoned for</u>; through the <u>fear</u> of the LORD <u>evil is avoided</u>. – Proverbs 16:6 NIV

Oh. The love of the Lord saves and the fear of the Lord keeps our love safe? Is that it Paul?

[Yup!] Love must be sincere. Hate what is evil; cling to what is good. – Romans 12:9 NIV

[Cuz that's the Lord's love; and] To fear the LORD is to hate evil; — Proverbs 8:13 NIV

Okay – we're almost there, so what is evil? Well, evil is whatever good isn't, and

Every good and perfect gift is from above, coming down from the Father – James 1:17 NIV

So if it ain't from God, it ain't good. Which means evil is merely the absence of good. That's what we hate! And it's not a thing, it's a lack of a thing. The same way cold isn't a thing – it's just a lack of warmth. And darkness is a lack of light; and death is a lack of life. And since God's love provides the light and life that we crave – hating evil means hating His absence. And fearing the Lord means keeping Him close at all times. Which is a little scary in the traditional sense – cuz there's a lot of stuff down here that tries to get between us to loosen our grip on all His good. So we need to remember it's up to us!



Consider therefore the kindness and sternness of God: sternness to those who fell [away from the goodness of His presence,] but kindness to you, provided that you continue in His kindness. Otherwise, you also will be cut off. [But by who?] – Romans 11:22 NIV



By YOURSELF! Listen, as long as you stay by a fire, you keep warm; it's when you leave that it can't heat you anymore. When we walk away, we cut ourselves off. So the sternness of God is just the freedom to leave Him! Cuz from the beginning, all God has ever given is good – so



When tempted, no one should say, "God is tempting me." For God cannot be tempted by evil, nor does He tempt anyone; but each person is tempted when they are dragged away by their own evil desire for anything apart from what God gives] – James 1:13-14 NIV



Got all that? The *loving* relationship with God that He's been *trying* to *give* us since He *created* us – *is the biggest reward imaginable!* It's like finding out the *richest, kindest,* and *coolest* person on earth wants to *adopt* you, take *care* of you, and *share* their *whole fortune* with you!

He's Daddy Warbucks and we're Annie; He's Willy Wonka and we're Charlie; He's the Father and we're the prodigal son. And the only way to miss out on our incredible reward is choosing to walk away from it. And as crazy as that sounds, that's what we did back in the Garden, that's what we did when Jesus came in person, and that's what we do every day. Cuz every choice that doesn't take us closer to Him, drags us further away.





Every day, when we *choose* any form of *greed* over *giving*, *cruelty* over *kindness*, or *lust* over *love* we're the ones walking *away* from *His riches!* But when the fear of the Lord reminds us to *hate evil*, it automatically keeps us *close* to all the good *in* God's love. And **the closer we** *are*, **the better life** *is.* And like Bruce touched on last week, when we *see* how it all *works*, we *also* see how *prosperity doctrines* get it *all wrong!* **Doing good doesn't** *produce* God's blessing, it merely *permits* God's blessing. Good choices don't *create* prosperity, they *replace* the bad ones that prevented it. Our sin *blocks* us from His *blessing*. So stopping sin just *lets* good *in*.

But because we're so easily enticed it takes daily discipline to just stay the course and reject sin.

[Like Paul says] Do you not know that in a race all the runners run, but only one gets the prize? Run in such a way as to get the prize. Everyone who competes in the games goes into strict training. ... Therefore I do not run like someone running aimlessly; I do not fight like a boxer beating the air. No, I strike a blow to my body and make it my slave so that after I have preached to others, I myself will not be disqualified for the prize. — 1 Corinthians 9:24-27 NIV

Did you notice that Paul's training to win the race was just keeping himself from being disqualified? I mean it sounds like just staying in the race is the big secret to success! And God doesn't really set the bar that low, does He? Does just avoiding evil make us righteous? Well, kinda...



[Remember, hating evil keeps love sincere and] Love does no harm to a neighbor. Therefore love is the fulfillment of the law. – Romans 13:10 NIV



So in a *nutshell*, **we're saved by** *love*, **cuz love keeps us from being unloving**. That is, we can't *not love* – while we're loving. Just like we can't get *cold while* we're by a fire; and **we can't wander from God while we're walking with God**. We can't lose the race while we're in the race.



Little children, let no one deceive you. <u>He who practices righteousness</u> <u>is righteous</u>, just as He is righteous. – 1 John 3:7 NKJ



And if keeping *in* step with *God* keeps us *away* from evil, and *love* is what keeps us *on track*, **reinforcing our** *relationship* **is what regulates our** *righteousness*. But since it takes the *fear* of the Lord for a sincere *love* of the Lord; *how* do we keep ourselves from *falling away* in a *fallen world* full of *enticing evil?* Discipline. *Spiritual disciplines*. They're the **tools that strengthen our loving** *heart* **to weaken our wandering** *eyes*. And they're *simple* things like Bible *reading*, selfless *serving*, *worship*, *fellowship*, *confession*, *submission*, *giving*, and *praying*.

And they all serve the *same* purpose: **spiritual disciplines provide the** *practice* **that** *keeps* **us in the race**. And *they're* incredibly *important* because *it's* incredibly *easy* to get off track, *wander* from our *relationship*, and get *disqualified* from the *prize!* Which is what I discovered years ago when I was trying to understand how prayer *really* works and read a couple *confusing* Scriptures:

[Cuz,] if we know that He hears us—whatever we ask—we know that we have what we asked of Him. [Cuz He's always been trying to give us everything!] – 1 John 5:15 NIV

[And] We know that God does not listen to sinners. [Cuz they wandered away and cut off the communication;] He listens to the godly person who does His will. – John 9:31 NIV

[So, yeah] The prayer of a <u>righteous person</u> is powerful and effective. – James 5:16 NIV

[Because] The LORD is far from the wicked [which makes them hard to hear], but He hears the prayer of the righteous. [Cuz they're always by His side!] – Proverbs 15:29 NIV

[But here's the problem:] "There is no one righteous, not even one; ... for all have sinned and fall short of the glory of God, – Romans 3:10, 23 NIV

Oh dear. I was hoping He wouldn't catch that... So why do we pray at all?! Why are we told to: "Pray without ceasing" [1 Thess 5:17] if none of us are righteous? Well,

Because of the LORD's great *love* we are not consumed, for His *compassions* never fail. <u>They are new every morning</u>; [And even when we wander away,] – Lamentations 3:22-23 NIV

If we <u>confess our sins</u>, He is faithful and just and *will forgive us* our sins and <u>purify us from</u> all unrighteousness. – 1 John 1:9 NIV









So now, you better believe every morning, when I wake up, I use the spiritual disciplines of prayer and *confession* to ask God to forgive me and then *I pray as fast as I can while I'm still righteous!* Cuz it's usually a matter of *minutes* before my mind *wanders*, I become *unrighteous*, and I cut myself off from God! At which point, it's time to confess again! And that's when "Pray without ceasing" started making sense.

It's like the "this many days without an accident" signs that get reset with every mistake – only ours say "this many minutes without a sin"! And here's the encouraging part: God counts our righteousness the way we count sobriety – it's how long you succeed, not how recently you failed. So every time you relapse and restart, you begin 100% righteous and stay that way unless you fall away.

And for every evil that entices us away from God's love there's a spiritual discipline to bring us back. Which is what we talked about last week when Bruce explained how giving overcomes our greed. It's a loving practice that brings us closer to God by replacing a problem that was pulling us away; we can't be greedy while we're giving to the needy!

And like he said, "We're not buying a *blessing*, we're offering tokens of *trust*." Cuz every discipline like *tithing*, *praying*, *worshipping*, and *reading* is meant to merely reinforce the *relationship* that *is* our reward by making us *understand* only *God* has the *authority* and *ability* to give what's *good*.

Which means that fearing and loving the Lord are two sides of the same coin — we're motivated to pursue the good of His presence and to avoid the evil of His absence. And that's just two ways to say the same thing: we need the Lord's love to live the good life! And when we come to understand that His love is openly offered to renew our righteousness each and every minute, life becomes all about letting Him love us! Because we don't earn from God, we learn from God.

We learn how sincere love sustains the righteous relationship that keeps us close to everything good – and away from everything evil. And as we practice that sincere love, we learn we have to restrain our will to retain God's will Because it takes daily disciplines to overcome the daily distractions that get between us and God's love. So if you want to see what life is like when you finally stop blocking God's blessings, find where you wander and regulate your righteousness with the practice that brings you back. Maybe you need to out-give your greed, out-serve your selfishness, or out-worship your worry; I don't know. But I'm pretty sure we all need to out-pray our sin if we want God to help us stay in line, in love, and in the race! So let's pray!

Father God, thank You for loving me in spite of my sin; forgive me and cleanse me by the sacrifice of Your Son, my Savior; and free me and lead me by Your Spirit and Word, as I seek to trust and follow Jesus Christ, as the Lord of my life. Amen.
