
Debt Relief

Feeling the Freedom of Forgiveness September 22, 2024

Today we're talking about the feeling of the freedom of living debt free!







I had this crazy business idea ten years ago. While in Hawaii I saw this red MGA from the Elvis movie, "Blue Hawaii". And then, while running, I saw an exotic car rental lot. And I thought: Rent My Roadster! So I came home and bought one – on credit – just to toy with the idea. And then got a business license, just for fun. And insurance. And a website. And two more cars. And just like that, they owned me!











There's an old Jewish proverb about possessions: The first day they call you master, the second day they call you brother, and the third day they call you slave. Well, I ended up with three masters! And it was the most freeing feeling of a weight lifting, after selling 'em, and then watching the last of 'em drive away. Cuz I was able to repay the HELOC I used to buy 'em. Know what a HELOC is? Home Equity Line of Credit. So easy ... so sneaky. You get a checkbook so you can buy stuff by borrowing against the home you own. Which actually decreases what you own while increasing what you owe. Sin is like that, except with sin, we borrow against life to buy death. Besides Jesus, and the sign above His head, know what else was nailed to that cross? Our debt ... of death. Because: our dirty deeds bury us in debt with no way to repay. But, when you're a believer:

When you were dead in your transgressions ... He made you alive together with Him, having forgiven us all our transgressions, having canceled out the certificate of debt ... having nailed it to the cross. - Colossians 2:13-14 NAS

So we sing our praise cuz He paid our debt and lifted the weight of sin and death, and set us free. When it comes to the enemy, HE-LOCs us in, and throws away the key. But when it comes to the Lord, HE-unLOCks our shackles and throws away the debt! But, how does sin increase our debt? Who do we owe? And why? And, what's it mean to borrow against life? Well, we were given life. We're not self-made, but lovingly created. So we come into this world owing our perfect Creator-Father, perfect love – for Him, and all His creation, under all circumstances, at all times. So:

"Be perfect, therefore, as your heavenly Father is perfect." - Matthew 5:48 NIV

[Just] "Love the Lord your *God* with *all* your *heart* and with *all* your *soul* and with *all* your *mind*. [Cuz that's how *He* loves *you*] ... [And] Love your *neighbor* as *yourself*. [Cuz] *All* the *Law* and the *Prophets* hang on these *two* commandments." – Matthew 22:37-40 NIV

So there you go. We gotta start with what we owe: the only life-giving debt, of love and gratitude. Which is perfectly expressed in total, tireless, devotion. Which is a commitment we gladly make, and happily pay, when we find the love of our life. Like:

Paul, a bond-servant of Christ Jesus [i.e. a slave who chooses a lifetime of service after being set free] ... set apart for the Gospel [lit. Good News] of God – Romans 1:1 NAS





Paul doesn't say he was set apart "from" something, but set apart "for" something. When Shar and I got married, I sure wasn't thinking about the women I was being set apart from! The only thing on my mind was the one I was eagerly, gratefully, joyfully being set apart for! And her, me. And likewise, as the body and bride of Christ, we commit to absolute appreciation and unadulterated love, in all ways at all times. Because, while we were buried in debt, He died for us! He gave everything when we gave nothing. So, when it comes to our heart, we owe Him 100%. And sin is simply the failure to fulfill our obvious obligation.

So, with that 100% in mind, how you doin' on your debts? I confess, literally, I'm in the red on a daily basis. Which is why Jesus offers us the daily forgiveness of our debts in His outline for the perfect daily conversation with our Father. But this isn't referring to the debt of sin that He paid to save us and unite us with our Father. That price was paid just once for all on the cross.

[Because, as the *Scripture* says, that we *often quote*] By *one* sacrifice <u>He has made</u> <u>perfect forever</u> those who are <u>being made holy</u>. – Hebrews 10:14 NIV

In this *manner*, therefore, *pray*: Our *Father* in heaven, hallowed be *Your* name. *Your* kingdom come. *Your* will be done on earth as it is in heaven. Give us *this day* our *daily* bread. And *forgive us* [this *day*] our [daily] *debts*, [in the *very* same *way*, and to the same *degree*] as we forgive [this *day*] our [daily] debtors. — Matthew 6:9-12 NKJ



You see, when we *first* ask Jesus for *forgiveness* for our *sin*, we do so in *order* to *establish* a relationship with *God* as our *Father*. But *then*, *after* we've been *set* (debt) *free*, we approach our *daily debts* differently. Because, *thankfully*, our *daily failures* don't *affect* our *standing* as God's *children*. It's *part* of the *process* of "being made holy". Like with our kids: when we're *disobedient*, He's *still* our *Dad*. Just, *sad*. Because of our *loss* of *closeness* and *harmony* and His *ability* to *bless*. But He's *still* our *Father*, because *defiance* breaks *fellowship*, not *relationship*. Which is why we *daily ask* for our *Father's grace* to *restore* our *harmony*. "Sorry, Dad ..."

But how do we know if we're experiencing the daily debt of God's children, versus the debt of death of the self-deceived, who talk like they're saved but aren't truly sincere? Good question. Here's how to tell: if you're a genuine child of God, you can't sin against Him without feeling the guilt.

And, that's good. Cuz guilt was designed to be painful to compel us to resolve it. Sadly, many try to suppress it, numb it, rationalize it, or run from it. But, healthy guilt is like a warning light.









Picture a pilot trying to ignore a flashing warning signal: just disregarding it, or justifying it, or drinking it away! Well, guilt is our warning that something needs fixing. It's not supposed to stay on! We must fix what's wrong and move on. And with guilt, the only fix is forgiveness. Because that weight only lifts when we live debt free. Otherwise, guilt makes us feel like garbage. And it piles up fast. There's a horribly misogynistic joke by Henny Youngman — I'll tell it just so we can not laugh at it. He said, "My wife ran after the garbage men the other day, yelling, "Am I too late?" And they said, "No, lady. Jump in!" That's very insensitive. As is the one where he says, "I'm not saying my wife's a bad cook, but the flies pitched in to fix a hole in the screen door."

So insensitive. Ever forget garbage day? And you have to wait a whole week! And the cans are full of the old garbage, and it really starts to stink, and you have to stuff in the new garbage. Isn't it great when garbage day comes again? Same with our sin. Only, our heart is the can and every day is garbage day! But what about when we take our daily debts to our Father, and yet struggle with feeling forgiven and cleansed? Which makes it impossible to love ourselves as He loves us. Which makes it impossible to properly love others as we love ourselves. Well, this can only happen to the degree that we are unaware of the four ways that He forgives us.

First: our Father forgives our daily debts INSTANTLY. Know why we have such a hard time trusting this? Cuz it's the opposite way that we offer it! When someone wrongs us, we like to hold it over 'em. We don't want to let 'em off too easy. We want to watch 'em grovel and beg a bit. Cuz we're trying to balance our universe by making them feel the hurt they've caused. But sadly, that act of self-worship sabotages our ability to believe what we've received. Cuz our reluctance to offer impairs our ability to receive. But, remember when the Prodigal Son returns to his Father, ashamed, and stinking like pig slop? He had three things he planned to say:

[I will] say to him: (1) "Father, I have sinned against heaven and against you. (2) I am no longer worthy to be called your son; (3) make me like one of your hired men." ... But while he was still a long way off, his father saw him [cuz he was eagerly waiting and watching] and was filled with compassion for him; [and] he ran to his son, threw his arms around him and kissed him. [Before he had a chance to apologize; so] The son said to him, (1) "Father, I have sinned against heaven and against you. (2) I am no longer worthy to be called your son." But the father [cut him off and] said to his servants, "Quick! Bring the best robe and put it on him." [And said to his son: "You had me at, 'I have sinned""!] — Luke 15:18-22 NIV

And that's Jesus saying that's our Father! The father opens his arms before the son opens his mouth! Know why? Because, our Father wants to forgive more than we want to ask! Which is why:

God demonstrates His own love for us in this: [that] While we were still sinners, Christ died for us. – Romans 5:8 NIV

And just as our *initial*, *once-for-all*, *salvation debt* is *forgiven* the *moment* we *receive* it, **our daily** *relational debts* are *forgotten* the *moment* we *confess* them. Because *secondly*, our Father *forgives* our daily debts *COMPLETELY*. And those who don't *trust* this, are *persistently tempted* to see their *hardships* as kind of God's way of *getting even*. But, He wrote out His promise, saying:

"I will forgive their evildoing AND remember their sin no more." – Jeremiah 31:34 NAB



You see, He permanently deletes every sin that He's cleansed. Not the consequences (cuz we need those), but the damage they'd otherwise do to our relationship. And if God deletes IT, ain't no I.T. gonna recover IT! So, if you get to Heaven and say, "About that sin you forgave ..." He'll cut you off and say: "Forgiven sin? I distinctly remember forgetting that." But, how can this be? Well, think about it: how long do you remember a debt that you've paid? Electric bill. Gas bill. Or whatever. How much was your water bill in June? Once they're paid, we put 'em out of our mind. Know why? Cuz they're paid! They're gone. A debt only exists until it's paid. Then it doesn't even exist. It disappears. "But I return so often with the same stinking struggle." Well then, jump into this third truth: our Father forgives our daily debts REPEATEDLY. Ever feel like He must get tired of hearing us confess the same ol' stuff? Like, "Can't your sin at least be original?" Take heart, from the beginning His kids have always been stubborn in sin. But He knows who's stubborn hearts are His.

They refused to obey ... [and] they rebelled ... But You are a God of forgiveness, always ready to pardon, gracious and merciful ... [which is why, when they abandoned You] You didn't abandon them — Nehemiah 9:17 TLB

How often is He "ready to pardon"? "Always"! Like a mother, her children, and a bathtub. That's yours truly and my sister. The moment I came in from playing in the wrecking yard, mom would say, "Take off your clothes and get in the tub." And she'd take a bar of Lava soap and go to town! Washing His kids' filthy hearts is what He signed up for. He knew it going in. He made us from dust! Our Father never tires of cleansing our sin. Not cuz He's indifferent to it, or undisturbed by it; but He's extremely determined to have an eternal family, and you in it! So, He "made you perfect forever" so He can go to town on "making you holy". So take off your excuses and get in the tub! And finally, since — like children — we have no way to repay, He forgives our daily debts FREELY. Sounds too good to be true. "There's no free lunch." Except with your folks. But true, somebody has to pay. And free forgiveness wasn't cheap. He became like us, in order to die for us, to freely forgive us!

For *all* have *sinned* and *fall short* of the *glory* of God, AND are *justified freely* by His *grace* through the *redemption* that came by *Christ Jesus.* – Romans 3:23-24 NIV

[Which means] If we [simply, humbly, sincerely] confess our sins, He is faithful and just to forgive us our sins and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness. – 1 John 1:9 NKJ



And so, there'll be no begging or bargaining. Receive it or don't, but don't distort it or diminish it by trying to add to it. It's like the Lincoln Memorial. It ain't for sale. And if it was, you couldn't afford it. But if you're a citizen it's already yours. Just for the asking. Just like the freedom of forgiveness.
