

Self Stable

Christian Consistency September 29, 2024

Today we're questioning the consistent qualities at the core of our character – cuz what we find defines who we are and who we are decides everything else! And the best way to see deep down inside ourselves is to carefully consider how we come off to others. Which means, the more fellowship we have, the more simply we can answer this: what makes you, you?



But before we get to *that*, lets play a *game*: I want you to try and name the following (mostly) Disney characters from these simple blocks:





However, in *reality*, **our telling traits aren't physical**, **they're spiritual**. Cuz whether you're *Christian* or *secular*, we all *agree* it's our beliefs and *behaviors* that *tell us* who we *truly are* – because **we're defined by the qualities of our** *character* **that stay the** *same* **despite the** *situation*.



And since those *immaterial* attributes are inherently *invisible*, what's *really* weird is how we're wired to trust our *perception* of the character we *can't* see over the physcal presence of the one we can see. But we do! And we prove it each time we say things like, "You're not acting like yourself" "You feel distant" or "Hello? Is anybody home?" Cuz with each comment we're confirming we know the real you is something separate from what we see.

And since that truth is both *obvious* and *mysterious*, humans have been obsessed with creating *studies*, *philosophies*, and even *movies* that explore the concept. In fact, there's a *list* on IMDB of 158 *body swap* movies *like 13 Going on 30, Freaky Friday*, and *Big* that *all* play off the idea that **what we see isn't always who we** *are*. And in every one *l've* every seen, the *only* way to *sort things out* is finding some *friend* or *family member* who knows the swapped soul *so well* that the *invisible* character they *recognize overrules* the impossible *appearance* they *see*! And that just goes to *prove*: **outside** *perspectives* can be good sources of inside *information! Others* can help *us* see ourselves:

[Cuz] The way of fools seems right to them, but the wise listen to advice. – Proverbs 12:15 NIV

[Since] The heart is deceitful above all things and beyond cure. [So,] Who can understand it? [Well,] "I the LORD search the heart and examine the mind" [But] – Jeremiah 17:9-10 NIV

Now you are the body of Christ, and each one of you is a part of it. - 1 Corinthians 12:27 NIV

Therefore each of you must put off falsehood and <u>speak truthfully to your neighbor</u>, for we are all members of one body. [and should be recognized as one spirit] – Ephesians 4:25 NIV


Because we're recognized by something! You have some character traits hidden in your heart and mind that friends and family use to define you. So if you want to know that you are who you thought you were – it would be wise to hear them out. Find out which one of your qualities is so consistent, that people could use it to recognize you in another body. Ask what could you be reduced to and still be recognized? Is it your specific sense of humor? Your uniquely sincere sympathy? Your particular brand of passion or distinctly different intellect? Really think about it and investigate it; one of the most important questions you can ask is, What are you known for?



Cuz as Christians, we know what we *should* be known for – it's right there in our name: *Christ*-ians; our **consistent quality should be** *Christlikeness*.



[Cuz consistency is part of what makes His quality so recognizable] Jesus Christ is the same yesterday and today and forever. – Hebrews 13:8 NIV





[Cuz that's the key quality] But I fear [says Paul] ... your minds may be corrupted from the simplicity that is in Christ. – 2 Corinthians 11:3 NKJ



[But it really is this simple:] By this everyone will know that you are My disciples, if you love one another." – John 13:35 NIV



We should be known for our love. And Jesus showed what we'd look like if love was the consistent quality that defined us. Meanwhile, others help us see what consistent quality currently does define us. But with those two points, our life's path lights up! Cuz our whole purpose in life is just making our way from where we're at to where we should be. So the way Jesus loves becomes our goal and guiding light.

Every good and perfect gift is from above, coming down from the Father of the heavenly *lights*, who does not change like shifting shadows. – James 1:17 NIV

And don't you just *love* that picture?! The *light* stays the *same* – but depending on *where we are*, it has different *effects*. It can *cast* shadows that *scare* us or *shed light* that surprises us. But as we learn to appreciate all of its *different dimensions*, in the end, the consistent quality becomes *clear:* **light is** *revealing!* And the *more* we *have*, the *better* we can *see* who we're *supposed* to *be*.

Well, *love* works the *same* way. And last week, Bruce's whole message on God's *forgiveness* showed us how *big* just *one effect* of His *love is*. But, *like light*, **the same love** *also* **manifests** in a **multitude of** *other* **ways** like *giving*, *serving*, *listening*, *teaching*, *praying*, and *sharing*. And *without* those loving *beliefs* and *behaviors* that *reveal* our *progress*, things can get *dark!* Like Paul says:

If I <u>speak</u> in the tongues of men or of angels, <u>but do not have love</u>, I am only a resounding gong or a clanging cymbal. If I have the gift of prophecy and can [<u>understand</u>] all mysteries and <u>all knowledge</u>, and if I have a faith that can move mountains, <u>but do not have love</u>, I am <u>nothing</u>. If I <u>give</u> all I possess to the poor and give over my body to <u>hardship</u> that I may boast, <u>but do not have love</u>, I gain nothing. — 1 Corinthians 13:1-3 NIV

Get the picture? Words without love are meaningless. Wisdom without love is foolishness. And works without love are fruitless. So, in short, life lived without love means "You're not acting like yourself" because the real you was meant to live a life full of meaning, understanding, and fruit!

Which means it's imperitive to *confirm* that *love* is at the *core* of our character by *consulting* with *outside* observers. And *that* brings us back to our need for *relationship*, *fellowship*, and *discipleship* to *monitor* what's *manifesting* in the eyes of *others*. Cuz **love must be behind our** *words***,** *wisdom***, and** *works* **to be** *consistent***.**



So ask them, do others SEE the love behind your speech? Remember, words without love are meaningless but words spoken in love leave a mark. Cuz words of love always lead to acts of love. Otherwise, they're empty.



Suppose a brother or a sister is without clothes and daily food. If one of you <u>says</u> to them, "Go in peace; <u>keep warm and well fed," but does nothing</u> about their physical needs, what good is it? – James 2:15-17 NIV



Love gives our words meaning because love stirs us to action. And our action in turn, gives our words power because, talk is cheap on its own, but it packs a punch if it's always associated with action!



Following up and following through with what we say is called integrity and it's a dimension of love that builds the kind of character consistency that is so easy to recognize, the invisible attribute stands out and separates us from the crowd like we're wearing Waldo's wardrobe! So,

Let us not only love with words or speech but with actions and in truth. – 1 John 3:18 NIV

And then check, **do others SEE the love behind your** *beliefs?* Remember, *wisdom* without love is *foolishness* but wisdom *built* on love is *edifying!* Cuz **only love makes** *life* **make** *sense!* As much as we try to deny it, *every* explanation of existence *without* love just makes us sound *stupid!*

We know that "We *all* possess knowledge." But knowledge *puffs up* while love *builds up*. Those who think they *know* something do not yet know as they *ought* to know. But whoever loves God is known by God. -1 Corinthians 8:1-3 NIV

Loving *God* means knowing the love of *God* – and *without* His love to explain why we're here, we turn to *ourselves* for an answer. And when we *do*, people see *pride* in our *perception* and *holes* in our *arguments*. Cuz without *love* as our *foundation*, all the science in the universe can't conceive of a *single* satisfying answer to the *one question* we want more than anything: *WHY?*

But when our beliefs are built on love, our answers aren't elaborate or extravogant, they're simple and succinct. And as this dimension of love manifests as humility, it keeps our character uncomplicated – and reduces what it takes to make us recognizable. Because when there's one basis for everything you believe – the consistentcy of your simplicity is all we need to see to know it's real love behind the wisdom of the real you. So,

Who is <u>wise and understanding</u> among you? Let them <u>show it by their good life, by deeds</u> done in the *humility* that comes from wisdom.— James 3:13 NIV

So then check, do others SEE the love behind your deeds? Remember, works without love are fruitless. But love makes everything we do profitable for everyone involved. Cuz loving feels good and makes good. Even though every loving deed means giving away a piece of ourselves, it also means getting closer to the character of Christ; and



Godliness with contentment is great gain. - 1 Timothy 6:6 NIV

When what we do becomes a function of how we love, our deeds don't just identify us, they connect us and enrich us because they unify us. And as each individual member joins the body of Christ, the riches of God's love are multiplied, not divided.



Jesus came to earth and went to the cross to prove the power of what we do relies entirely on why we do it. And when God's love is the core quality of someone's character, this broken world see their deeds unnatural and unforgettable. So now, if Christians do what we're supposed to, everyone ought to something supernatural in our character — and our lives should feel just like one of those body swap movies. Because as Paul explains:

I no longer live, but Christ lives in me. – Galatians 2:20 NIV

And in *our* movie, our *job* is to reconnect *Christ* with everyone He loves by using *our lives* to show them His *character* lives in *our body*. We're supposed to consistently display Christ's *defining love* until *His* invisible qualities overrule *our* impossible appearance and *they* recognize Christ in *us*.

And that part of our movie is awesome! Just like when Josh convinced his best friend Billy it was him in Tom Hanks' body, it's unbelievably encouraging when someone recognizes Christ in your body. And I'll never forget one of the first times I felt it — cuz I had been a Christian for a few years and really working on keeping my attitude consistent. And one day, I was checking out at Safeway when the checker stopped and said, "Hey, is there any chance you could drive a customer up to O'Reily's to buy a car battery? His car won't start and I know you're a nice guy, so I thought I'd ask." You know I'm a nice guy?! ... It's WORKING! Whatever she saw in our brief encounters was consistent enough to recognize the kindness of Christ — not me — cuz I'm not historically nice at Safeway. But I was so excited to be recognized as nice that I probably scared the guy as I kept smiling, making small talk, and opening his doors. I think I even offered to pay for his battery...

But the point is this: when Jesus is what makes you, you – you get to live a life of love. And only that life is full of meaning, understanding, and fruit. So, if that's your goal, go out and check in to see what others see in you. And if it isn't consistently Christ, watch your words, wisdom, and works to make sure what people see is who you want to be. And to paraphrase Paul, "For heaven's sake, keep it simple stupid!"

Father God, thank You for loving me in spite of my sin; forgive me and cleanse me by the sacrifice of Your Son, my Savior; and free me and lead me by Your Spirit and Word, as I seek to trust and follow Jesus Christ, as the Lord of my life. Amen.
