Do Gooder *The Right to Forgive Wrongdoers* October 6, 2024

Today we're talking about forgiving the ignorant wrong-doers in our lives!

Three years ago, on sermon #900, I told you I was starting a series called "Last 100". Some of you are curious what I might say today – and a bit confused, thinking I called it, "THE Last 100". But I just called it "Last 100". And we *did*! So, I guess *now* we'll *see* if we can last *another* 100.



So let's start #1,000 with a 2-part question: Want to do God's good will? BUT ... also: Want to silence the ignorant talk of foolish people? Well, good news, cuz now you can!

For it *is* God's *will* that <u>by *doing good*</u> you *should* silence the *ignorant* talk of *foolish* people. [So, us *do-gooders* best be *doin' good*!] – 1 Peter 2:15 NIV



When we talked about flexing our faith, we saw how Paul had said:



I am looking for what may be <u>credited to your</u> [spiritual] <u>account</u> ... according to [God's] glorious *riches* in *Christ Jesus.* – Philippians 4:17-19 NIV



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Well, before that, Christ Jesus *challenged* His *followers* when *He* said:

"If you love *those* who love *you*, <u>what credit is that to you</u>? For even sinners love those who love *them*. And if <u>you do good</u> to *those* who <u>do good to you</u>, <u>what credit is that to you</u>? ... But *love* your *enemies*, [which is what it means to] <u>do good</u> ... and your *reward* will be great ... [cuz you'll be just like Jesus] For He is kind to the *unthankful* [ones] and [even to the] evil [ones]. Therefore <u>be</u> <u>merciful</u>, just as your Father also is <u>merciful</u>. – Luke 6:32-36 NKJ

This isn't a suggestion; it's a Last Supper command that Christ orders every follower to follow.

"My commandment [is] that you love one another as I have loved you." – John 15:12 ESV

[And] God shows *His* love for *us* in that *while* we were *still sinners*, Christ *died* for us. ... [For] <u>while we were enemies we were reconciled</u> to God [i.e. reunited, reconnected, and restored in a right relationship] by the death of His Son ... our Lord Jesus Christ, through whom we have now received reconciliation. – Romans 5:8-11 ESV

He even *died* for the *right* to *forgive* those *mocking* Him *as* He died – including that *guy* hanging *next* to Him! And *all* He *demands* of His *followers,* is that *we die* to *self-centered, self-serving, selfishness,* and *live* to *sacrifice love,* to *reconcile our ignorant enemies* to Our Father. Know *why?*

"Because <u>He is kind</u> to the <u>unthankful</u> and <u>evil</u>." – Luke 6:35 NIV

"Therefore, pray: [as Jesus taught the Twelve on the day He deliberately chose a "Judas" as an apprentice] 'Our Father in heaven ... Your will be done on earth as it is in heaven. ... And forgive us [in heaven] our debts, [to You] as we forgive [on earth] our debtors. And do not lead us into [the] temptation, [to trespass against them] but deliver us from the evil one.' [Who trespassed against us] ... For [as Jesus then adds] if you forgive men [on earth] their trespasses, [against you] your heavenly Father will also forgive you. [Notice how "debts" (what we should've done but didn't) becomes "trespasses" (what we shouldn't've done but did); because our debtors likely owe us remorse or repentance or restitution, having trespassed on our heart] But if you do not forgive men their trespasses, neither will your Father forgive your trespasses." – Matthew 6:9-15 NKJ

Not because He doesn't desire it – He died for the right – but He can't, because unforgiveness is a refusal to follow Christ. So His hands are tied. Cuz it's not optional!

If a man *is <u>overtaken</u> in <u>any trespass</u>, you who are <i>spiritual* [rather than *carnal, must*] *restore* [rather than *resent*] such a *one* in a *spirit* of *gentleness*, [all the while] considering *yourself* [and how *you'd* like *your trespasses handled*] lest you *also* be *tempted*. [to *trespass* against *those* who *trespass* against *us*] <u>Bear one another's</u> [trespassing] <u>burdens</u>, and so *fulfill* the *law* of *Christ*. [To be "kind to the evil," to "be merciful, just as your Father is," and to "love others as *I* love *you*"] For if anyone thinks himself to be something, [*spiritual*] when he is *nothing*, [more than *carnal*] he *deceives himself*. ... For *each one* [of His *followers*] *shall bear* his *own load*. [Of the *burden* of the *trespasses* of *others*; so] Do not be [self] *deceived*, God is not *mocked*; for whatever a man *sows*, *that* he will also *reap*. For he who *sows* to [*please*] his *flesh* will *of* the flesh *reap corruption*, [i.e. *death*; *destruction*] but he who *sows* to [*please*] the *Spirit* will *of* the Spirit *reap* everlasting *life*. And [*so*] let us [*do-gooders*] <u>not grow weary while *doing good*, for in *due* season *we* shall *reap* if we do not *lose heart*. – Galatians 6:1-9 NKJ</u>

From the start, God set a seed-sowing, fruit-producing principle in place, to serve throughout Scripture, again and again, as an analogy for true spirituality. In the beginning God said:



"Let there be *trees* that grow *seed-bearing* fruit. The *seeds* will then *produce* the *kinds* of plants and trees from *which* they *came*." – Genesis 1:11 NLT

[And then Jesus said] "You will know [the deceivers] by their fruits. Are grapes gathered from thorn bushes or figs from thistles? Even so, every good tree bears good fruit, but the bad tree bears bad fruit." – Matthew 7:16-17 LSB

It's a *pretty simple* yet *profound principle*. If you plant a carrot *seed*, in *due season* you'll get a *bunch* of *carrots*. Sow corn and you'll *reap ears* for *years*. But he who has *ears* to *hear*, *knows* the *same* goes for *life*. So, **if you want a life that's** *filled* **with** *love*, **you best be** *planting* **a** *lot* **of** *love*. And if you want to be *flowin'* in the *freedom* of *debt-free forgiveness*, you gotta be *sowin'* the *seeds* of *forgiveness*.

And those who are peacemakers [who sow to please the Spirit] will plant seeds of peace and [in due season] reap a harvest of goodness. – James 3:18 NLT

[Can a *fig* tree] *bear* olives, or a grapevine *bear figs*? ... Who is *wise* and *understanding* among you? [The *merciful* who *bear* one another's *burdens*! As *God* shows *His* love] Let *him show* by *good conduct* [on *earth*] ... the *wisdom* that is from [*heaven*] above ... *full* of *mercy* and *good fruits* ... *sown* in *peace* by those who *make peace*. – James 3:12-18 NKJ

[So] "If you have *anything* against *anyone*, [down *here*] *forgive* him, [*his* trespasses] that your Father in *heaven* may also forgive you *your* trespasses. But if *you* do *not* forgive, neither will your Father in *heaven* forgive *your* trespasses." – Mark 11:25-26 NKJ

Cuz you haven't yet died to self, to live for Christ, to reconcile your enemies to God.

Therefore, from now on, we [who sow to please the Spirit] regard no one according to [what pleases] the flesh. [But endeavor to love and restore those who trespass against us; because] ... If anyone is in Christ, he is a new [spiritual] creation; old [carnal] things have passed away; behold, <u>all things have become new</u>. Now [these] all things [new] are of God, who has reconciled us to Himself through Jesus Christ, and has [now] given us the ministry of reconciliation, that is, that God was in Christ reconciling the world to Himself, not [counting] their trespasses [against] them, and has [now commanded us and] committed to us the Word of reconciliation. [Which was? "Father, forgive them." (Lk 23:34)] Now then, we [who plant seeds of peace] are ambassadors for Christ, as though God were pleading [for reconciliation] through us: [and so] we [who sow peace] implore you [who trespass against us, and are freely forgiven by us, and in due season restored to us, as far as it depends on us] on Christ's behalf, [in the same way] be reconciled to God. – 2 Corinthians 5:16-20 NKJ

Because, *forgiveness* is our most *powerful, forceful, God-glorifying witness*. Because, *from* the *beginning*, it was God's *plan* and *purpose* to use *your love* and *mercy* to *represent His*. So:

Even if *you* should *suffer* for what is *right*, you are blessed. ... [Because] It is *better*, if it is God's *will*, to suffer for *doing good* than for *doing evil*. For Christ *died* for [the *right* to *forgive*] sins once for all, the *righteous* for the *unrighteous*, to bring *you* to God. – 1 Peter 3:14-18 NIV

[So] In everything <u>set them an example by doing what is good</u> ... so that those who oppose you may be ashamed because they have nothing bad to say about us. – Titus 2:7-8 NIV



When I became senior pastor in '97, I had a few very vocal detractors who despised my speaking and leadership style, and spread a "prophetic word" that I had a "*Jezebel* spirit" which would *deceive* the church into *false worship;* and a "*Prodigal* spirit" which would *lead* the church into a *pig sty* of *shame.*

And we lost about 600 people. And it was fairly devastating. But how could I argue or rebut their claims? "No I'm not! You have a lying spirit!" So I took the only appropriate stand I could: politely, repeatedly saying: "Time will tell." And it did. And each of them eventually – like years later – admitted their mistake and regret, and confessed their trespasses against me, and offered sincere apologies. And we reconciled. One woman – who I adore to this day – confessed it loudly, in public, when she saw me at the grocery store. And then again, months later, when she bumped into me. And again, months after that; but when she began her third time, I stopped her, put my hands on her shoulders, looked her in the eyes, and said, "I forgive you. I hold nothing against you. We're friends. So don't ever bring this up again." And she hasn't.

It's hard to wait for that "due season" to finally come, but it's so satisfying to see what you sow begin to grow in those so-and-sos! So, "set [them] an example by doing what is good". Like our crucified Commander who washed the feet of His betrayer, just before the cross, and said:

"I have set you an example that you should do as I have done for you." – John 13:15 NIV

[So] Forgive as the Lord forgave you. [Cuz it's not optional] – Colossians 3:13 NIV

For it is God's will that <u>by doing good</u> you should silence the ignorant talk of foolish people. [Not to shut 'em up and shut 'em down or shove it in their face; but to free 'em up with mercy, forgiveness, and grace] ... [In fact] To this you were called, [and commanded as a Christian] because Christ suffered for you, leaving you an example, that you should follow in His steps. ... [Step #1] When they hurled their insults at Him, <u>He did not retaliate</u>; [Step #2] when He suffered, <u>He made no threats</u>. Instead, [Step #3] <u>He entrusted himself to Him who judges justly. – 1 Peter 2:15-23 NIV</u>

So there's forgiveness in a nutshell: don't "retaliate" and don't make "threats" and do "trust" the "Judge". It isn't about downplaying, ignoring, or excusing a wrong; just the opposite. It's about facing and confronting the wrongdoer with compassion. Because, honest to goodness do-gooders don't minimize sin, they neutralize it. To this you were called, cuz to hold a grudge is to judge the Judge. Cuz our struggle to forgive is actually a battle with self-deception and unbelief. And victory can only come if and when we fully put our faith in the only just Judge.



Truth is, **you don't hold a grudge; the grudge holds you.** Talk about a death grip! It robs us of the peace that comes with forgiveness – whether receiving or dispensing it. Cuz there are two big ol' barriers to true and lasting peace. 1) GUILT, which comes from the bad that we do, which I compared to a warning light, and said: the only fix is to receive forgiveness. And 2) RESENTMENT, which comes from the bad that's done to us. And the only fix is to offer forgiveness. So the very best way we can ever pray is to sincerely say to the only just Judge: "forgive us our debts, as we forgive our debtors".

"But how?!" You know how you rehearse a grudge over and over? Well, you get rid of it the same way: you must release a grudge over and over. "But how do I forgive the intentional, inexcusable wounds of those who are dead to me?" Turn it into worship. Don't see it as your generous gift to jerks. See it as: your grateful duty to Jesus. Your Commander and Savior. After all:

When you were *dead* [to *Him*] in [*your*] trespasses ... God made *you alive* [*forever*] *together with* Him, when *He* forgave *us all* our trespasses – Colossians 2:13 NRS

Bring the *focus* back to the *actual battle*: Am I *grateful* enough to *Him* to forgive *them*? Cuz, just as *hurt* people *hurt* people, *forgiven* people *forgive* people. And *so*, if you're *ready* to *sow*:

As far as it depends on you, live at peace with everyone. [By sowing without growing weary] ... If your enemy is hungry, feed him; if he is thirsty, give him something to drink. ... Do not be overcome by evil, but overcome evil with good. – Romans 12:18-21 NIV

Cuz haters gotta hate, and do-gooders gotta do gooder!

Father God, thank You for loving me in spite of my sin; forgive me and cleanse me by the sacrifice of Your Son, my Savior; and free me and lead me by Your Spirit and Word, as I seek to trust and follow Jesus Christ, as the Lord of my life. Amen.
