Selfless Vengeance

Rightly Repaying Our Wrongdoers

Today we're examining the best way to repay our wrongdoers!

Which begins with a most basic question: Are you a fool? I mean, Biblically speaking. In my last "Last 100" sermon, we explored the Scripture that says:



It is God's will that by <u>doing good</u> you should silence the ignorant talk of <u>foolish people</u>. -1 Peter 2:15 NIV



Do you think you are more often in the doing-good-group or the foolish-people-group? To determine that answer, let's first examine this command:



Do not pay anyone back evil for evil, but focus your thoughts on what is right in the sight of all people. If possible, so far as it depends on you, live in peace with all people. Do not take revenge, dear friends, but leave room for God's wrath. For it is written, [in the OT] "Vengeance belongs to Me. I will pay them back, declares the Lord." ... Do not be conquered by evil, but conquer evil with [doing] good. – Romans 12:17-21 ISV

Pretty straightforward. So now let's examine how the Lord defines a fool. You see:

It is to one's honor to avoid strife, but every fool is quick to quarrel. – Proverbs 20:3 NIV

[Cuz] The wise fear the Lord and shun evil, but a fool is hotheaded – Proverbs 14:16 NIV

[Which is why] A fool's wrath is known at once – Proverbs 12:16 NKJ

[Because] A fool finds no pleasure in understanding but delights in airing his own opinions. – Proverbs 18:2 NIV

[Because] The way of a fool seems right to him – Proverbs 12:15 NIV

[Which is why] A fool gives full vent to his anger – Proverbs 29:11 NIV

[The trouble is] He who trusts in his own heart is a fool – Proverbs 28:26 NKJ

[Which is why] The wise of heart [and tame of tongue] will receive commands, [like, "leave room for God's wrath"] but a babbling fool will be ruined. – Proverbs 10:8 NAS

[Because] The mouth of a fool invites ruin. — Proverbs 10:14 NIV

So: Are you a fool? Maybe, sometimes? Well, let's get a grip on it and act accordingly! Because:

A fool's mouth is his undoing, and his lips are a snare to his soul. - Proverbs 18:7 NIV

But what do you do when you're confronted by an opinionated, hotheaded, babbling, fool? The answer to that is found in the form of one of the best little riddles in the Bible.

<u>Do not answer a fool according to his folly</u>, or you will be *like* him yourself. [So] <u>Answer a fool according to his folly</u>, or he will be wise in his own eyes. – Proverbs 26:4-5 NIV

This is such a great little riddle. Are you aware that Proverbs was written to train us ...

To understand a proverb ... [i.e.] the words of the wise and their riddles. – Proverbs 1:5-6 NKJ

So, how should you "answer a fool"? Simple! By "not answering a fool"! Cuz when we're confronted by a fool — as previously defined — not saying what we'd like to say is our only way out.









But it's so hard to hold our tongue and our temper. It isn't that we don't trust the Lord to repay; it's that we don't like the way He repays. Specifically, His patience and kindness and longsuffering. You know those movies where an old gunfighter, living a peaceful life, comes out of retirement to serve up some well-deserved retribution? Well, we kind of wish Jesus would exhibit a little bit of His Old Testament, raining down fire on Sodom and Gomorrah, side, from time to time. In those emotional moments when we've been hurt, we don't want Jesus the Son, as much as we'd like to have Jesus the Kid! But, Jesus the Lord and Savior would say the same thing to us that He said to James and John when they were insulted, by the Samaritan's rejection, and lost their tempers, and said:

"Lord, do You want *us* to command *fire* to come *down* from *heaven* and *consume* them?" But He *turned* and *rebuked them*, and said, "<u>You do not know what *kind* of *spirit* you are *of*; for the *Son* of *Man* did not come to *destroy* men's *lives*, but to *save* them." – Luke 9:54-56 NAS</u>

"Oh. Right." Zeus was the Greco Roman god, well-known in Jesus' day as the "god of thunder". He was often *depicted* with a *raised thunderbolt*, ready to *cast down fire* from the *heavens* to consume *his* enemies without *mercy*. Which is why it's so funny, that:

The *names* of the *twelve* ... [included] *James* and *John* (the sons of *Zebedee*, but Jesus *nicknamed* them "Sons of Thunder") – Mark 3:16-17 NLT

So, who's your father? And how often do you forget what kind of spirit you are of? Because, the way we treat our wrongdoers says a lot about what we think about the Spirit of our Savior.



Remember when Texas Hold'em was all the rage? My son Keaton had big poker games in our garage, for college friends, family, and more than a few of you. And one time, I was at a table with a young, arrogant, sore winner type. And I got a great hand. And he did too. But mine was unbeatable. So I played on his pride and reeled him in, till he went all in, boasting that he knew I was bluffing. So I called, threw down my cards, and said, "In your face!" And his eyes filled with tears, and his lip started quivering, and he sat down in awkward silence in full sight of everyone.

And I suddenly wished either he'd won, or I'd remembered what kind of spirit I was of! How about you? Do you reflexively retaliate? "Aim your high-beams at me, will ya?!" Flash! Flash! "OK then." "Cut me off, will ya?!" Honk! Honk! Tailgate! Hit! Skid! Crash! "OK then." We just wanna teach 'em a little Jesus-the-kid style Bible learnin' – you know:

"Give, and it will be given to you." – Luke 6:38 NIV

And it turns out, our retaliation reflex is actually indicative of an innate, God-created, deeply wired desire for justice ... just mixed in with our sinful, burn-'em-to-the-ground, side. Now, to be honest, I'm not sure if the story I'm about to confess is good, bad, or a messy mix of both.



But, a while back, a hacker took over my Netflix account, and changed the login and email, and two new profiles showed up. A Comcast lady said I'd have to open a new account, and lose my programming info. So I said, "No thanks." She said, "What're you gonna do?" And I said, "Take it back." And I relentlessly harassed the hackers. I routinely changed their profile names to things like, "Jesus sees me" and "I'm sinning" and "Judge me God". Daily I'd open their Continue-Watching list and fast-forward through shows to mess up where they left off. I replaced watch-list movies with similar titles, and added every show about Jesus I could find.

Shar would just *shake* her *head* and say, "How *long* you gonna *do* this?" And I'd say, "Till it's *done*." And *sure* enough, a year-and-a-half later, they *left*. And, you *know*, I kind of *miss* 'em.

Paul is warning us to get as much perspective as possible when he says to "focus your thoughts on what is right in the sight of all people" in order to "leave room for God's wrath" in order to avoid – even escape – acting like a fool. Because, there are only two righteous ways to repay a wrongdoer. We can, 1) Repay them with mercy. If their offense won't cause anyone any further harm, we should try to treat them better than they deserve. You know, "love your enemies" and all that. (Lk 6:27) But when an offense will cause further damage if not dealt with, we must, 2) Repay them with justice. Which means that we treat them as they deserve. So, I leave it to you to decide if the way I handled my hackers was justice – cuz it sure wasn't mercy. Or was it?



Being wired with a deep desire for justice, it rightly feels like the fabric of the space/time continuum will unravel if we allow the wicked to get away with wickedness! And speaking of space/time continuums, who doesn't love the climactic confrontation in Back to the Future, when George McFly, emboldened by a desire to protect the girl in the car, suddenly finds the courage and strength to knock Biff's lights out! But our universal delight comes from seeing the bully get it right in the eye, in a way that's right in the sight of everyone.

I've heard pastors ask: "Who would you rather have settling the score, you or God?" Well, I know I'm supposed to say God, but the evidence sure seems to point toward me! He just doesn't seem to do vengeance very well at all. Because, my goal is usually retaliation, whereas God's goal is always redemption. And that's the difference. He hates employing His own wrath, and only does so as a last resort, and always for the eternal best of all involved.

"As surely as I live," declares the Sovereign Lord, "I take no pleasure in the death of the wicked, but rather that they turn from their ways and live. Turn!" – Ezekiel 33:11 NIV

[You see] [The Lord] is patient with you, [to say the least] not wanting anyone to perish, but everyone to come to repentance. – 2 Peter 3:9 NIV

First of all, then, I *urge* that [requests], prayers, intercessions, and thanksgivings be made <u>for everyone</u> ... so that we may lead a quiet and peaceable life in all godliness and dignity. [Because] <u>This</u> is <u>right</u> ... in the <u>sight</u> of <u>God</u> our <u>Savior</u>, who desires <u>everyone</u> to <u>be saved</u> and to <u>come</u> to the <u>knowledge</u> of the <u>truth</u>. – 1 Timothy 2:1-4 NRS

The Psalmist was looking forward to the righteous Judge and Savior, when he said:



O Lord, the God who *avenges*, O God who *avenges*, shine forth. *Rise up*, O *Judge* of the earth; ... You *fools*, when will you become *wise*? ... *Judgment* will again be *founded* on *righteousness*, and *all* the *upright* in *heart* will *follow* it. – Psalm 94:1-15 NIV

[How much] punishment, do you think, will be deserved by the one who [receives Jesus, but] has spurned the Son of God, [i.e. refused to receive His ways] and has [thus] profaned the blood ... by which he was sanctified, and has outraged the Spirit of grace? [How do you "not know what kind of Spirit you are of"?] For we know Him who said, [to Moses (Deut 32:35-36)] "Vengeance is Mine; I will repay." — Hebrews 10:29-30 ESV

And His name is Jesus! And He avenges with selfless justice, and perfect impartiality, and unconditional love, for the very subjects of His vengeance. Because, His wrath is simply His love in action against a cancer that's killing His creation. So pity the fool, don't act like him!

As far as it depends on you, live at peace with everyone. ... Do not be overcome by evil, but overcome evil with doing good. – Romans 12:18-21 NIV

[Because] He who guards his lips guards his life, but he who speaks rashly will come to ruin. – Proverbs 13:3 NIV

Because, "A fool's wrath is known at once". Because, it's so obviously contaminated with selfishness and sinfulness and short-sightedness; which creates a bitterness that poisons both the believer and those we're called to overcome by winning over by the Spirit of grace. Because, taking revenge — or even just holding a grudge — is an insulting attempt to add to the selfless justice of Jesus the Son, or worse yet, to subtract from His suffering for their sin. Every one of us has been wronged in some way. Many, seriously, by someone who may never apologize. But if you refuse to receive your Savior's ways, by refusing to release your grudge, you'll see Paul's warning, to "leave room for God's wrath", as a burden rather than a relief. But this is our rocksolid assurance that the Rock of our salvation has us covered. Our Savior has spoken! It's time to lay down your arms and take up your cross. Cuz you're free! If you wanna be — from bitterness, resentfulness, and misery! But if you're just a wanna-be, you'll never be. Because, His wrath contains no thirst for revenge. He even offers to pay the penalty himself! And therein lies the immeasurable expanse between a fool's wrath and our Father's.

So, let's not just leave room, let's make room for selfless wrath like that. We'd be fools not to.

Father God, thank You for loving me in spite of my sin; forgive me and cleanse me by the sacrifice of Your Son, my Savior; and free me and lead me by Your Spirit and Word, as I seek to trust and follow Jesus Christ, as the Lord of my life. Amen.
