James' Bond

The Call of Duty and Devotion
December 8, 2024

Today we're gearing up to go way beyond merely believing and serving!











I know He's yours; and what a friend we have in Jesus! But are you His? He was called the Friend of sinners. But, would you be called the friend of the Sinless? It's easy for me to get serving and even studying confused with closeness. It can be. But only intentionally. Because it's so easy for servants to lose sight of the actual objective. Last Sunday, we saw Martha serving Jesus when she should've been sitting to hear Him (like her sister Mary); and then Mary, sitting when she should've been running to see Him (like Martha). And we then saw and heard how our Lord of lords demands we be best of friends. Which entails learning and discerning balancing serving and bonding. Which is why:

Paul, [calls himself] a bondservant of Jesus Christ, – Romans 1:1 NKJ

A bondservant was a slave who'd been set free, but desired to keep serving a loving master and his family, as a faithful friend and an adopted family member. Here are the OT instructions:

If you buy a Hebrew servant [they often sold themselves temporarily to repay a debt] ... in the seventh [year] he shall go out free and pay nothing. — Exodus 21:5-6 NKJ

And when you send him away free ... you shall supply him liberally from your flock, from your threshing floor, and from your winepress. ... [And *if*] [having no *need* to *stay*] he says to you, 'I will *not* go away from you,' because he *loves* you and your house ... you shall take an *awl* and thrust it through [i.e. *pierce*] his ear to the door, and he [by his choice] shall be your servant forever. [Through a bond of love] — Deuteronomy 15:12-17 NKJ



Ever run into an old school teacher, and feel *compelled* to *call* them by their *Mr*. or *Mrs*. name – cuz it feels *weird* to *call* 'em by their *first* name? I've seen my grade-school principle, *Don Zorn* a *number* of times; and I *always* call him *Mr*. *Zorn*. And he *always* tells me to *call* him *Don*. The *last* time I *saw* him, I *reflexively* said "Mr. Zorn!" And he *laughed* and said, "How old *are* you?!"

I guess it's time to grow up and get less formal. Which doesn't mean less respectful, just more relational. When the boys didn't grasp Jesus' teaching, they were afraid to ask Him to explain himself, (Mk 9:32) because they revered Him as the Rabbi/Teacher and Lord/Master, but they didn't relate to Him as the friend of sinners — which was a name given to Him by the Pharisees as an insult. It was most likely triggered by the sinner-dinner hosted by His despised, tax-collecting disciple.

While Jesus was having dinner at Matthew's house, many tax collectors and "sinners" [like harlots and gluttons and drunks; oh my!] came and ate with Him and His disciples. When the Pharisees saw this, they asked His disciples, "Why does your teacher eat with tax collectors and 'sinners'?" ... Jesus said, [Cuz] "It is not the healthy who need a doctor, but the sick. But [why don't you] go and learn what this means: [in Hosea 6:6] 'I desire mercy, not sacrifice.' For I have not come to call the righteous, but sinners." – Matthew 9:10-13 NIV













And it's not merely a call of duty, but first and foremost, devotion. Remember when Jesus chased the sacrificial animals out of the Temple? (Jn 2:14-16) You see, they took pride in pleasing God by honoring their religious duties. But God makes it clear in the verse Jesus quotes, that it isn't the sacrifice that He desires — as though He needs to be appeased — it's the opportunity to show mercy that pleases Him. Which is why the Micah, the prophet quoted in the Nativity story regarding the Messiah's birth in Bethlehem, (Mt 2:5; Mic 5:2) had this to say about the notion of the Lord desiring a sacrifice for its own sake.

Will the Lord be *pleased* with *thousands* of *rams*, with *ten* thousand *rivers* of *oil*? Shall *I* offer *my firstborn* for my *transgression*, the fruit of *MY BODY* for the *sin* of my *soul*? He has *showed* you, O man, what is *good*. [And *pleasing* to the Lord] ... To *act justly* and to *love* [His] *mercy* and to *walk* humbly [showing mercy] with your God. – Micah 6:6-8 NIV

Therefore, when *He* came into the *world*, He said: "Sacrifice and offering You did not desire, but [because You do desire to fully display Your mercy] a BODY You have prepared for ME. In burnt offerings and sacrifices for sin You had no pleasure. [It was all about the occasion they afforded for offering Your mercy] Then I said, 'Behold, I have come— in the volume of the book it is written of Me— to do Your will, O [merciful] God.'"—Hebrews 10:5-7 NKJ

That's Psalm 40:6-8, with a *twist*. The line "a *body* You have *prepared* for Me," is *way different* from the *original*. Not even *close*. Cuz it's *revealing* the *way* His *body* was *prepared*: "<u>My ears You have *opened*</u>"; literally: *pierced*. Because *God* the *Son* not only became a *man* – He became a *bondservant*. And since *we've* now been *prepared* as His *body*:

Let this mind be in you which was also in Christ Jesus, who, being in the form of God, [obviously] did not consider it robbery to be equal with God, but [still] made Himself of no reputation, [among the religious rulers, by] taking the form of a bondservant, and coming in the likeness of men. And being found in appearance as a man, [those in power wouldn't believe that God would become flesh; so] He [1] humbled Himself [as a bondservant of God] and [2] became obedient [to the Father's will] to the point of death, [to display His mercy] even the death of the cross. — Philippians 2:5-8 NKJ

For [as prophesied in Psalm 22:16] dogs have surrounded Me; the congregation of the wicked has enclosed Me. [And] They pierced My hands and My feet – Psalm 22:16 NKJ

And so, at Matthew's *sinner dinner*, He said, "go and *learn* what this *means*: 'I desire *mercy*, not sacrifice". Because **He** *prefers* **to** *hang* with *those* who are *aware* of their *sin*, and *aren't* afraid to get *real* with Him, and actually *enjoy* spending time with Him to deepen their devotion to Him.

No matter how far they have to go. So when those religious rulers tried to soil Him by His sinful associations, He called 'em on it, in front of a multitude of those listening to Him.

"The Son of Man came eating and drinking, and they say, 'Here is a *glutton* and a *drunkard*, a *friend* of tax collectors and *sinners*.' [Well they got it *half* right] But *wisdom* is proved *right* by her *actions*." [Not *words*] – Matthew 11:19 NIV

[And] Jesus [later] said to them, "I tell you the *truth*, the *tax collectors* and the *prostitutes* are entering the kingdom of God [way] ahead of you." – Matthew 21:31 NIV

They don't claim He's a friend to sinners. He is of course. But that's benevolent, and doesn't make their case. They're saying, "He's a friend of sinners. It's not benevolence. He likes 'em hanging around." And they obliviously spoke a profound truth: He likes to hang with the likes of us. So much so, that He hung for us, as a bondservant devoted to the duty of mercy.



[And, as a result] We were restored to friendship with God by the death of His Son – Romans 5:10 NLT

Because our *Creator not only* wants to be our *friend* as *Savior*, but as everlasting *Father* as *well!* "The Message" paraphrases it *this* way:

Now that we have actually received this amazing friendship with God, we are no longer content to simply say it in plodding prose. We sing and shout our praises to God through Jesus, the Messiah! – Romans 5:10 TMNT

We sing about His devotion to us, but would we have reason enough to sing about your devotion to Him? Let that soak in. We're called to friendship with God, by His grace, through our faith, in His sacrifice for our sin. Which is why, the night before the cross, He, now so famously, said:

"I no *longer* call you servants, *because* a master doesn't *confide* in his servants. *Now* you are My *friends*, since I have told you everything the Father told Me." – John 15:14-16 NIV

God wants us to go from a servant level of doing our duty because He commands it, to a companion level of motivation that comes from understanding and agreeing with His heart. The goal is for a deep sense of relational collaboration that supersedes a shallow sense of religious duty, so that our motivation for obedience will become less and less as oblivious servant, and more and more as intimate friend. Mercy over formality! Because the moment His best desire becomes our best desire, we become best friends. As believers, we can confuse belief-based actions with bonding, becoming skilled in doing our duty and serving, while remaining unskilled in deepening our devotion and bonding. Martha opened her home; but Mary opened her ears. And then Martha opened her mouth!

And she went up to Him and said, "Lord, do You not care that my sister has left me to serve alone? Tell her then to help me." But the Lord answered her, "Martha, Martha, you are anxious and troubled about many things, [that seem so necessary] but [when "you are anxious and troubled," only] one thing is [actually] necessary. [And] Mary has chosen the good portion, which will not be taken away from her." — Luke 10:40-42 ESV

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What'd she choose? To ignore the distractions rather than Jesus. And she also chose listening like an admiring ally rather than serving like an annoying adversary. Friends certainly serve friends. But Martha was working herself into a lather! While Mary was grounding herself.

[Because] He alone is my Rock and my salvation; He is my fortress, I will not be shaken. ... [If you] Trust in Him at all times ... [and] pour out your hearts to Him – Psalm 62:6-8 NIV



Closeness with Christ is by choice, not accident. One of life's great joys is when children mature. And mother-or-father and daughter-or-son grow from a parent-child relationship, into a blossoming friendship. Our Father not only shares that desire, and feels that joy, He created us in order to grow in closeness with us. Which requires something deeper than a daily devotional. Because, He deserves to be more than a scheduled appointment. If devotions feel like a chore, you're doing it wrong. Because, Jesus isn't a job. There's no angel waiting in the wings to stamp your spiritual time card. The righteous serve from the heart, because, "we were restored to friendship with God by the death of His Son," (Rom 5:10) which makes it a bond of love of the highest order. Like:

James, a bond-servant of God [the Father] and of the Lord Jesus Christ – James 1:1 NAS

That's right, we need James' bond! The operative difference being, that:

The righteous will never be shaken – Psalm 112:6 NIV

There's a big difference between believing and bonding. Even the demons believe. (Jms 2:19) But only the likeminded bond. Quick test: When others wrong you, but then make amends, do you delight more in the apology or the opportunity to forgive? We'll work on it.

For judgment is without mercy to the one who has shown no [desire to show] mercy.

[And showing] Mercy [clearly] triumphs over [receiving] judgment. – James 2:12-13 NKJ

There's a misconception that spending time with God means being alone with God. But that's not how real friendships work. And I'm pretty sure He likes to get out of the house. So, we can't stop talking when we start working or playing. I'd much rather share an experience with someone, or sit in relaxed silence, than force awkward conversation. When we're told to:

Pray continually ... for this is God's will for you – 1 Thessalonians 5:17-18 NIV

We're not talking about what we think of as formal prayers. Thank the Lord! I'm not wired for lengthy talking-prayer. I get too antsy. And I run out of things to say. He just wants constant, open, communication. The more casual and normal the better. He's not looking for a quota, just a chance to speak. But it's a balance. Because our friendship can't come at the expense of our reverence. We can't allow our familiarity to displace His authority as our Lord and Creator.

Friendship with God is reserved for those who reverence Him. – Psalm 25:14 TLB

Just don't call Him Mr. Christ.

Father God, thank You for loving me in spite of my sin; forgive me and cleanse me by the sacrifice of Your Son, my Savior; and free me and lead me by Your Spirit and Word, as I seek to trust and follow Jesus Christ, as the Lord of my life. Amen.
