Spoiler Alert

Spotting Sin's Forbidden Fruit

Today we're learning to recognize how sin can subtly spoil our spiritual growth – cuz we need to practice being proactive if we want to protect our spiritual produce. So, as we approach a new year and ponder all the positive changes we want to make, it's equally important to prepare for all the potential errors we want to avoid. And one of the most important parts of spiritual quality control is learning to identify imposters; aka fake fruit. Cuz if one bad apple can ruin the whole bunch, we should be constantly questioning: Does your fruit taste as good as it looks?









Cuz God doesn't care about appearances — He's all about substance, since, as we all know, looks can be deceiving. I mean, just consider the manchineel. By all accounts, the appearance is that of a juicy apple — and in fact, the first bite is delightfully sweet — however, within minutes of eating, the manchineel causes intense throat swelling, mouth blistering, and severe digestive issues. And just touching its leaves or sap can cause skin lesions, while burning them creates a smoke that can cause temporary blindness. Which is why local populations simply refer to it as the "Death Apple."

Because, everything about it screams "apple" – except for the whole "might kill you" thing. Which just goes to show, it's deadly important to discern the real deal! And to separate these fatal fruits from the valuable variety – we need to discern the subtle differences below the surface to catch the counterfeit before it does damage. And that same quality control applies to our spiritual fruit because the fatal fakes are only found out when we look inside, since, as we all know, being superficial is super easy! And even if it isn't entirely intentional, we can wind up living a life that looks sweet but leads to death! Like Paul says:

My conscience is clear, but that does not make me innocent. – 1 Corinthians 4:4 NIV

[So,] Be very careful, then, how you live – not as unwise but as wise [aka]... be filled with the Spirit, [since that's the seed we need to produce good fruit!]- Ephesians 5:15, 18 NIV

[Cuz,] Each tree is recognized by its own fruit. ... [Which means] A good man brings good things out of the good stored up in his heart, and an evil man brings evil things out of the evil stored up in his heart. For the mouth speaks what the heart is full of. – Luke 6:43-45 NIV

[So if it's full of the Spirit you'll see] The fruit of the Spirit is [a mouth full of] love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness, self-control – Galatians 5:22-23 ESV

However, there's another whole crop called the fruit of the flesh – pride, greed, lust, envy, gluttony, anger, and laziness; and although they may appear identical, these bad apples can kill as they fill!

So, before aiming for the "new you" you want to produce in the new year, we're gonna take a closer look at the subtle differences between the juicy fruit of the Spirit and the fatal fruit of the flesh so we can spot the rotten stuff before it affects the heart of our whole tree, cuz:

There is a way that appears to be right, but in the end it leads to death. – Proverbs 14:12 NIV

[Since] The heart is deceitful above all things and beyond cure. – Jeremiah 17:9 NIV

[So,] Above all else, *quard* your heart, for everything you do flows from it. – Proverbs 4:23 NIV



So, let's take a look: how's the crop of faithfulness and Self-control you've been cultivating? Cuz if they're not pointed in the right direction, you might be mistakenly growing poisonous Pride! And detecting the difference can hurt like the rich young ruler who asked:



"What must I do to inherit eternal life?" ... [cuz] Jesus answered ... "You know the commandments" ... "All these I have kept since I was a boy..." [Well, there's] "One thing you lack," [Jesus] said. "Go, sell everything you have and give to the poor ... Then come, follow Me." – Mark 10:17-21 NIV



Jesus exposes the *root* of *this fruit* by asking the *convicting* question: "Are you focused on *rules* or *relationships*?" Cuz only *relationships* can reveal if you have the real seeds in your heart since *real* faithfulness is focused on *others* not *ourselves*.

In fact, many people use rules to fake the personal appearance of both self-control and faithfulness to hide the self-serving and poisonous pride just beneath the surface! Cuz using self-control to serve, trust, and follow others is faithfulness but aiming the same serving, trusting, and following at ourselves is called pride! So keep your faith pride-free by focusing on the other side of relationships,

[Cuz] The only thing that counts is faith expressing itself through love. – Galatians 5:6 NIV

Now how about your goodness? Are you sure that's what you got growing? Well, let's check: when does good stop being good? When it overwhelms cuz we overdo it. As the expression goes, too much of a good thing can be a bad thing! Just ask anyone who, like me, has an addictive personality and they'll tell you the best stuff in their life is the most dangerous — cuz each taste of good may actually be a seed of greed! It's why I have to be super careful around video games, fantasy football, and playing the stock market — if a little is good, then my flesh says "All of it, all the time must be great!" And even the godliest pursuits can become poisonous fruits if we focus on accumulating over appreciating. Like we're warned in Proverbs:

If you find honey, eat just enough— too much of it, and you will vomit. – Proverbs 25:16 NIV

So, if you want to keep your *goodness* growing without the threat of greed's *false* fruit, **our heart must be set on** *professing* **good over** *possessing* **good.** And that means praying this *tough* prayer:

Give me neither poverty *nor riches*, but give me *only* my daily bread. Otherwise, <u>I may have too much and disown You</u> and say, 'Who is the LORD?' – Proverbs 30:9 NIV





And in the same vein, we need to take a real close look at the spiritual fruit of love to make sure it's not the fleshly fruit of lust in disguise. After all, on the surface, they're both just words for our feelings of desire — but the deadly difference can be seen by the appetite each fruit tries to satisfy. And since lust is a worldly desire it can only satisfy worldly appetites — which always come back to keep us in a cycle of insatiable hungers. Whereas love feeds a higher, spiritual desire to satisfy our spiritual appetite for the perfection that puts an end to all earthly appetites! That is, lust offers temporary gratification but love provides permanent edification. And true love comes from God

For everything in the world—the lust of the flesh, the lust of the eyes, and the pride of life—comes not from the Father but from the *world*. The world and its desires pass away, but whoever does the will of God lives forever. [And His will is our love] – 1 John 2:16-17 NIV

Because the *Spirit* intercedes for God's people in *accordance* with *the will of God*. And we know that in all things God works for the good of those who *love Him* – Romans 8:27-28 NIV

And then there's the fruit of kindness that grows close to sincere love — because it's aim is to build up all brothers and sisters with encouragement and compassion. Like Paul says:



Make my joy complete by being like-minded, having the same love, being one in spirit ... Do nothing out of selfish ambition or vain conceit. Rather, in humility value others above yourselves, not looking to your own interests but ... the interests of the others. – Philippians 2:2-4 NIV



And although *kindness* is expressed in *humility*, the more we *elevate* others, the more we may *accidentally* produce the *fleshly* fruit of envy! Cuz **there's a thin line between** *building up* **and** *putting on a pedestal*; and every *kind* word can *become* an act of *envy* if we forget that all humans are *imperfect* and our only *real value* comes as kids of the King!

[So,] Be kind and compassionate to one another, forgiving each other, just as in Christ God forgave you. – Ephesians 4:32 NIV



Cuz that's the unified equality that leads to the spiritual joy that Paul references. But is that the kind of joy your life is producing? Cuz joy is meant to strengthen and uplift believers as we encounter moments that echo the perfect life yet to come — but joy is not meant to advertise what this life has to offer — cuz that thought grows into gluttony.

For the [perfect] kingdom of God is *not* a matter of *eating* and *drinking*, but of righteousness, peace and joy *in the Holy Spirit* – Romans 14:17 NIV

You ever notice how hard everyone works to *find* joy and how *seldom* they *get it?* That's cuz **true joy is a spiritual** *import* **from the spiritual** *realm* — and when we try to equate it with an *earthly* experience, we perceive it as *pleasure* and reduce it to a commodity. And excessive pursuit of earthly *pleasure* is the poison we call *gluttony*. And as much as we try to *deny* it, all of human history has proven **earthly indulgence only leads to ruin**.

True joy is just a taste of true life and until we learn to enjoy the encouragement of anticipation, gluttony grows as an obsessive pursuit of earthly pleasure.

And then there's the *spiritual* fruit peace. Which is frequently *confused* with the flesh's *fatal* fruit anger. Which seems *weird* cuz they *feel* like polar *opposites* – but, like the ol "death apple" – *we* can't *see* the difference on the *surface*. Which is *embarrassing* since our world calls this a peacemaker. Cuz down *here*, we think peace means *identifying* and *eliminating* opposition.

[But] Everyone should be quick to *listen*, slow to *speak* and slow to become *angry*, because *human* anger does not produce the righteousness that God desires. – James 1:19-20 NIV







Angry acts of opposition only produce true peace when they promote God's perfect plan – but since we don't have that perfect perspective, our anger usually causes more harm than harmony. So if you find yourself frequently raising your voice in an effort to produce spiritual peace – stop and ask yourself if your approach really brought understanding, reconciliation, and unity to everyone involved. Cuz that's the only way we can be sure we followed our command to

Be completely humble and gentle; [and to] be <u>patient</u>, bearing with one another in *love*. [Cuz that's how we] Make every effort to <u>keep the unity</u> of the Spirit through the bond of <u>peace</u>. – Ephesians 4:2-3 NIV

And human *anger* may not be a *spiritual* fruit that grows *with* the *peace* we want to produce, but **both human gentleness and patience** *are!*

Yet, even these easy-going *fruits* are easy to *confuse* with the flesh's sinful fruit called laziness! Cuz like we just read, **gentleness and patience are meant to** *foster unity*, **not** *excuse us* **from getting** *involved*. Both fruits are aimed at being *actively* engaging but focused on recognizing *God's timing* to have the maximum impact He intended. It's only the *fleshly* fruit of laziness that *avoids responsibility* by projecting *patience* over its *complacency* and *gentleness* over its *lethargy*.

So, if you want to make sure you're growing real gentleness and patience this year, take a look at the people in your life and ask yourself how often you're involved. Because all spiritual fruits require relationships to grow. And only fruits of the flesh can grow alone. So get out there —

For the Spirit God gave us does *not* make us *timid*, but gives us *power*, *love* and *self-discipline*. – 2 Timothy 1:7 NIV

Use it or lose it! Cuz if that Spirit is growing in your heart, you should experience an abundance of love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, and self-control – and if not you'll live a life with more and more pride, greed, lust, envy, gluttony, anger, and laziness.

Just remember, sinful fruit survives by disguising itself as spiritual – but counterfeits are easily exposed when we take the time to look beneath the surface by examining the true impact of our actions. And I don't know about you – but I'd sure like to know what I got growing in my heart before it's time for the big taste test that reveals whether we've grown a tree of life – or death!
