Rest Op.

Arresting a Restless Heart January 19, 2025

Today we'll see how to sooth and quiet our cranky, tuckered out souls!











Last Sunday, Noah talked about the need for rest; and I want to pick up on that, because rest can be so easily misunderstood. Because rest requires hard work. Because, it's not easy to take it easy. That great Jewish theologian, Jerry Seinfeld said: It's so much work to get a family in a car for a vacation. I pack everything up, get everything set, get the kids in their car seats, and close the door for my wife on the passenger side, and ... I slowly walk around the car to the driver's side ... and that's my vacation. Every feel that way throughout your day? Question is: What's your resting heart rate? On a scale of one to ten, how would you rate your heart's ability to rest in Christ on a daily basis, and especially in the midst of the storms of life? Jesus said:

"Come to Me, [in His Word] all you who are weary and burdened, and I will give you rest. [But, you'll have to make the effort to] Take My yoke [the collar that joins two beasts of burden] upon you and learn from Me, for [unlike your grumpy, fussy, colicky nature] I am gentle [calm and collected] and humble in heart, [content and secure without being prideful] and [that'll take effort on your part; but] you will find rest for your souls. For My yoke is easy and My burden is light." – Matthew 11:28-30 NIV

But, it takes a lot of effort to take a load off. Especially for the weary. Cuz it can seem like more work. Because true rest isn't something you just decide to have; it's something you have to seek and find – because, it's only found in the Lord as His Word rests in our heart. In fact, as we load in His words, He unloads the stresses and worries and anxieties of this ol' world. Because we're able to hear His voice, which comforts and encourages and, quite often, talks us off the ledge.

[Because] It is for freedom that Christ has set us free. [No hidden agenda, deceitful desires, or corrupt motives as it is with the ways of the world; so] Stand firm, then, [in your freedom] and do not let yourselves be <u>burdened</u> again by a yoke of slavery [to sin that flourishes in ignorance to truth]. – Galatians 5:1 NIV

No longer walk as the rest ... alienated from the life of God, because of the ignorance that is in them, because of the blindness of their heart ... if indeed you have heard Him [for yourself in His Word] and have [actually] been taught by Him, [to be just like Him] as the truth is in Jesus ... [so] be renewed in the spirit of your mind — Ephesians 4:23 NKJ

[Because] Jesus said, "If you hold to My teaching, [lit. My Word] you are really My disciples. Then you will know the truth, and the truth will set you free." – John 8:31-32 NIV

From the burden of the bondage of the yoke of slavery to sin, that comes from the ignorance within.

Therefore, laying aside [the yoke of the burden of the bondage to] all malice, all deceit, hypocrisy, envy, and all evil speaking, as newborn babes, [in Christ] desire the pure milk of the Word, that you may grow thereby – 1 Peter 2:1-3 NKJ

You see, the key is in the growing in the likeness of Jesus. The Son of David. (Mt 1:1) And what's the light burden placed on His shoulders like an easy yoke? I think it's the "key of David"

He who has an ear, let him hear what the Spirit says ... These things says He who is holy, He who is true, He who has the key of David – Revelation 3:6-7 NKJ

Over and over, as Jesus taught, He would call out, "He who has an ear, let him hear" Any idea what He's referring to here? One OT verse. Ezekiel 3:10, wherein God says:

"Receive into your heart all My words ... and hear with your ears." - Ezekiel 3:10 NKJ

And, in the case of the key of David, I think He wants us to hear what Isaiah prophesied; that:

The key of the house of David I will lay on his shoulder – Isaiah 22:22 NKJ



That's an easy yoke and a light burden! Even Job (31:35-36) said he'd carry the Almighty's book on his shoulder. So, does David offer a key that offers "rest for your soul" to the "gentle and humble in heart"? Yep! It's a recurring theme in the Psalms, and especially Psalm 131, in a prayer, wherein he says:

Lord, my heart is not proud [it's humble] ... nor do I involve myself in great matters, [beyond my control] or in things too difficult for me [to comprehend]. [And thus] I have certainly soothed and quieted my soul; like a weaned child resting against his mother, my soul within me is like a weaned child. — Psalm 131:1-2 NAS

A believer begins by desiring the milk of the Word; but the key is in the growing. Paul writes:

I could not address you [Corinthian believers] as <u>spiritual</u> but as <u>worldly</u> [believers] — mere <u>infants</u> in <u>Christ</u>. [So] I gave you <u>milk</u>, not <u>solid food</u>, for you were not yet ready for it. Indeed, you are <u>still not ready</u>. [Are you?] — 1 Corinthians 3:1-2 NIV

[You need] the <u>elementary truths</u> of God's Word all <u>over again</u>. You need <u>milk</u>, not <u>solid</u> <u>food</u>! [Which is sad, because] Anyone who <u>lives on milk</u>, ["the <u>elementary truths"</u>] being still an <u>[un-weaned, rattled]</u> infant, is not acquainted with [the <u>rest</u> that <u>comes</u> with <u>learning</u> and <u>living</u>] the <u>teaching</u> about <u>righteousness</u>. [i.e. being <u>gentle</u> and <u>humble</u> in <u>heart</u>] But <u>solid food</u> [beyond God's baby food] is for the <u>mature</u>, who <u>by constant use</u> have <u>trained themselves</u> to <u>distinguish good</u> from <u>evil.</u> — Hebrews 5:11-14 NIV

So the question is: **How hard do you work at resting in Christ?** And *that's* a serious question.

Since the promise of *entering* His *rest* still *stands*, let ... *none* of you be *found* to have *fallen short* ... for anyone who enters *God's rest* <u>also rests from his own work</u>, just <u>as God did</u> <u>from His</u>. [Which is *more* about His <u>ongoing work</u>] Let us, therefore, <u>make every effort to enter that rest</u> ... For [it's *found* in] the *Word* of God [which] is *living* and <u>active</u>. [Even <u>as it's resting</u>] ... [judging] the thoughts and attitudes of the heart. – Hebrews 4:1-12 NIV

And that's a good thing for those who want a gentle and humble heart (like Jesus) that produces the thoughts and attitudes of a soothed and quieted soul at rest (like David). Whereas, the *rattled* hearts of the Pharisees were on full display every time Jesus healed someone on a Sabbath – the Day of Rest.

So, because Jesus was [purposely] doing these things on the *Sabbath*, the Jews persecuted him. [And while the religious rulers were *feigning judgmental vapors*] Jesus said to them, "My Father is *always at His work* to this *very* day, and [so] I, too, am working." [And they *fainted* from the *shock!*] – John 5:16-17 NIV




Now, not to get *religious*, but *how* is "the Lord of the Sabbath" (Lk 6:5) *not violating* His *own* Sabbath? Well, because of the *exception* that *proves* His *rule*.



He said to them, "What man is there among you who has *one sheep*, and if it *falls into a pit on the Sabbath*, will not lay hold of it and *lift it out?* [He made the *same point* a week before, but with a *donkey*. (Luke 14:3-5) So, just *pick* the *one* that *fits* you *best*] ... Therefore it is *lawful* to do good [no matter how much *effort* it takes] on the *Sabbath*." — Matthew 12:11-12 NKJ







[And, believe it or not, it was] For this reason the Jews tried all the harder to kill Him; not only was He breaking the Sabbath [according to their own religious rules], but He was even calling God His own Father, making Himself equal with God. [So] Jesus gave them this answer: "I tell you the truth, the Son can do nothing by Himself; He can do only what He sees His Father doing ... For just as the Father raises the dead [from the grave] and gives them life, even so the Son gives life – John 5:18-21 NIV

To those *dead* in *sin*. Cuz on the *cross*, on the Sabbath, Father and Son worked as One, to lift everyone from the bottomless pit of sin and death. Jesus said as much beforehand, declaring:

"When I am lifted up from the earth, [I] will draw all people [up] to myself." He said this to show by what kind of death He was going to die. – John 12:32-33 ESV

He's obviously not saying He'll draw all people to Himself on the cross. He just left out the part about rising, and redeeming, and rescuing (all who'll let Him) from the pit. Starting with all who died before Him, and were waiting for Him to join them; because they were the first to find out first hand, that when Jesus said, "It is finished", He was just getting started! Because after that:

The tombs broke open and the bodies of many holy people who had died were raised [from the literal pit of death] to life. — Matthew 27:52 NIV

In the OT, the Messiah is often pictured as God's Arm stretched out to save.

And I will redeem you with an outstretched arm - Exodus 6:6 ESV

"Why, [then] when I called, [you to come to Me and learn from Me] was there none to answer? Is My hand shortened at all that it cannot redeem? Or have I no power to deliver?" [From whatever pit you're in down here] – Isaiah 50:2 NKJ

Ah, Lord God! Behold, You have made the heavens and the earth by [Jesus (according to Colossians 1:16) a.k.a.] Your great power and outstretched Arm. [Therefore] There is nothing too hard for You. – Jeremiah 32:17 NKJ

[So why does Isaiah say] Awake, awake, put on strength, O Arm of the Lord ... [For] There is none to guide [the people of Jerusalem] among all the sons she has borne; there is none to take her by the hand — Isaiah 51:9, 18 ESV



Awake?! Did Jesus fall asleep on the job? I almost made this the opening question. Because the answer is ... Yes! He did! He fell asleep on the job! Remember when Lazarus was in the tomb for four days, before Jesus said:



"Our friend Lazarus has <u>fallen asleep</u>; but I am going there to <u>wake him up</u>." His disciples replied, "Lord, [there's no need for that] if he <u>sleeps</u>, he will get <u>better</u>." ... So then He told them plainly, "Lazarus is <u>dead</u>" – John 11:11-14 NIV



He caused the same confusion with those mourning the death of a little girl.



"The child is not dead, but <u>sleeping</u>." [Again, she's dead. But that's His term for temporarily dead a.k.a. mostly dead] And they ridiculed Him. ... [till] He <u>took</u> the child by the hand, and said ... "[Little girl] <u>arise</u>." [And pulled her up from the pit] — Mark 5:39-41 NKJ



In the beginning, when He finished His work of creation, He could rest. Cuz it was done. And on the cross, when He finished His work of redemption, we can rest. Cuz it's done. You see, the Pharisees weren't resting at all on the Sabbath; they were working at earning spiritual points by means of a rule-heavy, religiously burdensome system that wore everyone out! Cuz that's our nature.

So we should make every effort to rest in God's grace, by renewing our mind with His Word. (Rom 12:2) Ever try to lay hold of a sheep? Let alone lift it. They're about as keen on cooperating as a stubborn donkey. Likewise, it takes a lot of effort to resist our own nature, and trust and relax and surrender and cooperate. On the other hand, ever pick up and hold a weary puppy? We need to learn to be like that: content doing what we can, while letting go of trying to control what we can't, by trusting in the gentle hands of His outstretched arms.

Therefore, my dear friends [writes Paul] ... continue to work out your salvation with fear and trembling, for it is God who works in you – Philippians 2:12-13 NIV

To make your cranky, colicky heart, gentle and humble like His. And that, no doubt, will be a real workout! Because, true rest comes down to restoration. Which comes down to allowing the Lord to work in you. Which comes down to doing His will. Which comes down to knowing His heart. Which comes down to hearing His voice. Which comes down to making every effort to enter His rest ... the rest of your life. Because, that's what He came down to do.

Father God, thank You for loving me in spite of my sin; forgive me and cleanse me by the sacrifice of Your Son, my Savior; and free me and lead me by Your Spirit and Word, as I seek to trust and follow Jesus Christ, as the Lord of my life. Amen.
