Gas Bags



Shrinkable, Stretchable, and Sincere February 16, 2025

Today we're looking at life to see if Christ is present, prominent, or preeminent.

So: **How well is Jesus fitting into your life?** Trick question. If you're trying to fit Jesus into your life, you're doing it wrong. You've got it backwards. The true question for sincere but imperfect believers like us, is: **How well is your life fitting into Jesus?**



Last Sunday we talked about how to dress to defeat death. And we took a look at John's vision of Jesus' Revelation, wherein the Lord warns the world, "you do not realize that you are ... naked", (Rev 3:17) and establishes a kingdom of priests who clothe themselves in fine linen, "for the fine linen is the righteous acts of the saints". (Rev 19:8) Which is why the Psalmist says:



May Your *priests* be <u>clothed</u> with <u>righteousness</u>; [and] may Your <u>saints</u> sing for joy. – Psalm 132:9 NIV



Spiritual clothing, down here and up there, is a common theme in Scripture.



[For instance, *David* asks] What *gain* is there ... from my *going down* to the *grave*? Does *dust* give You *thanks* or *declare* Your *faithfulness*? ... [But] You *changed* my *mourning* into *dancing*; [because] You *took off* my *sackcloth* and *clothed* me with *gladness*. – Psalm 30:10-12 NAB



Indeed I shall continue to rejoice, for ... My eager expectation and hope is that I shall not be put to shame in any way, but that with all boldness, now as always, [and forever] Christ will be magnified in my body, whether by life or by death. For to me life is Christ, and death is gain. – Philippians 1:18-21 NAB

[And so] My soul rejoices in my God. For He has <u>clothed me with garments of salvation</u> and <u>arrayed me in a robe of righteousness</u> – Isaiah 61:10 NIV

May all who exalt themselves ... be clothed with shame and disgrace. – Psalm 35:26 NIV

[But] I put on righteousness as my clothing; [and] justice was my robe – Job 29:14 NIV

[Whereas] [The wicked] did not remember to show mercy, but ... loved cursing, so ... he clothed himself with cursing as with his garment – Psalm 109:16-18 NKJ

[Which is why] Your enemies will be <u>clothed</u> in <u>shame</u>, and <u>the tents of the wicked will</u> <u>be no more</u>. – Job 8:22 NIV

Now we know that if the <u>earthly tent</u> we <u>live</u> in is <u>destroyed</u>, we have ... an <u>eternal house</u> in <u>heaven</u> ... Meanwhile we <u>groan</u>, <u>[down here]</u> longing to <u>be clothed</u> <u>[up there]</u> ... so that what is <u>mortal</u> may be <u>swallowed</u> up by <u>life</u>. – 2 Corinthians 5:1-5 NIV

[But] My accusers will be clothed with disgrace and wrapped in shame – Psalm 109:29 NIV



Okay. I'm gonna tell you about the time I was literally clothed with disgrace, and wrapped in shame. It was a humiliating experience, as well as a triumph of clothing myself in trust that Jesus had me covered. I was twenty, just before one of my first public messages, at a worship event in a conference room at Dickinson's Family Buffet in Bellingham. When, partway through the dinner, I suddenly needed a restroom. And I mean suddenly! It struck without warning. And I'm speed-walking and clenching down a long hallway to the men's room.

Long story short: too little too late. Way too late. This was the early '80s when white slacks were all the rage; and I was wearing 'em. So I tossed my shorts in the trash, and washed my pants in the sink – praying as hard as I've ever prayed that nobody would walk in. They didn't. And I finished. But there was some damage that couldn't be undone. I wanted to run to my car and escape. But instead, I prayed for boldness and returned. Back against the wall, I inched my way halfway around the room till I was behind the podium. And there I stayed. When it was time to speak, I walked straight forward. And when I was done, I walked backward, and waited against the wall. Several people came to me to tell me how touched they were by my humility. If only they knew. I was too pooped for pride! Shar finally came to me, and rescued me with a coat to tie around my waist, so I could make my escape. And that's when I learned a big lesson about the Lord: God can turn the worst mess into the best message. If we'll let Him. But: You gotta be willingly flexible, humble, and bold.



It reminds me of Joshua (the Hebrew name of Jesus/Yeshua), an OT high priest, who had a similar experience (in Zechariah's prophetic vision), standing in the Temple covered in human filth.



[And] The Angel [of the Lord] said to those standing in front of him, "Take off those dirty clothes. ... Look, I have taken away your sin ... and I am giving you beautiful, fine clothes. ... Listen, Joshua, [Yeshua/Jesus] the high priest, and your friends who are sitting in front of you. They are symbols of what will happen. – Zechariah 3:4, 8 NCV



Fast-forward to Jesus, at Matthew's sinner dinner; with a crowd of sinners and tax collectors sitting in front of Him, at the table; while a crowd of filthy, pharisaical, religious rulers and temple tax collectors stand outside, in the doorway, looking in and looking down on the Friend of sinners; because Jesus scheduled this dinner party on their fasting day. (Mk 2:18) And so:



When the <u>teachers</u> of the <u>law</u> who were Pharisees saw Him eating with the "sinners" and tax collectors, they asked His disciples: [from the doorway] "Why does He eat with tax collectors and 'sinners'?" [But] On hearing this, Jesus [memorably] said to them, "It is not the healthy who need a doctor, but the sick. [And in the same way] I have not come to call the [self] righteous, but [self-aware] sinners." – Mark 2:16-17 NIV

The reason this is so good, and so worth repeating so often, is that 1) Self-righteousness is self-deception. Because, there are only two camps: the sick who admit it, and the sick who don't. Which camp do you belong to? Because, 2) If we disregard the Doctor, we're disqualified from the cure. And, best of all, 3) We're not allowed to make ourselves acceptable to God! Cuz that'd be as silly as trying to make yourself well in order to go to the doctor. And then:

Some people came and asked Jesus, "How is it that John's disciples and the disciples of the Pharisees are fasting, but Yours are not?" [And] Jesus answered, [with this bombshell] "How can the guests of the Bridegroom fast while He is with them? [The law says] They cannot, so long as they have Him with them. — Mark 2:18-19 NIV



Bridegroom is OT imagery from Isaiah (62:5) and Hosea (2:16-19) regarding the Messiah and redemption. And Jesus just said, "I'm that Guy!" And the Lord required only one annual fast, (Lev 16:29) but seven annual feasts! But the Pharisees had to add 104 more to publically display their devotion. (Lk 18:12) And as the "teachers of the law" well knew, if a God-given feast-day fell on a personal fast-day, the fast gave way. Because, laws of sadness had to give way to laws of gladness. And, a Jewish wedding banquet was regarded as a feast-day. So when they say, "Why aren't Your disciples fasting?" Jesus says, "Why are you blind to the Bridegroom?!" Mic drop.

[And] It was given to [the bride] [the body of Christ] to clothe herself in fine linen, bright and clean; for the fine linen is the righteous acts of the saints. – Revelation 19:8 NAS

For all of you who were baptized into Christ have <u>clothed</u> yourselves with <u>Christ</u>. – Galatians 3:27 NIV

[For] You were taught, with regard to your <u>former</u> way of <u>life</u>, to <u>put off</u> your <u>old self</u> ... to be <u>made new</u> in the <u>attitude</u> of your <u>minds</u>; and to <u>put on</u> the <u>new self</u>, created to be <u>like God</u> in <u>true</u> righteousness and holiness. – Ephesians 4:22-24 NIV

[And] We know that we have <u>left our old dead way of life</u>. And we have <u>entered into new life</u>. [In Christ; and] We know this because we love one another. [Because] Anyone who doesn't love <u>still lives</u> in their <u>old condition</u>. – 1 John 3:14 NIR

Therefore, if *anyone* is *in* Christ, [they are] a new creation; *old things* have *passed away*; [they're *dead* and *gone*] behold, *all things* have become *new*. – 2 Corinthians 5:17 NKJ



And it's at *Matthew's banquet*, that Jesus offers two brilliant, back to back parables. The *New Cloth Patch*, that shrinks and tears old clothes; and the *New Wine*, that expands and explodes old wineskins. And both stress the need for flexibility and pliability in God's hands.



No one sews a patch of unshrunk cloth on an old garment, for the patch will pull away from the garment, making the tear worse. Neither do men pour new wine into old wineskins. If they do, the skins will burst, the wine will run out and the wineskins will be ruined. No, they pour new wine into new wineskins, and both are preserved. – Matthew 9:16-17 NIV

The new cloth shows how comfy old clothes of "shame and disgrace" from whatever worldly impurity, can't be spared with a godly patch that sincerely shrinks from sin. (That cloth is 2,000 years old!) And the new wine shows how a new life of ever-expanding selfless acts of love, is incompatible with non-compliant ol' gasbags. (They were most often made from goatskins like these.) And these old goats and gasbags were so set in their ways, they couldn't even take the pressure of mixing with the sinners the Messiah was sent to save!

And these inflexible teachers prevented the prideful complexity of their rules from shrinking, by refusing to let Jesus expand their way of thinking. Their religious system, with its myriad of added regulations, was simply too rigid to reduce without the simplicity of godly sincerity that's not only found in Christ, but the hallmark of Christ. Which is why Paul says:

We conducted ourselves in the world in <u>simplicity</u> and <u>godly sincerity</u>, not with <u>fleshly wisdom</u> [of <u>complexity or impurity or hypocrisy</u>] – 2 Corinthians 1:12 NKJ

[Case in point] [A teacher of religious law] asked, "Of all the commandments, which is the most important?" [And he not only got an answer, but all Ten Commandments, every OT rule and requirement, and every demand of every prophet! When] Jesus replied ... "You must love the Lord your God with all your heart, all your soul, all your mind, and all your strength." [Which correspond to the first four of the Ten Commandments, which pertain to God] The second [corresponds to the other six, which pertain to parents, murder, adultery, stealing, lying about your neighbor, and coveting your neighbor's stuff] ... 'Love your neighbor as yourself.' [For] All the other commandments and all the demands of the prophets are based on these two" – Mt 22:40; Mk 12:28-31 NLT

Then, the *night* before the *cross*, Jesus *further shrinks* those *two* into just *one*. Saying:

"A new [simplified and streamlined] commandment I give to you, that you <u>love one another</u>; as I have loved <u>you</u> ... [because] you <u>are My disciples</u>, if you have [Christ-like] love for one <u>another</u>. [And <u>He's God</u>; so that covers <u>everything</u>, because] ... <u>You are My</u> friends if you do whatever I <u>command</u> you. – John 13:34-35; 15:14 NKJ

So there you go. The entire Bible in eight words! Need a dressing room? So you can change! Jesus had this remarkably brilliant way of shrinking and simplifying complex religious requirements, simply by replacing legalistic rules with ever expanding sincerity of heart. But, Paul also writes:

I fear, lest somehow, as the serpent deceived Eve by his craftiness, so <u>your</u> [new] <u>minds</u> may be <u>corrupted</u> from the <u>simplicity</u> that is <u>in Christ</u>. – 2 Corinthians 11:3 NKJ



How? Needless complexity, worldly impurity, or plain ol' gasbag hypocrisy. A reborn, righteous life can't stay in the grave. It's gotta get out! Just as hardened hearts can't grow in Christ. No matter who they're hardened against. It's gotta break out! Can't let 'em hold you back from really living!

Because, Jesus didn't go to the cross to patch up a dying double life. He died and rose to completely replace and transform it! So don't fall into the trap of fitting your faith into your life, the way we do a career, or friends, or sports, or hobbies. Otherwise, Christ may be present, but you'll stay in the doorway. It's gotta be all or nothing. Work. Relationships. Finances. Otherwise, Christ may be prominent, but you won't be transformed. But we come here to work out our salvation by more and more making the Lord the central hub of our world, wherein, Christ is preeminent, around which every part of our heart revolves. Otherwise, you're gonna be pulled in two directions, till you're torn apart or your faith blows up. Which is why salvation is a call to action! And a call that's all or nothing. Just remember that dinner with Jesus. He couldn't eat with those who stood on the sidelines. So, you in or you out? It's time to be bold, reject the old, trash the shorts, and enter in, regardless of sin, cuz the Good Doctor has you covered.

Father God, thank You for loving me in spite of my sin; forgive me and cleanse me by the sacrifice of Your Son, my Savior; and free me and lead me by Your Spirit and Word, as I seek to trust and follow Jesus Christ, as the Lord of my life. Amen.
