Unclogged

The Powerful Drano of Humility

Today we're talking about unleashing the ultimate power of God in our lives.













Ever get caught naked? Share. No don't. Cuz, ever since Eve's leaves, those are some of our most humiliating stories. Second only, perhaps, to clogging a toilet at someone else's house. What's more distressing than watching that water rise?! And what's more humbling than having to ask for a plunger? There's a common experience shared by pastors. When you don't think your message has much power, God always seems to use it in a powerful way. And when you think you've got a powerful sermon, it always seems to fall flat. And it might be, that: God's power is diminished by even a hint of vanity. Just as in life: arrogance lessens the impact of a good lesson. Whatever the case, I'm sure this'll be my worst sermon ever ... [wink]. I told you about the time I made myself speak at an event, after messing my white pants. And how so many were so touched by the power of my humility. But, it almost didn't happen. Because my fear of humiliation was convincingly begging me to flee. There's a fine line between humility and humiliation. little Jesus grew up with OT Scriptures on humility, like this proverb:

Do not *exalt* yourself in the *king's presence*, and do not *claim* a *place* among *great men*; [because] it is *better* for *him* to say to *you*, "Come *up* here," than for him to *humiliate* you before a nobleman. – Proverbs 25:6-7 NIV

[After all, as Isaiah writes] The arrogance of man will be brought low and the pride of men humbled – Isaiah 2:18 NIV

And, years later, big Jesus turned these into a parable, at a party:

When He noticed how the [most honorable, powerful, and distinguished] guests picked the places of honor at the table, [and] He told them this parable: "When someone invites you to a wedding feast, do not take the place of honor, for a person more distinguished than you may have been invited. If so, the host who invited both of you will come and say to you, 'Give this man your seat.' Then, humiliated, you will have to take the least important place. But when you are invited, take the lowest place, so that when your host comes, he will say to you, 'Friend, move up to a better place.' Then [due to humility] you will be honored [publically] in the presence of all your fellow guests. For everyone who exalts himself will be humbled, and he who humbles himself will be exalted." — Luke 14:7-11 NIV

Great advice. But why's He giving these ego-driven guests a better way to get recognition? Cuz they won't do it. Know why? Fear of the potential public humiliation of not being asked to move up. So, to those who aren't humility-driven, it's still every man for himself. You see: the fear of humiliation is a direct result of a hunger for acceptance, attention, approval, and admiration.







So, how do we "take the lowest place" that Jesus is actually getting at?

[Well] By the *grace* given *me* [says Paul] I say to every one of *you*: Do not *think* of yourself <u>more highly than you ought</u>, but rather *think* of yourself <u>with sober judgment</u>, in accordance with the *measure* of *faith* [and *grace* that] *God* has given *you*. – Romans 12:3 NIV

Now, humility isn't: thinking poorly of yourself. It's: thinking rightly of yourself. And the more mature the measure of your faith, the more accurate and unpretentious you'll become. Because, it's all about taking a fearless inventory of the faults and flaws and failures of our flesh. And then taking them daily, boldly before the Lord. Because that's how we:

Hold firmly to the faith we profess. For [what's the big deal?] we do not have a high priest who is unable to sympathize with our weaknesses, but we have One who has been tempted in every way, just as we are ... [So] Let us then approach the throne of grace with confidence, so that we may receive [the] mercy [we need] — Hebrews 4:14-16 NIV

True humility continues to strengthen our relationship with the Lord by forcing us to face our ongoing need to seek the glory and honor of His grace and mercy and generous forgiveness.

So to seek one's own glory is not glory. – Proverbs 25:27 NKJ

Nor [as it has it the NIV] is it honorable to seek one's own honor. – Proverbs 25:27 NIV

[But] When you bow down before the Lord [in humility] and admit your dependence on Him, He will lift you up and give you honor. – James 4:10 NLT









Because, greatness in the eyes of God is very different than it is in the eyes of man. We can only be exalted by God by facing and admitting the parts of our lives that remain under the influence of sin. To which we're so often so blind. As C.S. Lewis writes (in Mere Christianity): If you think that you're not conceited, it means that you are very conceited indeed. But, as he also writes (in The Letters): As long as one knows one is proud, one is safe from the worst form of pride. We have a pipeline to God that sin corrodes and arrogance clogs. Psalm 119:70 says the heart of the proud is as fat as grease. And the only way to flush it out and keep it flowing free and clear is to daily, diligently maintain open communication. And in this analogy, humility is the Drano that scours our encrusted soul. And each treatment removes another layer of crud and filth, providing a shiny, stainless-steel relationship with our Savior — which releases the true power of God in our lives. And here's today's message in eight words: The power of God is released through humility. Know why?

Because, "God opposes the proud but gives grace to the humble." - 1 Peter 5:5b NIV

[So] All of you, <u>clothe yourselves</u> with <u>humility toward one another</u> – 1 Peter 5:5a NIV

Well, I certainly don't want to oppose God. And I do want God's grace. So I guess I'll take a crack at clothing myself with humility toward you all right now. Hmm. Plunger story or naked story?

One very hot day, all alone, after work, long before the church had air conditioning, when I lived only three minutes away, on a whim, I jumped in the pool in the shorts I was wearing. No towel. No extra clothes. Then I got in my Taurus, without touching the seat, and pulled my lower apparel to my knees, and drove home. But I needed one leg free. I'm not much of an exhibitionist. So I start anxiously imagining being pulled over, or getting in a wreck and being unconscious. What would people think?! And I glance in my mirror and see flashing police lights on my bumper! Adrenalin rips through me as I pull over, while pulling at a tangle of wet shorts and skivvies. And then ... they drive past. But, my heart is hammering. And I notice a metallic taste – like copper. Turns out, "a metallic, coppery taste during extreme fear or anxiety is a common physiological response". I literally tasted the fear of humiliation. And yet, here I am, openly sharing it. Which is still a bit uncomfortable. Because, humility feels a lot like humiliation. But it's not. It's the opposite. It's pure power. Sure, humility opens us up to embarrassment. But, nothing opens up those around us like our humility. I can't tell you how many of you have shared your own story of messing your pants. Enough already.



Even the tiniest threat of trivial humiliation can trigger a fearful reflexive reaction. Because, humiliation terrifies us. Because it leaves us powerless and exposed. Whereas, arrogance and vanity comfort us. Because their power (like Eve's leaves) covers us and protects our pride. Which is why so many believers are so attracted to the idea of the power of God, as opposed to the humility of God. Not realizing that humility is the power of God. Which is why the three words I always use to describe the fearless folks of His Place, are: sincerity and transparency and authenticity. It's true. I do.

So, humble yourselves [toward others] under the [protection of the] mighty power of God, and in His good time He will honor you. – 1 Peter 5:6 NLT

After Jesus' resurrection, the Apostles met Simon the magician, whose stage name was: **The Great Power.** But this sorcerer's sleight of hand was upstaged by their laying on of hands.

[When the crowds] saw the miraculous signs ... they all paid close attention ... [But] Simon had practiced sorcery ... and amazed all the people ... He boasted that he was someone great, and all the people ... gave him their attention and exclaimed, "This man is the divine power known as the Great Power." ... [Now] Simon himself believed and was baptized ... astonished by the great signs and miracles ... [And] Simon offered them money and said, "Give me also this ability so that everyone on whom I lay my hands may receive the Holy Spirit." Peter answered: "May your money perish with you, because you thought you could buy the gift of God ... because your heart is not right before God. Repent of this wickedness ... [for] you are full of bitterness and captive to sin." — Acts 8:5-24 NIV

And we can fall into the same trap. Buying books or attending studies to learn how to tap into the power of God's Spirit. Christian conferences and crusades often use the word power in their advertising; because, let's face it, who's going to attend: Exposing Your Weakness! But, if you really, truly want God's power to transform your life, then get out the Drano! And:

Let the *same mind* be in *you* that was in *Christ Jesus*, who ... <u>humbled himself</u> and became obedient to the *point* of *death* – even *death* on a *cross*. – Philippians 2:5-8 NRS

Because, more often than not, we're not even willing to die of embarrassment.

But, if you want to save a wounded relationship; or, if you want your kids to grow to respect you; or, if you want to affect those around you with your faith; don't quote Scripture at 'em, or try to manipulate 'em with prayer. Just clothe yourself in the uncomfortable, transparent, apparel of humility. And force yourself to openly and readily admit your fleshly faults and flaws and failures. And humble yourself and apologize for inappropriate or insensitive words and actions on your part. Just, take responsibility. And make a plan to change bad habits. And ask for input and help. And watch the true power of God's Spirit begin to exponentially change your world! Acts of faith are very important, but they're rendered impotent without selfless love.

[For instance] If I have a *faith* that can move mountains, but have not *love*, I am *nothing*. [Or] If I give *all* I possess to the *poor* ... but have not *love*, I *gain* nothing. Love is *patient*, love is *kind*. ... It does not *boast*, [and] it is not *proud*. – 1 Corinthians 13:2-4 NIV

But it sure is powerful! Cuz it's humility. Love is simply humility aimed at others. Just as character is humility aimed at yourself. And, righteousness is humility aimed at God. Paul's prayers for his own healing went unanswered so that he could benefit from ongoing suffering. Which he did.

[Saying] I begged the Lord to take it away. [But] Each time He said ..." My power works best in your weakness." So now [unlike that sorcerer] I am glad to boast about my weaknesses, so that the power of Christ may work through me. – 2 Corinthians 12:8-9 NLT



God's power works best in our weakness because that's when we gotta depend on His grace. And God's grace is power in its purest form. But, we can only share it if we've got it. And, He only gives it to the humble. So, what is "the lowest place" at the table? Washing feet, of course.

"Now that I ... have washed your feet, you also should wash one another's feet. I have set you an example that you should do as I have done for you." – John 13:12-15 NIV

And in that way He serves as an example of the lowest place wherein is found the greatest power.

"For who is [actually] greater, the one who is at the table [trying to secure the most impressive seat] or the one who serves? Is it not [according to the world] the one who is at the table? But [here] I am among you as One who serves." — Luke 22:27 NIV

Forcing us to see that greatness to Him knocks our definition off its seat. Because:

"The greatest among you will [gladly] be your [humble] servant. For [they're in on the big secret of true love and life-giving power] whoever exalts himself will be humbled, and whoever humbles himself will be exalted." – Matthew 23:11-12 NIV

The purest power of God, is released through humility – not some spiritual sorcery. Because it's the power to overcome and the power to change, first yourself, and then those around you, who desperately need you to serve as their example. Because those who've never seen the full power of God, have simply never seen the full power of humility in the believers they know. So, maybe make a fresh list of all your sins. And look at 'em. And then get out the Drano and take them boldly to the throne of grace. And confess 'em afresh. And admit to yourself your dependence on Him: the One and only Savior who thoroughly sympathizes with all your sin. And just flush the flesh away.

Father God, thank You for loving me in spite of my sin; forgive me and cleanse me by the sacrifice of Your Son, my Savior; and free me and lead me by Your Spirit and Word, as I seek to trust and follow Jesus Christ, as the Lord of my life. Amen.
