
I'm gonna be your server ... and doctor, because today you're all gettin' a spiritual physical!

And it's all about finding out, how prepared we are to stand before the Lord face to face. But first, to today's question: Are you ready to answer for your actions? Because every day, the day draws closer, when you'll stand, alone, before the throne of the Savior, and give an account.

For we [believers] must all appear before the judgment seat of Christ, so that each of us may receive what is due us for the things done [by us] while in the body, whether good or bad. Since, then, we [in the body] know what it is to fear the Lord, [as a child regards the absolute authority of a loving parent] we try to persuade others. [That] What we are is plain to God [our Father], and [since we know "the heart is deceitful above all things" (Jer 17:9)] I hope it is also plain to your conscience. — 2 Corinthians 5:10-11 NIV

For none of us [who live in the body] lives for ourselves alone, and none of us dies for ourselves alone. [Because all of us know we'll stand alone to give an account for ourselves; so] If we live, we live for the Lord; [on account of His call and our created purpose] and if we die, we die for the Lord. [Knowing that even our death is part of His perfect plan] So, whether we [sincere servants] live or die, [we win! Because] we belong to the Lord. ... For we will all stand before God's judgment seat. [As] It is written: "'As surely as I live,' says the Lord, 'every knee will bow before Me; [and] every tongue will acknowledge God.'" So then, [let's keep in mind that] each of us [sincere servants who belong to the Lord] will give an account of ourselves to God. — Romans 14:10-12 NIV







For instance: 1) We were created to believe in something. Namely the One true God and Father of all the living. And since true belief means recognizing and receiving and responding to our Creator's authority, the question will simply be: Did you love Me above all else? Yes or no? Imagine if the answer is no. Yikes! At best it would be a soul-crushing realization, in the presence of my Creator, that I'd refused to experience the truest love for which I was created! And worse yet, it'll all be unthinkingly obvious and irresistibly appealing!

And there's four more created-purpose categories to answer for! Because: 2) We were also created to belong to something. His body. His flock. And since true belonging involves interacting and intercenting and interconnecting with other believers, the question will be: Did you bond with My kids? You know, your eternal brothers and sisters. Yes or no?









And: 3) We were created to become something (i.e. what He would be if He were me). And since true becoming requires discipline and devotion and **dedication** (to examine His example and put it into practice), the question will be: Did you act like Me if I were thee? Yes or no? (He mainly speaks King James when it rhymes!) And since He's the Vine and we're the branches: (In 15:5) 4) We were created to branch out to something. Cuz we're called to sow and grow and bear fruit. And true branching is all about extending the Good News of the cross of Christ as the tree of eternal life, with our family and friends and neighbors around the world. So this question will be: A) Did you share Me? Yes or no? And if so: B) With grace? And finally: 5) We were created to bestow something: our service on His behalf. And since true bestowing always involves our time and talents and treasures (to meet the needs that match our resources), the question will be: Did you care for others as only you could? Yes or no? And in that moment, before His throne, standing alone, face to face, finally fully seeing, knowing, and understanding, and then giving your one-on-One account about what you did with what you were given, imagine what you'd be willing to give to be able to give a resounding, "Yes! Yes! Yes! Yes A! Yes B! And, YES!"

It's not like He didn't lay out a warning in simple, children's story terms, saying:

"The kingdom of heaven is like a man traveling to a far country, who called his own servants [that's us] and delivered his goods to them. [That's our created potential] And to one he gave five talents, to another two, and to another one, to each according to his own ability; and immediately he went on a journey. Then he who had received the five talents went and traded with them, and made another five talents. [YAY!] And likewise he who had received two gained two more also. [YAY!] But he who had received one went and dug in the ground, and hid his lord's money. [BOO!] After a long time the lord of those servants came and settled accounts ... [when they came to him to give an account] He who had received five talents came and brought five other talents ... [and] His lord said to him, 'Well done, good and faithful servant ... Enter into the joy of your lord.' [YAY!] He also who had received two talents came and ... His lord said to him, 'Well done, good and faithful servant ... Enter into the joy of your lord.' [YAY!] Then he who had received the one talent came and said, 'Lord ... I was afraid, and went and hid your talent [BOO!] ... But his lord answered and said to him, 'You wicked and lazy servant ... you ought to have [at least] deposited my money with the bankers [who could've helped you increase your talent] ... So take the talent [that was only on loan] from him' ... For to everyone who has [gained from the goods they've been given], more will be given ... but from him who does not have [any gain from God's entrusted goods], even what he has on loan will be taken away." – Matthew 25:14-29 NKJ



Which is why God places a high value on self-examination. Again and again we're warned to examine and strengthen our spiritual self.

[Paul writes] Examine yourselves to see whether you are <u>in the</u> <u>faith</u>; [and not <u>merely</u> in the <u>church</u>] <u>test yourselves</u>. Do you not realize that <u>Christ Jesus is in you</u> – 2 Corinthians 13:5-6 NIV



But *you*, dear friends, must <u>continue</u> to <u>build</u> your <u>lives</u> on the <u>foundation</u> of your holy <u>faith</u>. And <u>continue</u> to <u>pray</u> as you are <u>directed</u> by the Holy Spirit. – Jude 1:20 NLT



Cuz He's doing battle in our self-deceiving hearts, to do all He can with the limited cooperation and time that He's got to get us good and ready to fly right through that final exam, so we can enter into the joy of our Lord! So, we're gonna test ourselves for the five vital signs of a good and faithful servant!

How many of you happen to remember *Dr. Harry Worley?* He *delivered* me. And he was my *pediatrician* — and the *only doctor* I knew *growing up.* And in my *twenties,* I hadn't *seen* him for *years.* But I *needed* a *physical exam.* So I *called* and *made* an *appointment.* Nobody *told* me he'd *become* a *gynecologist* about *five years earlier!* And I didn't *know* I *needed* to *ask!* And he was *aging out* his *pediatric patients.* So maybe *that's* why the receptionist *made* the *appointment.* I don't know. I *do* have a *high voice.* So, I *check in* and *sit down.* It's just *me* and the *ladies.* And they're *giving* me *strangely curious glances.* And I'm just *smiling back* like a *dope.* One *asked* if I'm *waiting* for my *wife.* No. Odd question. Then I'm *led* into an *examination room.* And it doesn't *feel right. Kind* of *like* a woman *entering* a *restroom* and seeing a *urinal.* But, *Dr. Worley* comes *in* and he *couldn't* be *nicer.* But then, *after* the *exam,* He *tells* me *he's* a *gynecologist,* and he's been *phasing out* his *pediatric patients,* and I'm a *little too old,* and a *lot too male,* to *come back.* And *as* I *left,* through the *lobby,* the *ladies looked* at *me,* and I *smiled* with *relief* and *said, "Not pregnant!"*

So, for our spiritual physical, we need to know we're being examined by the right physician, by asking five vital questions, to make sure we don't end up in the wrong place! And you can grade your current condition, with an A for Fit, a B for Effort, a C for Feeble, or a D for Flat-lining.

Ready to see how ready you are to settle your account? Well, ready or not ...


First off, when it comes to BELIEVING, we need to test our faith by asking: 1) What is the center of my life? Which is all about worship and devotion. Cuz, if we fail to devote ourselves to our Lord we'll find a substitute: career, sports, hobbies, money, family, or whatever. It's not will I be devoted to something; it's, what am I actually devoted to? Because something is the center of your life, around which the majority of your decisions and desires revolve. And it's either the Savior or a substitute. Because, we can't serve two masters. (Mt 6:24) So how would you grade yourself when it comes to recognizing, receiving, and responding to His authority, with a well-developed plan for deepening your intimacy; as well as praising Him and worshipping Him physically and emotionally, publicly and privately? Circle: A B C D (Fit, Effort, Feeble, or Flat-lining).

And when it comes to **BELONGING**, we need to ask: 2) **What is the community of my life?** Which is all about fellowship and relationships. Cuz we're designed to grow together, not apart, which is why we must interact with growing believers. **Spiritual fruit (like patience, kindness, and goodness) can't grow in isolation.** We need others to encourage us, confront us, irritate us, and support us; and to whom we can return the favor. So, who are you influencing and being influenced by? And what grade do you give yourself for interacting, interrelating, and just plain connecting with your fellow followers of Christ? A B C D (Fit, Effort, Feeble, or Flat-lining).

And when it comes to BECOMING, we have to ask: 3) What is the character of my life? Which is all about discipleship and discipline. There are only a couple things you can take to Heaven, and Christ-like character is one of 'em! We're all developing habits. Question is: Am I developing Godly habits? Habits flow from our values, attitudes, and day-to-day decisions. And so, if we fail to focus on acting like Christ, we'll reflexively act like our parents, peers, or favorite personalities. So, what grade do you get for the discipline, devotion, and dedication it takes to put His example into practice in your day-to-day life? A B C D

And when it comes to BRANCHING, we need to ask: 4) What is the communication of my life? Which is all about our calling as Christ's ambassadors, to share our life openly, and to reach out readily and respectfully to our family, friends, and whoever happens to sit next to us on an airplane! Remember, you can only take a couple things to Heaven, and the other is others. So, who are you bringing with you? Or are you content (for now) to leave 'em all behind? What grade do you give yourself in regard to reaching out to those in desperate need of God's love, mercy, grace, forgiveness, and eternal life through Christ? A B C D

And when it comes to **BESTOWING**, we have to ask: 5) **What is the contribution of my life?** Which is all about caring for others by serving our created purpose. Because **you were created to contribute to God's creation**. And He created each of us with a unique set of skills and passions and financial means expressly for this purpose. So, are you caring for the needs you're cut out for? Because, true greatness isn't gauged by who serves you, but who you serve. The only good thing you should leave behind, is a legacy. So what grade do you give the way you use your time, talents, and treasure – consistently, proportionally, and sacrificially? A B C D



Okay. Now let's hook you up to a heart monitor.

Transfer your grades by making a dot on the graph above each of the five created purpose categories.

And *now* connect the *dots* to see your *spiritual EKG* (Eternal Kingdom Grade). Can you see which entrusted goods need attention to improve your condition?

Now it's time to write your prescription. Just put an X in any box (below) that's next to a category for which you gave yourself a C or a D. Each one has seven Scriptures to target the problem.
