
## Vital Signs



## Created to Bond and Belong April 6, 2025

Last Sunday we examined what it means to truly believe (in the Lord); and today we'll explore what it means to truly belong (in the church).



So, first off: Are you part of the big picture here? Or anywhere (for that matter)? In our Spiritual Physical, we took a look at what actions we need to take down here, to properly prepare to stand alone before Christ's throne, up there, to give an account in regard to five opportunities we've been given.



For we must all appear before the judgment seat of Christ ... for the things done while in the body, whether good or bad. – 2 Corinthians 5:10 NIV



And the *first question* will be something to the *effect* of: Did you *truly believe* in *Me* and thus *love Me* above *all* else? And the *second* will be something *like*: Did you *truly belong* to *Me* and thus *bond* with *My children?* And *that's* because *life* is *all* about *love!* And the *reason* I put *these* two *first* is because when *asked* what *tops His list*, Jesus said:



"Love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind. This is the <u>first and greatest</u> commandment. And the <u>second</u> is like it: Love your neighbor as yourself." – Matthew 22:37-39 NIV



Thankfully, when our time comes before the seat of our Savior, it won't be about perfection, but practice and participation! But, as you can clearly see, our first and foremost created purpose priority is to learn to love the Lord. And a close second (just like it) is to learn to love people. Guess which is easier! But, why is "the second ... like [the first]"? Well, because:



The <u>entire</u> law [including loving the Lord with all you've got] is summed up in a <u>single</u> command: [to] "Love your neighbor as yourself." – Galatians 5:14 NIV



Know why? Cuz ain't no way you'll truly attempt — let alone succeed — to truly love others, unless and until you're truly sold out on loving the Lord.

If I gave you a couple Q-tips and some clay, and gave you 30 seconds to build



a little *church*, what would you *design*? Go ahead and *make* one in your *mind*. Got it? Now, did you *imagine* something like this little *structure*? Or this little *servant*? Cuz, **the** *church* **is a** *body*, **not a** *building*. And if *yours* looked like *Jesus*, you're a *bit* of an *overachiever*. But *together* we *form* the *body* of *Christ*. That's what our *Jesus mosgic* is *all about*. That's why the



body of Christ. That's what our Jesus mosaic is all about. That's why the plaque calls it the Big Picture. So, are you part of the big picture on this little corner of God's kingdom?

Because, members of His family belong to each other the same way the members of your body (like your nose and ears and arms and legs) are connected and reliant and subject to one another.



Just as *each* of us has *one* body with *many* members, and *these* members do not *all* have the *same function*, so in Christ <u>we</u> who are <u>many</u> form <u>one</u> body, and *each* member belongs to all the others. – Romans 12:4-5 NIV



That's what it means to join and belong. So exactly who do you belong to? Where are you investing your talents? Who's faith do you encourage and strengthen? Whose secrets do you know? And who knows yours? And who will call you when disaster strikes? Or a loved one dies? Or temptation comes calling? Most believers know John 3:16 by heart:



"For God so loved the world that He gave His one and only Son" – John 3:16 NIV



But, how many are that familiar with First John 3:16?



This is how we know what love is: <u>Jesus Christ laid down His</u> <u>[one and only mortal]</u> <u>life</u> for us. And <u>we ought to lay down our lives</u> for our brothers and sisters. – 1 John 3:16 NIV



Because we are *created* and *called*, to *not* just *believe*, but to *belong to*, and *bond with*, those for *whom* He *laid down His life*. Because:



His unchanging plan has always been to adopt us into His own family – Ephesians 1:5 NLT



This is such a vital aspect of our created purpose. Because, we weren't just created, we were formed and fashioned for His family. Throughout Scripture, our Father is knitting His people together, to build a family who'll love and honor, Him and each other, and live together forever.

[You] like living stones, are being built into a spiritual house – 1 Peter 2:5 NIV

[Hold that thought, because] [You are] members of the household of God, built on the foundation of the apostles and prophets, [with] Christ Jesus himself being the <u>Cornerstone</u>, in whom the whole structure, being joined together, grows into a holy temple in the Lord. [And] In Him you also [on this little corner of the Cornerstone's eternal kingdom] are being built together into a dwelling place for God by the Spirit. – Ephesians 2:19-22 ESV

Or do you *not know* that your [church] body is the temple of the Holy Spirit who is in you ... and you are not your own? – 1 Corinthians 6:19 NKJ

When we're born, we can't grow and develop without the support and care of a nurturing family. Same goes when we're reborn. We gotta have rock-solid relationships. Cuz you're no angel. But:

[Christ] makes the whole body <u>fit</u> together <u>perfectly</u>. [But <u>only</u>] As each [imperfect] part <u>does its own special work</u>, [because that's the <u>only way</u>] it helps the other parts grow, so that the whole body is healthy and growing and full of love. - Ephesians 4:16 NLT



You see, our walk with God is personal, but not private. Because our Father comes with a family. And just as an arm can't fulfill "its own special work" if it's dismembered, neither can we. Let me give you a nauseating, horrifying, perfect example! Back in 1997, a mass tug-of-war took place in Taipei. Over 800 men on opposing ends of a 2" nylon rope capable of withstanding 57,000 pounds of force. Turns out, 1,600 men produce three times that. And two wrapped the rope around their arms for leverage. And the rope snapped. And the recoil instantly severed their arms. It's a very gruesome news photo; but it makes an incredible, Biblical point. So if you're squeamish, look away. Cuz here it is. Okay. That's enough. So: Why is this so disturbing? Cuz it's so wrong! Because, limbs aren't supposed to ever be disconnected from a body! The limb quickly dies and withers away. And the body is left crippled. This is how upsetting it must be to Jesus — and should be to us — whenever we see a believer detached from His body. Because, He fervently warns and implores all of His limbs, to:

"Remain in Me, as I also remain in you. ... [Because] I am the Vine; [and] you are the branches. ... [So] If you do not remain in Me, you are like a branch that is thrown away and withers ... Now remain in My love ... so that My joy may be in you and that your joy may be complete. ... Love each other as I have loved you. [Cuz that's how you "Remain in Me, as I remain in you"] ... This is My command: Love each other." – John 15:4-17 NIV

[So] Woe to him who strives with Him who formed him ... Does the clay say to him who forms it, "What are you making?" ... [Well] "Will you command Me [or submit to My command] concerning My children and the work of My hands?" – Isaiah 45:9-11 ESV

[Well then] Do not neglect to attend your assemblies, as some do, but rather encourage one another, especially since you can see the Day approaching. – Hebrews 10:25 NCB

I made a *comment* to a *fellow follower*, last week, about *getting older*, and *she* said, "We're *not* getting *older*, we're getting *nearer*." And I said, "I'm totally *stealing* that for *Sunday!*" Remember:

[Every] commandment there may be, [is] summed up in this <u>one rule</u>: "Love your <u>neighbor</u> as yourself." ... The hour has come for you to wake up from your <u>slumber</u>, because our salvation is nearer now than when we first believed. [And time goes fast] The night is nearly over; [down here; and] the day is almost here. [When you'll wake up, up there] So let us put aside the deeds of darkness and put on the armor of light. – Romans 13:9-12 NIV

[Because] "Your love for <u>one another</u> [not a building or a doctrine or a denomination] will prove to the world [down here] that you are My disciples." – John 13:35 NLT

Because people are hard to love. But, limbs need a body and a body needs limbs. So don't buy the enemy's lie that you don't need to commit to any corner of the Cornerstone's kingdom. You may feel more virtuous when no one's close enough to frustrate you; but that's just a virtual virtuousness! Which is why Christ commands us to have close fellowship with irritating, frustrating, imperfect people, like ourselves, to develop the discipline of loving them as He loves us. So:

Let us consider how we may <u>spur</u> one another <u>on</u> toward <u>love</u> and <u>good deeds</u>. [Like our <u>Ministry Fair; and</u>] Let us not give up <u>meeting together</u> – Hebrews 10:24-25 NIV

It's so easy to fool ourselves into thinking we're spiritually mature when, in reality, there's just no one challenging us or spurring us on. Which is why we're called to love real people not ideal people. The devil must delight in withering, dismembered limbs, detached from Christ's command.







What do the dying want to be surrounded by in their final moments? Money? Trophies? Books? You know the answer. Family. Friends. And loved ones. In our final minutes, we're finally ready to receive our final lesson before we go before the throne: the realization that life was all about relationships. Well, I say: Why wait till it's too late? Let's calculate how we're spending our pre-deathbed minutes! Ideally, but realistically, how many minutes a day would you like to be able to say that you're spending on praying, and praising, and hearing God's Word, and giving and getting spiritual support, and sharing meaningful moments with family and friends, and serving or helping others in the name of Christ? How many minutes per day? Come up with a number. And remember, there're 60 minutes in an hour.

Each day, we're given 1,440 minutes of life to spend however we like. So, how are you actually spending 'em? If we deduct 8 hours for sleep, and another 8 for housework, schoolwork, yardwork, and/or vocational work, we're left with 480. But if we deduct an hour for bathroom time (personal care), an hour for eating, and an hour for driving and running errands, only 300 remain. Watch one movie and it drops to 180. Minutes. And that gets divided between sports (playing and/or watching) and hobbies and TV and gaming and reading and recreation and exercising and shopping and phone time. So just do the math and ask yourself if you're spending your time wisely. Because, we will have to answer for how we fill our time. And so why wouldn't we:

Live a life *filled* with *love*, following the *example* of *Christ*. [Cuz] He *loved* us and *offered himself* as a sacrifice *for* us, [which was] a *pleasing* aroma to *God*. - Ephesians 5:2 NLT

And so, dear brothers and sisters, [writes Paul] I plead with you to give your bodies to God. Let them be a living and holy sacrifice—the kind He will accept. [Because] When you think of what He has done for you, is this too much to ask? — Romans 12:1 NLT

It sure won't seem so up there! But, sadly, down here, when our calendar gets crowded, we cut back on all things eternal – for which we will give an account and be overjoyed if we can give a good answer. So, don't let the urgent detach you from the important. But, because of our busy schedules, when we give our time, we're sacrificing our life. Because we only get a set amount. Unlike giving your money, you can't make more time. So, what will you have to say when you're asked how you spent the time of your life on all things eternal? Because:

Nothing in all creation is hidden from God's sight. Everything is uncovered and laid bare before the eyes of Him to whom we must give account. – Hebrews 4:13 NIV

So keep your eyes on the prize by keeping in mind that we're called to belong to His body. Because we're being formed for His family. Because life is all about love. So squeeze it in wherever you can. Because, whenever we make time, we make a living sacrifice. And sacrifice is the essence of love. And love is the command of Christ. Because love is the point of ... well, everything.

Father God, thank You for loving me in spite of my sin; forgive me and cleanse me by the sacrifice of Your Son, my Savior; and free me and lead me by Your Spirit and Word, as I seek to trust and follow Jesus Christ, as the Lord of my life. Amen.
